### Martley Parish Council

An ordinary meeting of the Martley Parish Council was held on Monday 1 November 2004 at the Memorial Hall: Cllr Mr. D. Cropp Chairman. In attendance were also 10 members of the public.

### The Democratic Period/Public **Ouestion Time**

A parishioner raised the matter of Taylor's yard development, Worcester Road, and declared that she had heard that none of the houses were to be designated as low-cost housing. The Chairman explained that no approval had been given yet and that he and the Clerk had attended the last planning meeting to speak in favour of the development, which then included 50% low-cost housing. He invited the parishioner to join him at the next MHDC planning meeting. D Cllr Mrs. B .Williams will also attend this and support the Sect 106 agreement (housing association) for this development. A parishioner enquired about the latest position of The Crown car park. The Clerk read out the handdelivered letter from Mr. C. Bocock (Chief Exec. MHDC), which referred

to the change of detail on the planning application and the lighting of large bonfires. A parishioner raised the MHDC rebate notification (council tax) and expressed a view that it seemed ridiculous that the cost of notifying the public exceeded the cost of the rebate. The Chairman and C.Cllr Mr. A. Davies explained that the rebate was at the national government's direction and that it had to be paid within the fiscal period; MHDC is only the charging authority. It was resolved to accept the minutes as a true record.

The Clerk presented the revised list of duties

#### District Councillor's Report

District Cllr Mrs. B. Williams mentioned that it had been brought to her attention that the footpath near Hillcrest, Ankerdine was overgrown; the Clerk to notify the Path-or-Nones. The waste bin at Collins Green is overgrown; the Clerk will arrange for the Lengthman to investigate and clear.

#### County Councillor's Report:

County Cllr. Mr. A. Davies welcomed the official opening of the library. On the matter of Ankerdine Hill, he has met Mr. Hanchard and discussed the issue. The Police Authority statistics show that crime continues to be reduced in the area. The report on schools in Martley has been done and forecasts a slow decline in numbers based on the demographics. The report on road safety/camera partnership shows accidents down 61% in the camera sites. The Worcester orbital ring road is currently being discussed with Worcester City Council. The Chairman mentioned that The Old Grammar School Foundation had recently given out 38 grants which is very creditable to our young people in Martley.

### Barn Dances Explained

What is a barn dance? Sometimes known as a Hoedown, it is a mix of dances done in differing formations - lines, circles, squares, partner dances etc. The nature of most dances is that you dance with your own partner but progress to meet other couples with whom you repeat the dance or do a particular movement.

The caller is the person who is a cross between a dance instructor and Master of Ceremonies. His or her main duty is to 'call' the dances. They call a 'runthrough' of the dance before the music starts up, then during the dance they 'call' the moves as a reminder to the dancers of what to do next. They know that most dancers have little or no experience of folk or country dances so it's important to keep moves simple, especially early on, and adapt the dances to suit the abilities of the dancers. The Caller also has a few tricks up his or her sleeve to 'persuade'

the more reluctant participants up on to the floor, in the full knowledge that some dancers will get things 'wrong'! The caller is the one to whom everyone looks for leadership qualities - and is there to be pointed at if they gets it wrong. Why not try and join us at the NEXT Village Hall Barn Dance?



An Ordinary Meeting of the Parish Council held on Monday 27 September 2004 at 7.30pm in the Memorial Hall Wichenford. Councillor Britten-Long chaired the meeting

#### Reports

District and County Councillor Reports.

The County Councillor did not attend and no report was given. District Councillor Williams reported that they're all challenging efforts into CPA (an OFSTED-type inspection) and the results will be known in a few weeks time. The Local Plan first deposit has been approved with a few slight amendments, no settlement boundaries are to be extended. The second deposit is now due.

### Matters Arising

Refuse Lorries: The smaller caged vehicle is now collecting from Highfields Lane. A meeting was set up with the highways department on Kingsgreen. We were advised that it would be unlikely that a speed

restriction could be enforced, but it may be possible to extend it behind the high school. We could get a blue advisory notice saying "Single track lane - no passing".

Lengthsman Scheme: The Clerk has spoken to Mr Clay, who is permitted to be self-employed. He will also be asked to get his own Public Liability Insurance. The Clerk was asked to write to Mr Clay offering him the position on a three-month trial basis and send a copy of the letter from the insurance company regarding Public Liability. The Clerk was asked to speak to the Highways Department to find out when the next training session is and to do a draft contract for services.

Start-up grant: The sum of £900.00 has been received from the County Council for the Parish Path Partnership Scheme. ### Nostalgia For Christmas Past

"Christmas is coming the goose is getting fat, please to put a penny in the old man's hat" - the words of a song we sang as children, but I have no idea who the old man referred to was. It came into my head the other day and took me back to my childhood Christmases. There was none of today's hype which seems to start earlier with every passing year. Lights and decorations, often in abundance, are put up after the August bank holiday with shops, garden centres and even private houses all vying with each other to be the first to get their Christmas tree up and the lights on.

When I was a child, Christmas lasted just a few days. Of course Christmas puddings, mince meat and the cake were made in the autumn - actually home made - not bought. Poultry was plucked (goose, duck or capon - there were few turkeys in the early 1940s) a few days before the great day. 23 December was dedicated to cooking: pastry, jellies, trifles and stuffings were produced, all the children helped and it was 'God help you' if you nicked anything!

Christmas Eve was a joyous day, presents were wrapped up in any available recycled paper, the tree was decorated in the afternoon while listening to the service of Nine Lessons and Carols from King's College Cambridge on the "wireless" (no radio then and TV was invented, but certainly not available) paper decorations were made and strung around the sitting room. Of course, war was on and so all real glass baubles and paper chains, dull-looking tinsel and, believe it or not, real candles in metal clip holders (there are laws against such things these days). These decorations were all bought before the war started and were lovingly wrapped and stored away from year to year.

Christmas morning began early, us children were awake sometime in the middle of the night to see what was in our stockings, pillow cases for us, which contained some exotic fruit such as oranges and tangerines! (these were only available at that time of year), new socks, the odd pencil case or fountain pen, no expensive gadgets to be bought on the yet unheard of credit card.

Christmas morning meant church. There were no bells ringing or Midnight Mass in the silent blackout of wartime Britain. Church was followed by the great feast which had to be over and cleared away by three o'clock when we all sat around to listen to the King's broadcast to the Nation. After that, light-heartedness set in again as Mum doled out our presents, one at a time so that each one of us



could see what the others had got. The evening was always spent eating what few sweets and chocolates our meagre ration cards had allowed and drinking home made wine while playing New Market. We only played this at Christmas

and Dad had quietly saved up all his halfpennies for us to bet with. Boxing Day was a really quiet affair, Dad and the boys went shooting or following the hunt, if one was held locally, and everyone else sat around and ate the left-overs. Christmas had lasted just about three days not three months and everyone was happily sated and no one was fed up with the hype and glad it was all over.



### **Port and Prune Fool**

A good way of using up any left over port! Don't dismiss this because of the prunes—they can make a good dessert, honestly!

284 ml (10fl oz) double cream 1 x 439g can prunes, stoned 4 tablespoons port 50g (2oz) soft brown sugar grated nutmeg chopped walnuts to decorate

- 1. Chop the prunes.
- 2. Whip the cream until stiff.
- 3. Fold the port and prunes into the cream and add sugar and nutmeg to taste.
- 4. Spoon the mixture into individual glasses and chill. Decorate with the nuts before serving

You could also use no-soak prunes and soak them in the port for a couple of hours or so before making the fool.

### In the Garden



### **Garden Tips for December**

December, the month to study the seed catalogues and to prepare for next year by digging in the compost, checking the lime content of the soil (with a simple kit that can be obtained from the garden centres), renewing fences and posts and generally tidying up ready for Spring.

The rhubarb needs a covering of compost, straw or a good dressing of manure. Take cuttings of hardwood plants such as gooseberries, black, red and white currants; weigela, spirea, lonicera, forsythia cotoneaster. To do this, open up a narrow channel in the soil, fill with coarse sand and insert cuttings, six to eight inches, leave half of the length above ground. Split up and transplant herbaceous plants. Time to prune apple trees and tidy up damson and plum trees. Brassicas will need some protection from the pigeons looking for an easy meal.

Check apples, potatoes, carrots etc that are put in store for rot and damage by vermin. Plant out roses, conifers and hedging plants.
