February folklore

February was introduced onto the Roman Calendar by Numa Pompilous when the calendar was extended from 10 to 12 months. The word February comes from the word februa, which means cleansing or purification and reflects the rituals undertaken before Spring.

The Anglo-Saxons called February Sol-monath, which means cake month and it was also known as sprout-kale, from the sprouting of cabbage or kale. February 2 is Candlemas day when all the candles used in the church during the coming year were brought into

church and a blessing was said over them. In Medieval times people believed that Candlemas day predicted the weather for the rest of the year and ancient weather lore includes:

If Candlemas Day be fair and bright Winter will have another fight. If Candlemas Day brings cloud and rain.

Winter won't come again.

Snowdrops

Snowdrops appear in February and are traditionally a symbol of hope. The name snowdrop doesn't mean drop of snow, but 'drop' as in eardrop – the old word for earring. Snowdrops are also known as Candlemas bells.

Shrove Tuesday

Shrove Tuesday marks 40 days before Easter and was the last day before lent, so it was last day for fun and games. Most commonly, villages used to play football against each other. In some villages and towns traffic would be stopped and all men would come out into the street, the church bell would ring and a football, or pig's bladder, would be thrown into the crowd. Skip-

ping is also a traditional Shrove Tuesday game. The most usual meal we still make on Shrove Tuesday is pancakes and is more commonly called pancake day.

St Valentine's Day

February 14 is Valentine's day and is thought to originate from the day when birds start to choose their mates.

Leap year

February 29 is leap year day, which occurs every four years. Hundreds of year ago the leap year day had no recognition in English law. So the day was leapt over and ignored, hence the term leap year.

In the Garden



It's seed buying time. Armed with your list of chosen varieties, pop along to the Garden Centre, starting with onion sets and early potatoes they always go first. Don't forget the old saying 'as the days get longer so the cold gets stronger' – be cautious about planting too early. It is a good idea to use cloches, fleece etc to dry the surface and warm the soil for a week or two prior to sowing. General fertiliser can be spread over dry land and cultivated into the surface. Sow in warm sheltered beds early varieties of carrots, peas and broad beans, also summer spinach and tubers of Jerusalem artichokes. You can sow parsnips in late February – start the seeds germinating indoors on damp tissue.

Lettuce and radishes can be sown in the third week, also sweet peas. Onions can be sown in trays in the greenhouse to plant outside in April. Lift parsnips and any other root vegetables before they make new leaf growth and the roots shrivel, store in sand in a cool place.

Hardy border plants can be transplanted. Split Michaelmas daisies and similar perennials. Prune late summer and early autumn flowering shrubs like Buddleia, Caryopteris and large flowering Clematis. Apply general fertiliser around all fruit trees and bushes etc. Cut back heathers and mulch with damp peat. Snowdrops can be divided as soon as flowering has finished. Work in some compost around established rock plants. In the greenhouse small heated propagators can be filled with the hardier annual flower seeds. Take geranium and fuchia cuttings, these will need warmth to root successfully.

On 25 February 1898, Mr Humpherson reported "Attendance has improved. Av. 58. (For the one teacher!)

A "Recruiting Card" for the Royal Navy has been forwarded to the Managers and hung up in the School. The Rector, on Sunday morning last, read to the boys an official communication re: Stone-throwing."

Early next month he wrote in the 'HMI's Report (1897-8)'. "Considering that the Master has to teach six standards quite unassisted, the instruction may be considered satisfactory. The best results of the elementary work are shown in Writing and Spelling whilst the answering in Mental Arithmetic is the least commendable. Geography, Object Lessons and the rudiments of English Grammar are well known. Recitation of Poetry is marred by the omission of the aspirate. Praise is due for Military Drill (!!) and singing by note. Excellent order is maintained."

One of the Children's Centre major challenges in the past couple of years has been to provide music classes for the under 5s. When our first questionnaire was distributed music was one of the five 'would love to haves', but finding suitable courses was to prove difficult.

We are delighted that Rachel Austin's Rhythm Time has been running successfully in Martley since September and is extremely popular with parents and children. Her Monday morning session is a Children's Centre 'hub', which means that Children's Centre staff are available to chat and that other services are provided. At the moment Usbourne Books run craft sessions each month and parents can meet over a cup of coffee provided by Coffee Haven Lite. For more information contact the Children's Centre.

Also on the same theme, are two music groups for children in Tenbury Wells. Ruth Herbert runs a music kindergarten on Thursdays and Fridays.

She teaches the children folk songs, play songs and rhymes so that they can develop their singing voices and enjoyment of music. Contact Ruth on 01584 811433 for more details. The national press reported at the end of last year that young children who take music classes have advanced brain development and improved memory compared with those that do not. The Chairman welcomed everyone to the meeting and wished them a happy New Year.

The Democratic Period/Public Question Time

The chairman invited all present to ask questions or make statements about parish business;

The hedges at the top of Ankerdine are still causing a problem to wide vehicles; the Clerk to write to Highways again (the location is just outside the parish boundary).

There is a substantial dip in the B4197 opposite the turn to Hockhams Lane, causing some vehicles to deviate from the correct lane; the Clerk to report to Highways.

The works at The Chantry have caused a large blue steel container to be sited within the conservation area; the Clerk to write to MHDC and the Head of Chantry School.

The Parish Council Meeting was opened by the Chairman at 20:12 hrs. Apologies: All were present, there were no apologies.

Declarations of Personal or Prejudicial Interests: The Clerk reminded everyone of the need to declare interests and to keep their list up to date. No interests were declared. Cllr. Mr. D. Cropp declared a prejudicial interest in agenda item 4 (CALC subscription) being the Worcestershire CALC chairman

Minutes of the last meeting held on 4th. December 2006: It was resolved to accept the minutes as a true record.

CALC Subscription: Cllr. Mr. D. Cropp, having declared a prejudicial interest, left the room. Vice Chairman Cllr. Mr. G. Taylor took the chair. The Clerk presented the latest subscription requirements. It was resolved to accept the increase and pay the subscription with a caveat to the letter saying that further substantial increases could not be accepted. A cheque for £285.13 was signed.

Cllr. Mr. D. Cropp returned to the meeting and resumed the chair.

Waste Bins: The Clerk is to present price for the bins, signs and information board at the next meeting.

Lengthman Scheme: The Clerk presented a report on the Steering Group meeting attended on 19th. Dec 06. The Clerk announced that he would not be attending any further meetings due to the ill tempered nature of this one. It was noted that the funding for the scheme would be reduced from £4200.00 to £2000.00. The clerk to discuss with the Lengthman and Highways to determine if the reduced expenditure can be targeted at the winter months.

Minutes of an Ordinary Meeting of the Parish Council held on Monday 11th December 2006 at 7.30pm in the Memorial Hall Wichenford.

Councillor K. Randall chaired the meeting. (Vice Chairman)

Present: Councillor J. Wells Councillor J Panton; Councillor M. Andrews; Councillor H Rendall; Councillor D Stinton; Councillor A Chilvers

In Attendance: 2 Parishioners, Mrs S Sanders (Clerk to the Parish Council)

Democratic half hour/public question time.

The chairman invited all present to ask questions or make statements about parish business.

Parishioners from Kenswick Manor expressed their concern on the recent planning application that has been received for 5 Kenswick Manor, and the application that has just been received for Kenswick Manor Lodge. The residents association has written to the MHDC planning department with their concerns. The parish council agreed to do a site visit to both of these properties.

Apologies and approval of absence

Declaration of interest.

Councillor J Wells declared an interest in agenda item 10.

Minutes

The minutes of the meeting held on 30th October 2006 were accepted and signed as a true record. Proposed by Cllr Wells and seconded by Cllr Rendall.

Progress reports

Parish Lengthsman

Councillor Derek Prodger has contacted all parish councils in the Lengthsman scheme to tell them that the lengthsman budget for all parishes in the scheme will not be reduced.

Elgar Housing

The clerk had no reply to her letter of 31st October regarding the maintenance and grass cutting of several properties in Wichenford.

Planning

Applications considered since the last meeting:

Extension of existing residential accommodation into ancillary outbuildings. The Elms, Frenchlands Lane

The parish council would like as much as possible of the existing materials to be preserved, the footpath which runs outside the detached house and barns has no legal definition and a modification order is needed. No provision has been made for drainage.

Woodhall Farm, Wichenford. Demolition of modern farm buildings and the conversion of traditional farm buildings to residential use.

The parish council had concerns regarding the access road as it is only a single track road, and would like the existing current features to be maintained.

Timber garage. Orchard Cottage, Wichenford.

The parish council has no objection to this proposal.

The parish council arranged a site visit for 14th December at these locations.

Finance

The income/ expenditure account was discussed and accepted.

The balance up to the 31st July 2006 stands at £11,490.07.

There were 2 cheques totaling £905.20 for agreement and signature.

The acceptance of the finances was resolved.

Budget

The budget for 2007/2008 was accepted. It was agreed that the clerk write to MHDC with the precept request for £6,500.

The community grant scheme must be matched funded and it was agreed to see if The Millennium Green could benefit. (Cllr Randall)

Clerks salary and expenses

The clerk's salary and expenses from 1st August –30th November were agreed and accepted.

Kings Green (Management Plan)

It was resolved to put this item on the next agenda to give the parish council time to approach the residents and get a census of opinion and explain what we propose to do. It was agreed that a definite plan of what going to happen should be agreed and a contractor should be paid to cut it.

Highways

B4204

The clerk has written to the highways department regarding the red surface treatment that was ordered in February 2006. In their reply the highways department say that there are significant problems with transferring the budget across to the new team. She also wrote and asked when the chevron will be replaced which was damaged by an accident in September.

WCC Highway Scrutiny Meeting

The clerk and Cllr Rendall reported that the meeting was well organised and very good. All present agreed that any work that is done on the highway should be supervised and done properly the first time.

Rosses lane/Guises Lane

An update from the County Council was read out. There are 5 outstanding objections to the orders, 3 of which are from user groups. If the objections are not withdrawn the orders will be required to be submitted to the Secretary of State for confirmation.

The clerk was asked to write to the owner of Laughern House with regard to the overhanging hedge onto the highway.

Councillor Panton agreed to ring the highways department to report the large hole in the road at Holt Heath and to find out the legality of having stones on the verges.

Lengthsman

It was reported that the lengthsman no longer lives in Wichenford and has moved to Bromyard. He can no longer fulfill his obligation as lengthsman and will send a letter of resignation. Once the letter has been received the vacancy will be advertised.

Councillors training

No one is able to attend the forthcoming training events. The clerk, Cllrs Rendall and Panton will be attending the West Midlands Regional Spatial Strategy in January 2007.

Councillor's reports and items for future agendas

Councillor Panton has received a reply from Coventry Airport regarding the increasing amount of air traffic in our area. Councillors were asked to report when they see one. A reply from Birmingham Airport has not yet been received.

Cllr Wells reported that the next Malvern Hills District Police Consultative group meeting is 17th January.

The clerk has contacted the new beat officer with dates of our meetings but has had no reply.

Meetings were arranged for 12th March at 7.30pm and 30th April, which will be the Annual Parish meeting and ordinary meeting combined.

District Councillors Report

Councillor Williams reported that she has attended a large meeting regarding developers' contributions for affordable housing. If 5 or more houses are built at least half have to be affordable. The affordability threshold for Malvern Hills is between £81,300 -£105,700; mid point of this is £93,500. The developer will put about £4,200 per house into education.

The County Council have allocated some money for dropped kerbs, some have been found in Martley and two pairs have been found in Wichenford. One pair outside the telephone box and the other the opposite side of the bus stop.


