#### Martley and District Horticultural Society


As our Chairman and Vice Chairman were both away, the first part of February's meeting was conducted by our joint secretaries, Pam Minchin and Margaret Jackson. Pam stressed the need for help at the Annual Show (20 August), both from 8.30am (the morning preparation jobs) and in the afternoon during the show itself. She also pointed out the pile of free gardening magazines, these are most interesting. Margaret gave two useful tips, feed your Hostas, and when visiting Garden Centres check the 'sick bay', as sometimes you'll find a decent plant which just needs some TLC. Several members had brought garden tools for our main speaker, William Scott, as his talk was 'Tool Sharpening for the Light Hearted' and he had with him various sharpening devices in order to demonstrate how to keep hand tools in good working order. Mowers, he said, are best left to the professionals. William is quite an old hand at honing and grinding, he sharpened all the school tools where his father had a teaching job. Use of oil stones, diamond stones, a small vice, steel wool (dipped in oil), sandstone and steel 'butcher's knife' sharpeners were all explained and some items passed around. "One blade, one side" was his tip and wait until you feel a 'burr' on the edge of the blade. Best to wear goggles when using a grindstone! Shears, loppers, secateurs etc went back to their owners very much better than when they arrived at the Hall. William also showed how to sharpen screwdrivers and drill bits. Axes, spades, hoes etc mainly keep themselves right, but still need taking care of, and all tools should be cleaned, have screws oiled and be safely locked up. An excellent speaker and we all went home light-hearted!

Please take note of some of our future events: A Quiz Night will be held on the 27 April at Inkberrow (team members required) and at the 28 April meeting, we have the speaker Susan Russell and she will be discussing 'Plants for Difficult Places'. On the 21 May is the Plant Sale, plants required please.

#### Martley's Past

1872, **Monday 23 September** Girls' School quote, "I, Eliza Grant, commenced my duties as mistress of this school. The attendance at the opening was very thin, the hoppicking not being finished. Miss Hastings visited the school."

Monday 7 October "The children had their annual treat at the Rectory, it being the Harvest Thanksgiving. Attended the Divine Service in the morning. Attendance very large"(!) Miss Grant's last entry just said, "Miss Hastings took the practice this afternoon." The next entry, on 5 October 1874 was made by Mr M Coleman, the Boys' School head, who wrote," I, Michael Coleman, commenced my duties as master of this school (the girls' school. ALB) until such time as the managers can

appoint a mistress. The lower classes of boys and girls (probably infants ALB) are in the charge of Mrs Coleman and pupil-teacher." Did Miss Grant die suddenly?

Fundamentals from British Gymnastics Now Available in Worcester



FUNdamentals, the new 'Movement Ideas for Early Years' Programme developed by the British

Gymnastics in conjunction with early years specialists is coming to Martley in March 2011. FUNdamentals has been designed and developed by the British Gymnastics Association in conjunction with early year's specialists to help younger children from toddler to 5 years to acquire essential physical, social and emotional life skills. This is in a bid to get children involved in sport at younger ages and so help to combat the obesity crisis. Supported by Lord Sebastian Coe, the programme aims to provide fun activities and learning for the early years child. During the sessions, children are transported into a world where 'Funky Cat' leads them in a range of physical and musical activities. At the end of each term, children receive badges, certificates and medals to recognise their efforts and encourage them to progress further as well as to evidence participation and learning. The main aim of this Fundamental scheme is for children to learn that movement and activity is fun and enjoyable. This will encourage children's interest in all types of sport and will lead to healthier, active children, and fitter adults. Teme Valley Children's Centre are working in conjunction with Fundamentals to provide 2 separate sessions for children and their parents in the local area to attend. The sessions will be running on Tuesday mornings at Martley Village Hall from 1<sup>st</sup> March 2011 until 24<sup>th</sup> May 2011. The Clerk will contact Malvern Art products to arrange for the Freedom of Martley lettering to be done and for the delivery of the 3M speed sign. A reply from Festival Housing regarding the length of time it took to repair the lift over Christmas at Heaton House is still outstanding.

#### **Progress Reports:**

The Clerk

PC Hood was due to attend tonight's

meeting to provide an update regarding the authorisation of cycle races, a planned speed review for Ankerdine, the re-invigoration of the Youth Forum and the blocking of the lane at Sheldon House. Unfortunately, PC Hood sent his apologies, the Clerk will ask for an update from him.

An outdoor smart water pack has been given to the Recreation Association.

Confirmation has been received that the herbicide spraying was carried out by Vales who were contracted on behalf of Worcester County Council. They are hopeful that next year the spraying will be done by Malvern Hills District Council representatives which should alleviate any repeats of the same circumstances.

An update was read out with regard to YIMMS (Youth in Martley Matters) which confirmed that future events will be self-funded. The next event is likely to be in May.

The temporary map had been put in the Village but unfortunately it blew down in the wind, investigations will be taken forward towards funding possibilities for a permanent map.

Julie Annand from Festival Housing has been updated with regard to recent events at Nash Close. The Clerk will chase Highways regarding the empty grit bin on Pudford Lane opposite the entrance to Pudford Farm.

#### Lengthsman

The Lengthsman submitted his invoice and work schedule for the work completed in January 2011. The list for this month reads; clear lay-by at Hillside (monthly), repair grips opposite Shingledale, Hillside, clear leaves from Pudford Lane and remove low hanging branch from tree on Barbers Lane.

## District and County Councillor's reports:

Quarterly Performance Report. Every three months an internal review of the performance to assess whether we are achieving our objectives and also, importantly, to flag up any potential issues. The third quarterly Performance Update has now been completed and I am pleased to report that overall, we have maintained our high level of performance and are continuing to make good progress with our four priorities. (full details available online)

## **County Councillor Davies reported** the following:

Worcester County Council is due to announce a council tax freeze for the next financial year. Acknowledged receipt of the agreement for Martley to share the County Council vehicle activated speed sign, recently purchased by County Councillor Davies for use in his parishes.

Governors at The Chantry High School have commenced the preliminary process in consideration of academy status for the school; they have submitted an application to the Secretary of State. Consultation will take part during the process with parents, staff and the parish. The speed review covering the area of Martley has been undertaken and the proposals put forward from the review were summarised briefly by County

Councillor Davies. Councillor Goodyear, Councillor Gale and Councillor McHugh will meet with County Councillor Davies within the next week to discuss the review in more detail. An update at the next meeting.

The Clerk will record any road traffic accidents that parishioners or Councillors report from now on. In order to report an incident the date, time, and location must be given.

Payment of the invoice for the electricity for the Weighbridge was agreed.

**Urgent decisions since the last meeting:** No urgent decisions have been made since the last meeting.

### Councillor's reports and items for future agenda:

A parking issue was raised at the entrance into the footpath by the new bungalows at Heaton House. Clerk to advise of obstruction.

The Clerk has reported that whilst Ankerdine was closed to cut down trees recently it would have been beneficial for all hedges to have also been trimmed at the same time, both privately and publicly owned. Also, the brash and branches that were left on the embankment have since caused a hazard in the road as they were moved by the strong winds.

Clerk is to report tyres in the corner of Hollins Lane and Willow Road and the tree hanging down through Newtown opposite The Orchard.

#### Wichenfords History

Henry & Joseph Noxon grant of leave to erect a cottage 1690.

Where Henry Noxon & Joseph Noxon of the parish of Wychenford in the County of Worcester, tailors, have petitioned for leave of the Lord of the Manor of Wychenford to erect a Cottage upon the Waste at Rosses Green, in the said Manor where was an ancient Cottage lately demolished. It is, with the consent of the Inhabitants of the said parish agreed betwixt John Prier Steward of the said Manor on the part & behalf of the Lord thereof, that the said Henry & Joseph have leave to erect the said intended Cottage on the said ground

where the said demolished Cottage stood, and to enclose the ground, which was heretofore a little Orchard & garden thereunto adjoining. And in consideration thereof they then said Henry & Joseph their Executors & Assignes and such others as shall occupy or inhabit upon the premises shall pay yearly upon the feast day of St Michael the sum of two shillings, and upon the first day of January yearly a couple of fat capons which money shall by paid yearly to the Bailiff of the said Manor for the use of the said Lord & his Successors, and the said capons delivered yearly at the Lord Bishop's Palace in Worcester to the hands of the said Lord Bishop's Cook, or other servant there then residing. In pursuance whereof the said Henry & Joseph do hereby oblige themselves their Executors Assignes to the due performance of the said Agreement & paying the said rents in manner aforesaid in the sum of five pounds to be paid to the Lord Bishop & his successors in the case of non performance whereof the said partners have hereunto set their hands & seals the 26<sup>th</sup> day of September 1690. Sealed & signed in the presence of Jo Pedley, J Price, Edw Thrupp, Hen Noxon, Edw Noxon and Joseph Noxon. Note: this cottage still stands and forms part of Orchard Cottage

Suzanne was many things to many people and perhaps it is true that the brightest, most brilliant stars may only shine for the shortest time, but I ask that you do not grieve at her passing, but smile instead that you met her. #### General News and Reports Around Our Area

#### Red Marley Hill Climb 2011

The famous Red Marley Hill Climb has been run on Easter Monday at Great Witley since the early 1920's and apart from the war years it continued until 1971. In 2000 the West Midland section of the AJS & Matchless Owners Club revived the event but the following year it had to be cancelled due to the foot and mouth outbreak. For 2002 the club had to move to a new venue at Walsgrove Farm as the original hill was no longer available. The running of the Hill Climb has since been taken over by the Red Marley Hill Climb Club Ltd. Over the years the format of the meeting has changed and now it is open only to Classic Motorcycles built before 1971 and there is a class for rigid framed machines built pre-1950. The bikes race up the 440 yard hill four at a time with the first two progressing through to the next round until only four are left to contest the finals in each class. Around 180 riders are expected to compete this year. coming from all over the country. Entries for this years meeting have been received from as far away as Scotland and Southern Ireland and range in age from 16 to 74 and some of the machines racing date back to the 1930's. The fastest ever climb was recorded in 2009 by Carl Pope in a time of 19.53 seconds and Carl will be going flat out to improve his time and keep hold of the "Silver Helmet" for

another year. Every Year the club have made donations to local charities and good causes and since 2000 more than £50,000 has been handed out. Martley has benefited from donations to the Care fund, Play Group and Preschool group over the years. This year the main beneficiary will be the Help for Heroes fund and opening the proceedings and presenting the awards will be John Peters who was shot down in his Tornado aircraft during the Gulf war in Iraq. On Easter Sunday there will be a Classic motorcycle trial starting at mid-day, which there is admission charge, and the Hill climb on Easter Monday will again start at noon and admission is £7.00 with free entry for children under 10.

In fact it's not just about saving money; the greenhouse gas emissions associated with food and drink waste is the equivalent of approximately 20 million tonnes of carbon dioxide per year, which is the equivalent of 1 in 4 cars on UK roads. Research released by WRAP (Waste & Resources Action Programme) in 2009 showed that over 8 million tonnes of food and drink is wasted in UK homes every year, that's enough to fill Wembley Stadium eight times. Just think of all that good food and money going straight in the bin. Viktoria Salisbury, Senior Waste Prevention Officer at Worcestershire County Council said "We throw food out for two main reasons: we cook or prepare too much or food goes off

#### Compost Bins

Now is the perfect time to install another compost bin into your garden. Composting is easy to do, and transforms green waste into a free, valuable and nutrient rich food for your garden as well as reducing the amount of waste sent to landfill. Compost helps soil to retain moisture as well as preventing water logging. Ideally have two bins, so while one is maturing, you can start filling the second! While it's inadvisable to put cooked food waste into a regular compost bin without attracting vermin, you can put small amounts into a wormery along with other kitchen waste, and paper. You wont get large amounts of compost from this system, but small amounts of very rich worm casts which are a great plant food.
