

Martley & District Horticultural Society

The Society continues to thrive – more new faces at the February meeting! Mike Dunnett announced that a coach is ordered for the trip to Lord Heseltine's arboretum on 28 April, leaving Martley at 12.30, at a cost of £22. Also the flora photography course is getting under way; one of the Show trophies needs an additional tier (local person asked about making it); Mike's gardening advice was on pruning hydrangeas (2 types), and roses, and owing to the probable drought – lots of mulching for all sorts of plants! But be careful what your home-made compost contains, it's easy to throw in the wrong things. Jane Cropp gave her Topical Tips: orange and lemon trees and strawberry plant bargains, the latter being only £2 for 8 small ones. She also passed around a sample of a lovely early flowering clematis 'cirrhosa'. Derek Walker, a tulip specialist, was our main speaker and is well-known for his extremely colourful garden which surrounds his most attractive halftimbered and thatched cottage at Astley. This is modern but people guess it is 400 years old! He and his wife began the garden 18 years ago, previously supplying plants to the Local Authority. The talk progressed

from a series of slides with music of various aspects of this hillside garden, to many close-ups of the brilliant clumps of tulips, shown off by other spring flowers and shrubs, walls, steps and many other features. Every year the couple plant 20,000 new bulbs (they manage 5,000 a day) using a special dibber. 140 varieties of all colours go in, and of course visitors come from far and wide to feast their eyes on this amazing garden. Derek and his wife have also created a 3 ½ acre bird sanctuary attracting 78 varieties of birds and there is a Nature Centre in the garage with lots to see and learn about. One problem the walkers do have though is squirrels stealing their tulip bulbs! Derek reeled off many tulip names, not surprisingly he's known locally as Mr Tulip! A really good enjoyable talk which did us all good, thinking of the Spring to come! On 26 April Jill Whitehead speaks on 'Hidden Gardens of Herefordshire'. Not long now until the Plant Sale on 19 May, so please 'Get Growing'.

Martley Parish Council Minutes

Abbreviated Edited Draft Minutes of the Parish Council Meeting held on Monday 5 March 2012 Democratic Period/ Public Question Time

Thanks to the Village Hall Committee for installing a timer on the car park lights. District Cllr Williams was in receipt of a note from Rt Hon Greg Clark MP concerning Neighbourhood Planning. The Clerk will ensure that all Councillors receive a copy. MHDC Councillors had attended an "away day" to consider a strategic review on "shaping our future". The Chief Executive of MHDC had made a ward visit of two hours and was most impressed and as a result has requested a further visit. Also, they have received a grant application from Martley Youth Club and she commented that they would look at the application favourably.

Planning

11/01571/LBC, New window at Prickley Cottage, Martley, the Council fully support this application.

12/00125/LBC and 12/00123/DEM, Demolition of agricultural outbuildings associated with a Listed Farmhouse, the Council has no objections, however they would like the Conservation Officer to be consulted prior to approval.

Progress Reports

Hillside sign, WCC have said it is not financially viable to replace this sign. Peg House Wood, the owner has been contacted and agreed to carry out the work.

Car parking on pavement, an email was read out from the CSO and it was agreed to write to the homeowner concerned about this problem.

Bus Shelter, Three quotations were considered for the supply of the bus shelter and it was unanimously agreed to accept the quotation from Mr S Miles. A meeting will be arranged to agree installation of the base.

Speed Sign, A request has been received to hire the speed sign for use at Red Marley Hill Climb. It was agreed to hire the sign at a cost of £50. The hirer is to provide replacement insurance cover.

Diamond Jubilee

Cllr Gardner outlined the proposals of the Working Party. After discussion the Council unanimously agreed to a budget of £1,000 for the celebrations. Wichenford residents will be invited and a contribution has been requested from WPC. Additional Footpaths, an email was read out about the possible creation of some additional footpaths in the village. This will be referred to the Footpath Officer. A suggestion had been received to plant a commemorative tree. After discussion

it was agreed to purchase a "specimen" tree to be planted on the playing field with a suitable plaque.

Finance

The payments as circulated were unanimously approved and payments made to the value of £1,347.27. Cllr Studer reported on the Finance Committee meeting held on 21 February. Minutes will be displayed on the notice board and the next meeting will be held on 1 May.

Correspondence

MHDC Area CALC meeting, no one was available to attend. Planning Aid England, Cllr Cumella will attend this event. Letter concerning the work being carried out on the playing field – comments were noted

Lengthsman Duties

Work for March included, Clear drain at junction of B4202 and B4197 (full of straw). The Lengthsman had reported fouling by dogs on the footpath opposite Rogers Coaches. The Clerk is to obtain signs for each end of the pathway.

Several items will be dealt with on Hollins Lane. Clerk to itemise these to the Lengthsman.

Cllr's Reports

Cllr Gardner reported that the substation fencing had been further damaged. Cllr Cumella requested that the Parish Plan be included on the next agenda. He also reported a dangerous tree on the corner of Badger Close and as this tree is on land with no known owner the Clerk will report this to WCC. Cllr Studer commented on the poor quality of the printing for the

footpath map circulated with the Villager. The Clerk will report this to MHDC.

The next meeting will be held on Monday April 2 in the Library.

The NHS is under review and Councillor Williams is on the Joint Service Review Panel, reviewing options on hospital, health service, community and primary care.

Progress Reports

Highfields (sign)

The request for a new sign has been approved and a fingerpost sign will be

erected on the B4204 at the junction with Barbers Lane and at the Kings Green junction with Poplar Road. This work is scheduled to begin post April 2012.

Lengthsman

The Clerk has contacted Aquaclean and has asked for four drains to be jetted. These are located at Poplar Road, Ockeridge Corner, Willow Road and Venn Lane. The work will commence when the nights are lighter. Approval was given for residents around Kings Green to hold their own jubilee celebrations on the green. The Chairman has contacted the Fete Committee with an offer of a contribution towards the Jubilee.

The licence has been granted but certain restrictions have been put in place.

12/00011FUL Cob House fisheries (amendment). The PC received an amendment for the above application and our comments remain as previously. We agree with the planners that the land should only be used for the keeping of animals for visitor attraction only and are pleased that this has been suggested.

Applications approved, refused, withdrawn. None.

Applications to be considered. Application Number 12/00033/HOU. Detached double timber clad garage at Kenswick Mill Barn (approved) Finance The balance from 31 December to 31 January 2012 stands at £16,656.49. There were 6 cheques totalling £1,841 78 for approval. These included Lengthsman, Clerks salary and expenses, Councillors expenses for the bus shelter, and Martley PC Jubilee Celebrations. A request from Martley Parish council for a donation towards the fireworks for the Golden Jubilee was discussed. It was agreed that as Wichenford parishioners were also invited a donation of £250 towards the cost of the fireworks.

Memorial Hall

It was agreed at the Parish Council meeting that the Council would rather purchase the central heating boiler and radiators for the Memorial Hall than give a grant, therefore a cheque was written for £2220.

Nora Parsons Day Centre Grant

It was discussed and agreed that the Parish Council would like to make a donation to the Day Centre to help with their Jubilee celebrations.

Councillor's Reports And Items For Future Agendas

The extinguishment, creation and diversion of footpaths at Woodhall and Cob House have now gone through, although there appears to be some confusion as the old signs have not been removed and no map has been put on the stiles to allow you to find the new route.

Red Marley 2012

The Easter weekend sees the Annual Red Marley Hill Climb return to Walsgrave Farm at Great Witley. Over 150 entries for the event have been received from all over the country. including Wales, Scotland and Southern Ireland with ages from 17 to 76. The oldest motorcycle entered is a 1929 Norton! Among those entered are three ladies, Doctor Hermina Gray from Usk in Monmouthshire, Michelle Harding, who is the licensee of the Kangaroo Inn at Aston on Clun in Shropshire and twenty-one year old Leigh Carter from Vowchurch in Herefordshire. Both Hermina and Michelle have previously competed at the hill but this will be Leigh's first time and she will be riding her late grandfather's machine as a tribute to him and to raise money for the British Heart Foundation. Last year the event raised £25,000 for the Help for Heroes charity and prior to that, since the Hill Climb was resurrected in 2000, local charities have received in excess of £50,000 from the club and will benefit again this year. The weekend begins with an observed trial at 12.00noon on Sunday April 8 and the Hill Climb begins at 12.00 noon on Easter Monday. Entrance on Monday is £7.00 with children under ten free and there is no entrance fee for the trial on Sunday.

Longer, warmer days in April make it a good month for gardening, but keep an eye on the weather forecasts as late frosts can damage new growth and flowers on fruit trees in particular. I think that we will all welcome some April showers after so many dry months. Deadhead daffodils and other spring bulbs as they finish flowering, and apply some general fertiliser so the bulbs build up for next year. Make a note of any clumps of bulbs which are overcrowded, so that you can lift them and replant in the Autumn. There is still time to plant summer bulbs such as lilies and alliums, and you may find some end of season bargains as retailers try to clear their stocks. Keep deadheading winter pansies, they should then keep flowering until early summer. Spring flowering shrubs such as forsythia and quince need to be pruned as soon as flowering finishes because next year's flowers form on the new growth. Without pruning the shrubs become very large, with all the flowers at the tips. Prune pentstemons and lavender by cutting them off just above the new growth, this will keep the plants compact. Ivy can be pruned hard, taking off any bushy growth at the tips. Salad leaves and spring onions can be sown outside now and main crop potatoes can go out in the second half of the month. Repeat sowings of broad beans, peas and carrots will give you a late summer crop. Indoors you can sow courgettes, sweetcorn, brassicas, runner beans, french beans and outdoor tomatoes. I recently came across a seed stockist with one hundred and forty varieties of tomato, now there's a challenge for a gourmet with a large greenhouse! A lovely Spring Garden Visit, Bodenham Arboretum near Kidderminster has acres of daffodils, followed later by primroses and bluebells. There is a beautiful display of spring blossom on magnolias, cherries and crab apples. On April 10 they are hosting a 4 mile Breast Cancer Charity walk and on April 14 they will be holding a Plant Fair from 11am until 5pm

In the last couple of years I have returned to one of my teenage pastimes,

that of fishing. What a letdown you say, you thought it would be much more exciting than that! Well, to a fisherman it is exciting. When I mention this to people I get the usual groans and laughter which a lot of fishermen get but there is something about sitting by a lake, a riverbank or on the seashore and casting your line wondering what will come on the other end, or if you will catch anything at all. I take great comfort from the fact that Jesus called fishermen to be his disciples. Peter and Andrew, James and John were all fishermen. They left their nets and followed him, but after his death they returned to their fishing, sitting on the lake contemplating what had happened. Jesus had died, reports of his resurrection abounded, some of them claimed to have seen him, but what next? One particular disciple, Peter, had also had to come to terms with his denial of his friend and Lord. That night they caught nothing, but in the morning there was someone on the seashore telling them to cast their nets on the other side of the boat. After doing this their nets were full.
