
Friends and family are all very welcome to join us. The competition this time is for a photograph of a Worcestershire view.

I was extremely surprised to see in my free copy of Berrows Journal of 25 August in Mike Grundy's column of extracts from Berrows Journal of the past, 100 years ago, the following edited extract: "To cruise for a fortnight amidst the magnificent scenery of the Norwegian fjords is the recipe for a well-rounded holiday. The feature of the Orient Cruise holiday is the size and magnificence of the vessel employed. The Otranto is a twin-screw steamer of 12,124 tons and the accommodation aboard is palatial. First class only are carried, fares

ranging from 12 guineas upwards, information from local agencies in Worcester." The surprise was that the Otranto was the troopship on which I sailed from Singapore in late August 1946, 35 years after the extract first appeared, and 65 years ago, to be demobbed. No first class travel for the many hundreds of servicemen travelling home, except for me (a mere corporal) who volunteered, against all military advice, to help in the ship's hospital. So I had 1st class food and accommodation, and was treated as a member of the crew!

Martley Recreation Association and Parish Council-playing field Grants update.

We have ordered a basket swing, two new baby swing seats and a tower for the new donated slide. This will leave some additional money for bark, logs and fence changes. A log costs £250+ vat so if you have large log that you have recently cut down or has blown down in the wind, and would be suitable and could deliver it to the playing field, it would be greatly appreciated.

Community spaces 2nd stage

We have received a development grant for a landscape architect, survey and planning permission. The PC have very kindly agreed to be our accountable body and will deal with the financial transactions when and if we get the grant. We have also been given the help of a facilitator, who is guiding us through the 2nd stage application process. The plan is for a community games area at the side of the existing play area. This will hopefully have goals, basket ball hoops and multi sport markings which will installed on Astroturf. The area will be fenced and secure to save adventurous balls going into the play area. The excess soil from the base will be used for bike track mounds. It will require planning permission, so fingers crossed for success as this will not be changing the use of the area. Also some amazing news from Ringway, the tarmac company who resurfaced our roads recently have agreed to donate the porous base for the games area. This is an amazing donation and not only does it save us thousands of pounds from the grant but allows for other items to be bought for the playing field. We cannot thank Ringway enough for their generosity, and as an added bonus they are also donating the labour costs free of charge!!They are so enthusiastic about this, so we are just waiting for planning permission and if we get the go ahead they will put down the porous base even before we get the grant! This will mean there will be a basic unmarked 'playground' until we can build the rest of the plans, hopefully by beginning of 2012. Please can you contact me if you have any suggestions, concerns, offers of help for future youth input, sports or organisations who would use this area or donations in kind. We have also been promised a donation of a heavy duty picnic table too, so things really are looking promising!

Martley's Past HMS Teviot

I was intrigued to get the following email from Andrew Martin son of Lt Andrew McBryde Martin. I can understand why it came to me as Martley was the only place mentioned, Martley Rural District Council was the forerunner of Malvern Hills District



C o u n c i l which came into being in the 1970's.. E m a i l follows...... My father Lt A n d r e w M c B r v d e

Martin commanded the Teviot when she was seconded to the South African Navy. A report follows of her somewhat short service whilst being manned by her South African crew

and commanded by my father. As there was a shortage of manpower in the Royal Navy the SANF agreed to man HMS Teviot and HMS Swale. River Class anti submarine frigates. After retiring HMS Teviot was recommissioned with an all SANF crew at Capetown in 1945, but still remained the property of the British Admiralty. She sailed on the 19 June 45 from Durban when she arrived via Diego Suarez on 2 July. She then joined the East Indies Escort Command in Colombo and after a paint job in camouflage colours immediately began a four week work up period. She was then employed as a link and mark ship on the aircraft route between Colombo and Rangoon. Sadly as she sailed up the Irrawaddy river enroute to Rangoon she struck an uncharted submerged wreck and suffered considerable damage. HMS Teviot was patched up at Rangoon and repaired at Trincomalee and then returned to Durban, arrived in December 1945. When the Teviot was returned to the Royal Navy although Lt Martin admitted it, the Teviot Plaque was taken from the officers ward room where it stood on display. Lt Martin commanded vessels through the war years and Lt Martin always had a special affinity for the ship. I served in the SA Navy in 1968 where I completed my National Service. The

Captain of the ship on which I served had served under my father Lt Martin on the Teviot as a midshipman! He told me that when the collision occurred had it not been for the prompt action of my father forcing the closure of watertight doors she would not have been saved. My father, when I discussed this with him was very modest and would never admit to his part in shaving the ship. I can only deduce that he needed the plaque as a memento all though for some reason we were never allowed to have it on display at home! Lt Martin was a hard task master who always was reputed to have the best food on any ship! When he was serving in the Med on convoy guards, the then Admiral of the Royal Navy Med Fleet judged his ship as the finest run ship in the entire fleet.

I then looked in minute book of the
Parish Council from 1942...PC
Meeting 9 Jan 1942. The Chairman
read a letter from the Martley Rural
District Savings Committee in which
was extended an invitation of the PC
to send a representative to a meeting
in connection with Warship week. No
representative was appointed but the
Parish Clerk promised to inform the
Chairman about what had been
decided at the meeting. PC meeting 20
February 1942, the Clerk informed the

meeting about the arrangements being made in connection with Warship Week. Warship Week Investment, it was decided to transfer the amount in the deposit account at the bank into the post office Savings Bank, The Clerk was instructed to proceed with the matter, the sum involved was £30-0-11) Martley's contribution along with around 22 other parishes contributions in the District Council helped with the adoption of the ship the HMS Teviot.

Martley Parish Council Edited draft unapproved Minutes of the Parish Council held on 25th July 2011 at the Memorial Hall Martley

There were 2 applications for the Clerk's position, both will be interviewed and references requested. The Freedom of Martley nominations were made and the Clerk will contact those who had put themselves forward. The Recreation Association (RA) questioned the recent letter sent to them by the Parish Council which asked a number of questions around Health & Safety requirements and requested copies of a number of documents in relation to the pavilion. They provided all the answers to the questions and advised that the documentation would be available at the next meeting of the RA. They will also advise the date for the next meeting.

Outstanding Actions

The letter has been drafted requesting potential storage sites for the salt and the contact details for all local farms are being collated.

Progress reports

Clerk: Nigel Potter is looking to meet with District Councillor Williams shortly to discuss possibility of a potential site for development in Martley. A check to ensure the dumped tyres on Hollins Lane have gone. An email with concerns over potential claims against farmers if they grit the roads in bad weather has been forwarded to the department concerned. The rotten Hillside sign has been reported and the adoption process for the phone box in the centre of the village has commenced. PC will start the process for the phone box at Berrow Green shortly. The speed limit review is still causing concern in the village including Ankerdine Hill. The League of Veterans Cycle Group has acknowledged the Councils complaint and will respond in due course. The landowner (adj to Ham Bridge) and the PC are meeting to discuss the overgrowth that is causing visibility issues at Ham Bridge. A number of companies have come back with response o the letter regarding the abuse of the weight restriction on Ankerdine asking for registration plates. Worcestershire County Council are no longer willing to commit to funding the lowering of the curb at Hollins Lane.

Lengthsman, Has cut the grass at the sawmills and at other various locations and he has also picked up the litter at Ham Bridge. Councillors are communicating with the County Council regarding the location for the Vehicle Activated Speed sign. It was also noted that at the Nora Parsons Day Centre AGM it was reported that the Centre was running well. There are some planned road closures within Martley and/or its surrounding area to allow for Highways work and there are also some changes to some of the local bus services 356 and 359, these will be published on the village notice board.

Unapproved draft minutes of an Ordinary meeting of the Parish Council held on Monday 15 August 2011 in the Memorial Hall, Wichenford

District and County Councillors Report

Holt Bridge is now fully open and the lights have been removed until October when they will return for a few weeks. Once the bridge is fully operational the weight limit will be removed. The County Council are trying to get funding from the

government to improve broadband in rural areas. The two sites recommended by the Parish Council for the VAS have been turned down by the highways department. The only available site in Wichenford is near the telephone kiosk on the green. The sign will go up on 1st September 2011. Our new local police officer is PC Paul Lambon. The SWDP will be going to consultation in September/October. There is no new development or planning proposed in Wichenford.

Progress Reports Damaged Railings

Work had been started on these railings, however this work seems to have ceased, investigations will be made as to why work has not been completed. The missing gully on the B4204 outside Hill Farm drive has been reported.

No reply has been received regarding the Parish Councils response to the letter received. It was noted that a planning application has been advertised for a premises licence. This will not come before the council, but will be advertised in the local press. Once it is advertised the council have a limited amount of time to object if they wish. It has been brought to the PC attention that Lingens Cottage is in a bad state of repair and some action needs to be taken soon before it falls / or is knocked down. The clerk will ask the DC what if any action can be taken

The creation of an email database via which communications can be quickly passed to parishioners, with the hope that they in turn can pass on the information to friends and neighbours who may not have access to email and the appointment of a Martley Parish Neighbourhood Watch Coordinator. This person would have the important role of liaising with the Local Policing Unit and the Parish Council, compiling a newsletter and then distributing this via Neighbourhood Watch database. In the Garden

Autumn has finally arrived, it is definitely colder and there is a chance of an early frost. You need to start bringing tender plants indoors, and don't forget to check over the plants as you bring them in so that you don't also import their pests. Look out for scale insects, mealy bugs and red spider mite. The first frost tells you that it is time to lift tender plants such as dahlias and cannas, remember last winter and don't take any chances with precious specimens!. You can reduce feeding and watering of houseplants now too as the days get shorter growth slows down. In the flower garden, cut back perennials and lift and divide any which are becoming overcrowded. Now is a good time to put in new perennials, before the ground gets too cold and wet. There is still time to plant spring-flowering bulbs and spring bedding, In the vegetable garden October is the time to clear up, but also a good time to put in container -grown fruit trees and bushes. If you only have limited space, go for fruit! Hergest Croft Gardens, Kington has a special RHS Event day on Apples on 15 October, followed by a Plant Fair on 16 October. Also on 15 October there are Apple Fairs at Leominster and at Kemerton near Tewksbury, and a Cider festival at the Cider Museum, Hereford.

Since I was a child I have experienced not only this seasonal change but between 1968 and 1971 the clocks were not put back to GMT and became known as British Standard Time. Some may remember during the second world war there was double summer time, the clocks one hour ahead of GMT in the winter. It all started with a man called William Willett who rode his horse each morning only to see people 'wasting' the daylight as they were still in bed with the sun shining. He asked the government to review this but never saw the clocks change as he died before it happened. It eventually came about as a result of war. During WW1 the Germans changed their times to save energy and Britain followed suit. As to the benefits of these changes arguments are still discussed. Time is the dimension we are fascinated by, with HG Wells time machine and Doctor Who being the domain of our fantasies of such travel. One thing the Bible is certain about in is that God has ordained a time for everything (Ecclesiastes chapter 3) famously set to music and sung by no less than Pete Seeger and the Byrds. God, we are told has out times, in his hands (Psalm 31:15) and watches over us. We are called to make the most of the time given to us (Ephesians 5:15), and to use it wisely. It does not mean that we are to be constantly working but like Mr Willets we are to enjoy the time, as he did on his early morning rides appreciating God's creation. As we live our lives let us not panic that time is going by too quickly, (and we all say it) but rather let us appreciate each day God gives us and enter into eternity even now, as God promises eternal life, now. For eternity is a place of no time, a place of a quality of existence beyond our understanding and comprehension, that one day when we leave this life controlled by time we enter into eternity with Jesus in whom we have trusted our lives with in time. As we live in this light, the present time takes on a new light and quality. There is much about eternity we cannot see in this life but we can taste its flavour as we change the spiritual clock to live in the light of its hope. God bless you all.
