1739: 4th; Baptism of Wm, (Spurious) son of Eliz -

1772: 27th; Marriage of Wm. - (Sojourner, Wid) and Mary - (Sojourner)

1879: 3rd; School lessons were stopped in the afternoon at 3.30, at which hour the Rev J P Hastings and the Misses Hastings came in the school. Mr Coleman (Master) presented Miss Eleanor Hastings with a salver on behalf of the Teachers and scholars of the schools, as a mark of their affection and esteem on her approaching marriage.

1887: 15th; Half Holiday given to the girls in order to prepare the classroom for a concert.

1894: 4th; The first Parish Meeting held in the Board Room of the Union. 15 nomination papers were handed in

for the nine councillors required. After a short period of questioning, voting took place – with a show of hands!

1895: 20th; School closed at noon for a week. 30th; reopened with rather poor attendance.

1933: 18th; The Annual Missionary Meeting was held in The Chantry Hall at 7pm. Mr Hain from Tanganiyika gave a lantern lecture on his work in Africa for 20 years and very interesting it was. The collection at the end was 12s 9d (63p). (Written by Rev Hastings).

St Richard's Hospice Lights of Love

Lights of love will be shining across Worcestershire again this year on three St Richard's Hospice Christmas trees in Worcester, Malvern and Droitwich. Everyone is invited to make a donation and dedicate a light for love whether in memory of a loved one, celebration of a birth or for someone who will be absent this Christmas, but is still in your thoughts. Dedications can be made until Wednesday, 21 December.

The Lights of Love will be switched on in Worcester on Friday, 18 November. The celebration evening will start with a special Service of Light at Worcester Cathedral at 7pm followed by a candlelit procession to the Christ-

mas tree in nearby St Andrew's Spire (Glovers Needle), Deansway, Worcester. Last year more than 800 people filled the cathedral for the service. The spire is the perfect place for the switching on ceremony and a place for those choosing to sit and reflect.

Monday November 7 2005 at the memorial hall

Present: Cllr. Mr G. Taylor (vice chairman); Cllr. Mr. R. McHugh; Cllr Mr. G. Coombey-Jones; Cllr. Mr. M. Nott; Cllr. Mrs. D. Goodyear; Cllr. Mrs. M. Randall. In Attendance: Mr. T. Pearsall (Clerk to The Parish Council), seven members of the public.

In the absence of Chairman Cllr. Mr. D. Cropp, Vice Chairman Cllr. Mr. G. Taylor was confirmed as the meeting Chairman.

The chairman asked everyone present to stand and observe one minute's silence and remember Mrs. Margaret Wickens, a previous long standing chairman and Parish Councillor, who died recently.

The clerk read out a eulogy prepared by Cllr. Mr. D. Cropp.

The democratic period/public question time

The chairman invited all present to ask questions or make statements about Parish business, the following points were raised:

A parishioner stated that there is no pedestrian provision from The Hillside to the Village centre and requested that the Parish Council investigate the provision of signs; the clerk to write to Highways and include all pedestrian routes into the Village.

A parishioner informed the Parish Council of recent antisocial behaviour by youths on the playing field and in

the centre of the village. These incidents had been reported to the police, but no action had been taken. The chairman informed the meeting that, at present, this council has no powers to issue antisocial behaviour orders, but this may change in the future; the clerk to write to the police beat manager to discover why no action was taken. He emphasised that all such incidents should be reported to the police.

The Parish Council Meeting was opened by the chairman at 8:15 pm.

Apologies: There were apologies from Cllrs. D. Cropp, N. Stammers and J. Slough; these were accepted.

Declarations of Personal or Prejudicial Interests: The Clerk reminded everyone of the need to declare interests and to keep their list up to date. There were no interests declared.

District Councillor's Report: District Councillor Mrs. B. Williams announced that she is to attend a meeting on November 9 ref. the single planning committee. The planning development grant is "top sliced" and it is not clear why this should be. Cllr. Williams asked for a feedback of opinion about the recent training sessions for parishes.

County Councillor's Report: County Councillor Mr. A. Davies reported that the footpath definitive maps were now being sent out. Neither the Clerk nor the Parish Paths Warden have received any maps. C Cllr Mr. A. Davies gave some statistics regarding speeding fines from cameras and mentioned that the surplus fund had been returned to the

Treasury and not retained by the police. West Mercia Police may have to merge with another force because it is too small; there is concern that the Shire Counties may be faced with funding this. Concessionary fares on buses for the over 60s will be available from 1st. April 2006, but will be limited to their own District (MHDC)

The average price of a house in Martley is £240,952 and the mortgage available to someone on an average wage is £68,000, thus affordable housing is vital for Martley.

This committee will take soundings from the parishioners, evaluate the existing wish list of identified projects, evaluate these projects and produce a Parish Plan. The Clerk to advise the Chairman on meeting dates.

Playing Fields: It was resolved to defer this item to the next meeting.

Urgent Decisions since last meeting: The Clerk identified the payment of the BT 'phone bill for the library.

Councillors Reports and Items for Future Agendas: 1 Laugherne Park is using both entrances; the Clerk to check with MHDC.

2. The collapsing road edge on the

C2235 is to be re-reported by the Clerk.

Addendum

B4197 Ankerdine Hill

Notes of a meeting held on 25th. October 2005 at the Memorial Hall Martley.

Cllr. Mr. A. Davies welcomed everyone to the meeting and explained that the purpose was to discuss the proposed traffic calming measures for an area of the B4197 including Hipplecote, Collins Green and the top of Ankerdine Hill. The purpose of the traffic calming proposals was to address residents' concerns about traffic speeds and safety issues.

Separate from the traffic calming issue, several serious incidents had occurred where large vehicles had got stuck on the hill and it was proposed to introduce a weight limit of 18 tonnes to address this problem. An ex-

perimental order for 12 months was proposed to commence in December. This would enable the effectiveness of the weight restriction proposals to be examined. The traffic calming measures were explained to be:

- Marking the edges of the road with white lines.
- Advance signing to emphasise the narrow sections of road.
- The removal of the white line from the centre of the road.

Christmas stamps have become part of our Christmas celebrations since their origin in 1966, when two stamps were issued; a 3d King and 1\6d Snowman (for those born after decimalisation this is old pence). Since then a committee at the Royal Mail have commissioned designs each year, which have varied between religious and non religious designs - although it has to be said there has not been a religious theme for five years.

However, this year we have pictures of Mary and the baby Jesus from different parts of the world. The stamps depict Madonna and Child as Black, European, North American Indian, Indian, and Aborigine.

Sensitive subject

You would not think that stamps could cause offence. Yet last summer the Church of England Synod asked the Royal Mail to print religious stamps for Christmas and now they have; some sections of the Hindu community find the Indian picture (painted by a Hindu in the 1620s) offensive.

I understand the concerns raised by the writer as it is a Hindu picture. One Bishop commented (who is of Asian background himself) that it is a pity the Royal Mail did not use a genuine
