The Lantern Field, Martley

As some people probably know this is the large arable field adjoining Rogers' coach station, and it is now sadly under threat of development. It was known to have this name in Queen Elizabeth 1st time (1558-1603), being part of the lands which provided rent used to maintain the school which stood in the North West corner of the churchyard. This was pulled down in 1847. As the 99 year lease of these (then Chantry) lands beginning 5 July 1539, to Thomas Noxon, the Lantern field probably already had its name, in fact there were named sections in Martley before 1311. One would assume that a lantern was sited in this field to light the way to the church and school, which was used for many other things. That is the most likely theory. However, maybe the name could come from a much older custom. In 'Celentine Rambles and Guide to Hagley' published in 1882, a paragraph tells of the probability of a Saxon church (the same as in Martley) and a field called Lamplands "given for the maintenance of a lamp in the church to burn continually before the host". Could it be that this was the case here in St Peter's church - the aumbry (meaning cupboard) is possibly as old as the north wall of the Chancel itself (13thC) and that is where the Bread and Wine would have been kept. At Kempsey certain land rents in the 14thC paid for wax candles to burn before the altar. Incidentally, I believe the old spelling 'Lanthorn' comes from lant (a type of bovine of a certain age, perhaps like 'stirk' in the north of England) and the thin sliced horn used instead of glass. Another interesting point, the Chantry High School's new apple orchard is on land called Jacob's Bower - OE meaning is a dwelling. Perhaps Jacob was in charge of the lantern.



Martley Parish Council Abbreviated unapproved minutes of the Parish Council meeting held on 1 October

7 councillors present, plus 4 members of the public and the Clerk.

Democratic Period/ Public Question Time

The problem of traffic using Jury Lane was raised. The suggestion was made that the signage at the entrance to the lane requires improvement and a more substantial barrier at the end of the lane is required. County Cllr A Davies agreed to refer this problem to WCC Highways Dept. A problem with drainage opposite Betts Ecology was raised. The work of the Lengthsman during day of particular heavy rain was commended.

Declarations of Interest

Cllr Walker declared an interest in item 11.

County & District Councillor

Reports

County Councillor Davies reported that a further meeting would take place on the proposed community transport. Cllr Walker agreed to attend. He also pointed out that the Neighbourhood Plan should cover the next 20 years and be reviewed every 5 years. He also reported that he would not be standing for re-election in May 2013. Chairman thanked him for his involvement with the village over the last 20 years. District Councillor Williams reported on some Neighbourhood Plan training that had taken place. As requested by Council she had approached the SWDP team about whether the council could allocate the sites for housing themselves. She read out a long detailed reply (Copy of this email on the website).

between (a) Taylor Wimpey and Council and (b) Richard Bray and Council to discuss the current status.

Granting of dispensations

The clerk explained the new rule about dispensations for councillors' interests. It was agreed that the agenda would still be issued at the same time and the clerk would notify any councillor who she felt could have an interest to apply for a dispensation.

The logos prepared by Georgiana Baxter were reviewed and voted upon. A new logo was selected.

Letters had been received concerning the noise from the play area. This correspondence arrived too late for any decision to be made therefore the clerk will reply accordingly. Letter received from A Palmer resigning as Tree Warden. To be placed on next agenda.

Weighbridge use by Longside Radio, this is ongoing. Crown Orchard, it was agreed to approach the Brewery about this problem as more complaints have been received. Recycling facilities, ongoing

She reported that there are very few parish records held in the archive and that apparently the minute books are held by a parishioner. The clerk will ask for the safe return of the books.

It also provided the opportunity to witness the official opening of The Chantry School Orchard, which has been developed over the past four years under the guidance of Mr Bob Allison and students. Rupert Brakespear, Worcestershire County Council Sustainability Officer officiated. Over 150 varieties of apples were on display, where a number experienced fruit growers were on hand to give advice on the growing of apples and had a go at identifying some 'unnamed' varieties! There were opportunities to buy apple products and local crafts as well as finding out how to keep bees and observing demonstrations on apple pressing and juicing, spinning and cider making. The special 'Apple' themed drama written by John Townsend and directed by Sue Rickman was expertly presented by drama students from The Chantry School. The Chantry School Orchestra played a medley of wellknown songs, whilst Grimley and Holt Primary School choir sang beautifully to an enthusiastic audience. 
entertainment and will even cater at your own home or event. Local Thai evenings are also being planned, so watch this space!!

In the Garden

Expect wet and windy weather and some very cold nights in the next few weeks. The shorter days mean less time to spend in the garden so try to fit in just a few key jobs. First, there is the tidying up. On a dry day, rake off dead leaves from lawns and check that your climbing plants are tied up securely so they don't get blown down in bad weather. Second, protection. Move tender plants in pots under cover as soon as possible and pile up a thick layer of compost or bark over any which are left in open ground. It is a good idea to raise any containers off the ground so that they are not left standing in cold water after rain. Third, pruning. At the end of November you can cut back deciduous hedges, but don't touch the ever green ones. You can also start winter pruning of currants, apples and pears, and cut autumn raspberries down to the ground. Cut your holly before the end of the month, when the birds strip the berries. The cut branches can be stood in water and covered with a black plastic bag, this way they will last until Christmas.(Credit for this tip goes to Pat Finch, I tried it successfully last year, thanks Pat!) Fourth and finally, planting. 'Remember, remember, plant tulips in November'. This year I shall be trying one of the short stemmed, red

varieties in a container. Taller tulips can give a wonderful splash of colour in the Spring, planted either in clumps of at least five bulbs, or, with more bulbs of a single variety scattered amongst other medium height plants throughout a border. Perennials, shrubs and trees can still be planted provided the ground is neither too cold nor very wet. They do need time to make some root growth before the weather gets really cold.
