First, Mike Dunnett showed the winter colour shrubs in pots, Coprosma Fireburst and Coprosma Evening Glow, not too hardy (from New Zealand), the colour deepens with the cold but move to the greenhouse or cover with fleece and keep in pots. They could grow to 6ft if allowed. Dave Cropp gave a good tip—cut your holly for Christmas before the birds devour all the berries! Members then enjoyed a talk by Brian Draper MBE who had brought slides to illustrate 'Elgar's Countryside'. Brian is much in demand as a speaker as he has great knowledge of Worcestershire and its surrounding counties, the rivers, wildlife, churches, cathedrals, towns and villages—and of course history. Unapproved edited draft record of the meeting held on Monday 4 October 2010 at the Memorial Hall

The Democratic Period/Public Ouestion Time

A parishioner presented the Chairman with a letter and requested that it be read under planning for Penny Patch, Hillside. There were no other requests or comments made.

Minutes:

The minutes for the previous Parish Council meeting were approved as a true record of the meeting with two corrections to 65-10 and 66-10(a). The planning application for Fair View, Pudford Lane was withdrawn by the applicant and was not permitted. The

accounts considered at the last meeting were for August not September.

Outstanding actions from previous minutes:

Milestone plate—The Clerk is to contact the milestone association and Clifton Parish Council, who have recently had some work carried out on their milestone. Highways—The Clerk is to submit a report to Highways about the dropped curbs, potholes, drains, etc that have been reported. The Clerk clarified outstanding jobs with Councillors. The Clerk will continue to investigate the authorisation of cycle races. The Clerk will contact the housing association regarding work needed to the site where the tree fell by Heaton House. The Clerk confirmed that an outdoor smart water pack will be ordered for use on the play area and Councillor Metcalfe will contact the police o discuss reinvigoration of the Local Youth Forum.

Progress Reports:

(a) The Clerk. Has received an e-mail from Highways confirming that since the Hillside sign is functional and visible and is neither a safety issue nor offensive, the graffiti will be dealt with on the next routine inspection, which can be up to 12 months. Has written to Martley Recreation Association, SPORT Martley and YIMMS requesting updates, future meetings, etc. Has established that both MHDC and WCC are adamant that the herbicide spraying is not linked to them, and will continue to

investigate. Responded to CALC stating that the need for the capping of the precept was understood. Confirmed that the Parish Council should not be directly consulted when a license to serve alcohol in their parish is applied for. Confirmed that MHDC Waste Manager has met with the resident from Callow Farm who had e-mailed.

- (b) Lengthsman. The Clerk will ask the lengthsman to concentrate on the corner of Hillside by Sunrise Cottage and clear the grip by the sawmills.
- (c) Training. Cllrs. Fearnehough and Clarke will form the Clerk's Finance Committee as neither is a registered signatory. The Clerk will have delegated power in terms of urgent decisions and planning will be addressed by full council. The Clerk will amend the standing orders and contract as appropriate, for authorisation. The Clerk will update signatories on the Lloyds account.

District and County Councillor's reports:

District Cllr Williams reported that while violent extremism is not something most would associate with the Malvern Hills district, it can happen anywhere. As a council, MHDC have a duty to ensure the safety of our local communities. MHDC supports the PREVENT strategy by being vigilant and working with partners to identify potential concerns for violent extremism. "Big Society" was the buzz term during the recent elections, but what does it mean for the council? The aim of Big

Society is to build strong communities that take more responsibility for their local area and ensure that needs are met, such as helping people gain skills, feel empowered, feel proud, and have control over their health and welfare. We have been working towards this for some years: emergency flood teams are manned by volunteers; and we support the community litter-picks in parks in the spring and summer. There is now more freedom to explore avenues for 'Big Society' projects, such volunteers taking on the maintenance for local parks and green spaces and community groups leading organisation and funding for annual festivals and events. It will not be a quick or easy transition to make, but if we begin to look at new ways of doing things and new ways to involve residents and community groups in the work we do, there is the real possibility of developing 'Big Society' projects. Renewable Energy Generation project: The council has secured a fully-funded student placement from Keele University's Project Green scheme for two months. James Chapman will be looking at the feasibility of the council generating renewable energy onsite. New government Feed-in Tarriffs and the removal of the ban on selling energy to the National Grid make the option of onsite energy generation a much more attractive proposition for local authorities. As portfolio holder for Economic Development, Cllr. Williams was pleased to report that as

from 1 October 2010 - 30 September 2011, businesses occupying single premises with rateable value of less than £6,000 will not have to pay any business rates and those with a rateable value of £6.001-£12.000 will receive discounted rates. This scheme will support smaller businesses during the continued financial downturn, with the timing of the scheme set so that the reduction impacts on two financial vears. District Cllr Williams asked that the Clerk arrange for the Worcestershire Hub Christmas Opening Hours to be published in The Villager. (see p.20).

Finance:

It was agreed to pay the final invoice of £66.95 from British Gas for the Weighbridge electricity charges. Councillors agreed that a direct debit with E-on for the electricity would not be financially viable. The Parish Council agreed to contribute £150 towards the cost of the strimmers recently purchased by the parish in the pari footpaths group.

A Councillor had been approached by concerned residents regarding the number of overgrown trees in Martley. The Clerk is to thank Mr D Cropp for putting up the Freedom of Martley board in the village hall.



Unapproved abbreviated draft minutes of the Ordinary Meeting of the Parish Council held on Monday 11 October 2010 in the Memorial Hall Wichenford.

Democratic half hour/public question time

The chairman welcomed the two new councillors that were co-opted at the last meeting. Mr Barrow represents Kenswick and Mr Wells was welcomed back on to the council and will represent Wichenford. Both councillors handed in the Declaration of Acceptance of Office forms.

District and County Councillors Report

District Cllr Williams read her report to councillors. County Cllr Davies reported on the changes that are happening in the NHS. Public Rights of Way spending is being reduced and they want to spend the money on ROW in villages that are most used. A questionnaire will be sent out shortly for parishes to complete asking for the most used. The parish council was asked to contact the owner of the land rover that is parking on the verge on the B4204.

Minutes

The minutes were signed as a true record.

Progress Reports

Overgrown hedge at Willow Road:

The clerk wrote to the landowner regarding the overgrown hedge on 19 September. The last time she looked it had not been cut but she will look again and report back to the next meeting. Tree trimming: the land owners have been approached and most have agreed to do the necessary work required. The trees on Kings Green have now been done and the ones on the village green are in hand. It has been noted that trail riders have driven through Rosses Lane. This must be reported to police as the Permanent TRO is now in place. It seems to be happening at the same time and day.

Planning

Applications considered since the last meeting

The parish council have already considered this proposal and feel that the latest application is an improvement.

Finance

The parish council is to discuss with the church warden what the excess is on the church window as the parish council would like to give some towards the window repair. The acceptance of the finances was resolved.

Highways (B4204 Meeting)

A meeting was organised by Mr Reed at Kenswick Manor and three members of the parish council. Since the meeting three more incidents have occurred. The highways department have arranged to replace the single chevron signs with larger yellow backing boards and an additional incidental chevron will also be provided at the western end. In the Garden

In the garden in December

You probably won't be spending a lot of time in the garden this month, but let's hope there will be a few dry, clear days when you can fit in some useful 'maintenance'. Try to avoid walking on wet soil: it is compacted by your weight and if it contains clay the air is squeezed out, so that when it eventually dries out it will be rock hard. Also,

try to keep off your lawn if it is wet or frosted, but do clear leaves, or the grass beneath will die off, leaving you with a mess in the Spring.

In the kitchen garden, providing the ground is not too wet, it is a good time to get on with digging and incorporating manure and compost. Spring cabbage and 923764 who brassicas may need earthing up to give





them support in strong winds, tall-growing Brussels sprouts can be tied to canes. Continue winter pruning of apples and pears, keeping an eye open for apple canker-a fungal disease which causes flaking patches of bark, usually in rings, and dieback. Infected wood should be cut out and burned.

Grease bands can be fitted, or the trees can be spayed with a winter wash, to destroy overwintering pests.

Non-evergreen shrubs can be pruned now. There are no leaves, so less mess to clear up afterwards, also it is much easier to see what to cut out. A useful guide is, remove dead,

diseased and damaged wood first, followed by any crossed branches. Tallgrowing rose bushes should be reduced by half to stop wind-rock. You can prune them again, more carefully, in the Spring. Clear fallen leaves from rock garden plants as they will withstand dry cold but not wet, which will cause them to rot. Some popular plants for winter containers are hellebores, Cyclamen Coum, snowdrops, variegated ivies, winter-flowering heathers and pansies.
