Martley Parish Council

Unapproved abbreviated record of the Minutes of the general meeting of the Martley Parish Council held on Monday 7 December 2009 at the Memorial Hall. The meeting opened at 20:02pm.

Minutes:

It was resolved to accept the minutes as a true record.

Progress reports:

The Clerk: The Clerk is to ask the Memorial Hall committee to submit a copy of the electricity bill and their bill. The Clerk is to contact MHDC again regarding designated poop scoop areas. CSO Smith is to ask West Mercia Police Estates Service if there is any funding for improving the weighbridge, which the Clerk confirmed is owned by Worcester County Council (WCC); therefore, the Clerk is to ask WCC about funding. An item in the next issue of The Villager (January 2010) will ask parishioners to contact the Clerk regarding the evening transport suggestion put to Martley Parish Council. The Clerk will submit an amended fault report to Highways. The Clerk is to find out if there is funding for brown signs to point to the village map.

Landowners support – ditch clearance: County Cllr Davies has added an additional £575 to the budget for the lengthsman to be used this financial year to improve highways. Because there is money not claimed by the lengthsman due to personal circumstances, Councillors agreed to use this money to employ contractors. The agreement was for 3 days work at the cost of £400 a day.

Lengthsman: The Clerk is to advertise for a new lengthsman to start in January.

Allotments Martley Allotments Association is to speak directly with a land owner about conditions, availability, parking, etc. Martley Allotments Association or the land owner can make contact with Martley Parish Council at anytime if they require any advice or assistance.

Highways The Clerk is to forward the letter drafted by Cllr. Metcalfe to Highways. The Clerk will again ask John Wallace to speak with Cllr. R. McHugh regarding Jury Lane.

District and County Councillors' reports: Dist. Cllr. Mrs. Williams reported that the Hub Shared Service Development Team are finalising a plan to improve shared services.

County Cllr. Davies confirmed that a speed indicator sign will be in Martley for a month from week commencing 14 December 2009. £575 has been made available to Martley to be spent on a highways project. Martley Parish Councillors feel that the catalyst for the proposed housing should be the bypass not the other way around. A briefing on the need for the Western Bypass is taking place next week.

Wichenford Nursing Association

Some old traditions die hard! The Wichenford Nursing Association has been going for many years; it was formed after the last war by the Hon Mrs Britten to assist the work of the District Nurse in the Parishes of Wichenford and Lower Broadheath. Some people can still remember Mrs Britten riding around the parish on her sit-up-and-beg bicycle, visiting villagers in the Kenswick area with little gifts and a kind word. The

Wichenford Village Charity joined the Nursing Association in 2005 – which was also set up as a charity during the war to provide boots and coal to those in need who couldn't afford to buy them! The principle idea is still going strong: the Committee is led by Georgina Britten Long, with Susan Britten, Pam Webb, Janet Andrews, Margaret Fisher, the District Nurse, Helen Wooley, our Curate, Jennifer Whittaker, and Ken Randall as our Treasurer.

Before Christmas 09, over 40 gifts and plants were wrapped and delivered to those in the Parish who had been ill, or had suffered a bereavement during the year, or maybe were just lonely and in need of being remembered. We deliver the gifts and hope to bring a ray of sunshine on a gloomy day.

Over the years, we have supported various charities with donations, but more in particular by giving help to the district nurse and the surgery. This year we gave the District Nurse some money to buy about £200 worth of much-needed washable bed pads. We have given the surgery toe- and nail-clipping equipment, which they needed, donated to a blood pressure and heart monitoring machine, and this year we are waiting to hear what they need, and have allocated some £250 for something useful.

This Christmas Andy Mosely from the Masons and Skinny Neath are leading a team of 17 strong, driving 6 trucks to the Gambia with much-needed supplies, and we have been able to give them a donation to help them on



their way.

Kenswick and Wichenford Parish Council

Unapproved abbreviated draft minutes of the Ordinary Meeting of the Parish Council held on Monday 14 December 2009 in the Memorial Hall Wichenford.

District and County Councillors Report

County Cllr Davies sends apologies for the February meeting. He has spoken to A Moore regarding Rosses and Guises Lane and reported that a few objections have been received. The objection period is not over yet. The money for the ditching will be paid once the invoice has been received from the parish council. It was agreed that the excess soil left on

the verge would be seeded at the appropriate time. Worcester is reviewing their transport strategy before going to cabinet on Thursday. There will be a consultation in February/March on the development of a major funding scheme and the NW Bypass is on the agenda. A £120 million waste scheme will start in Hartlebury on the trading estate in 2011, with recycling for up to 50% of waste.

Minutes

The parish council were told that there will be no local plan in 2011. The Parish council can adopt the phone box for £1 with extra costs for insurance, electricity etc. We can do what we want with it and there are some very interesting ideas on the internet. The minutes were signed as a true record.

Progress Reports

Ditching: The ditching has been completed at several locations in the parish at a cost of about £890. Most of this will be coming from the CC once the invoice has been received. The clerk has reported the broken headwalls at Venn Lane.

Finance

The balance for the 30 September stood at £17,886.90. There were two cheques totalling £2,005 for agreement and signature ref. the milestone society and the roof repair for the village hall.

Budget

The draft budget sheet proposed to increase the insurance by £10.00, increase councillors expenses by £50.00 to £100 and cut the contingency to £500. It was also agreed that £50.00 should be put in the budget for the computer. The budget for 2010/2011 was accepted. The clerk was asked to write to MHDC with a precept request for £7,000.

Rosses/Guises Lane

The parish council wants to support the County Council's argument for closure and Cllrs Rendall and Randall have spent a lot of time doing an impact statement which contains many pictures and articles on the damage that is done by allowing these lanes to be driven through. The chairman praised the councillors for all the hard work they have done and gave permission for the file to be submitted to the County Council. Cllr Rendall was told that she must produce an invoice to the parish council to cover the cost of the ink that she has used.

Suckley Sharepool

Are we mad? We are thinking of building an indoor swimming pool, 'Suckley Sharepool' on our farm at Suckley Road, Knightwick. It would be for private hire, in hourly or half hourly slots. Would you like to swim regularly in complete privacy all the year round?

Apparently there are only two actual poolshares in England and we've been to see them both. One has been running for 20 years on a farm in Norfolk. Both are enjoyed by many of the local community, groups and families. Commuters and serious fitness people swim early and late, as the pool is open 6.30am to 10.30pm. During the day the pools are mainly used by mums and babies, 'ladies who lunch' and the over-50s. In evenings and at weekends families and small groups book a regular weekly time. 'One off' slots are available by arrangement.

We hope to heat our pool to around 30C using a 'green' heat source. Currently we are looking at biomass, wood-chips, logs or pellets, or miscanthus, and a geo-thermal heat-exchange pump. Rapeseed oil, wind turbine and solar heating appear to be not suitable. The pool size will be big enough for a maximum of eight swimmers, and of course, it is unsafe for anyone to swim alone, so we would insist on a minimum of two.

There will be individual changing facilities for ingoing and outgoing groups. We will expect the insurance,

business rates, building and start-up and running costs to be large, but hope to charge around £16-£25 for a oneoff slot according to day and time, which, shared between eight people is cheaper than the public pools. Also, no parking charges in Suckley! A yearly or half-yearly 'poolshare' booking should work out very reasonably. (The ones we looked at started at £165 for 6 months). If the sums add up and the planners agree, we hope to be up and running in 2010. Here's the crunch: we, and the planners, need to know if there is any interest before we take the plunge! A Short Trek in Nepal

Part 1 of a fascinating holiday taken last Autumn by Helen Sandison.

An inauspicious start, the train was cancelled, but we reached Heathrow in time. Nine hours to Delhi, one and a half to Kathmandu, queue for visas then welcomed with garlands and a minibus to our hotel.

Two days in Kathmandu: fascinating sightseeing, Buddhist "stupas" colourful with statuary, prayer flags and carved woodwork. Hindu temples and visits to the three old centres of Kathmandu including the Patan Durbar with its fascinating museum and delightful restaurant in the courtyard of the old palace. An early morning Everest Flight, breathtaking views of Everest and surrounding peaks, a glimpse of Tibet beyond. Kathmandu was colourful, chaotic traffic, overloaded buses, festoons of overhead electricity cables and a striking statue to three Nepalese literary giants. Zara, our tour guide, and Surrendra, our local Nepalese guide, were mines of information on local religion, history and culture.

Day 5, another early morning flight – to Pokhara, then a boat trip on the lake (in fishing canoes) to an island temple and then to a lakeside restaurant. Later we visited a Tibetan refugee camp, where hand-woven carpets were a particular attraction.

Harvesting The Past

Update February 2010

As I write (early January), I am looking out of the window at a truly Alpine scene. Last night the temperature went down to minus twelve and almost all the schools in Worcestershire have closed. When you read this, I hope 'The Big Freeze' will be just a memory. You will have forgotten the bad bits (the searing cold, the endless struggle to feed and

water stock, the dangers of driving etc) and you'll remember the best bits (the picture-perfect winter scenery, the children's happy faces, hot chocolate and warm fires).

Whatever the weather holds for us in the next few weeks, it is unlikely to match the ferocity of the winter of '47.


Almost everyone I spoke to during the interviewing stage of our oral history project 'Harvesting the Past' had vivid memories of these bitter months, and not all their memories were happy ones. I've picked a few out of the archive to share with you this month.

"We were living in Oxhall in that very severe winter of 1947 and how we survived then was really unbelievable. It started the middle of January, and it seemed to go on and on and on, and it never seemed to end. I think there was snow about in some of the valleys in May. Absolutely unbelievable.

We grew our own potatoes and our own vegetables. The potatoes were in the old hop kiln, covered over with straw and the mangels were in 'a bury' outside which was covered over with hedge trimmings and straw, but needless to say they certainly froze. I remember tunnelling under them to get the mangles out and the roof was actually frozen solid.

Water came from the pump, in what we called the back kitchen. Every

morning we had to prime the pump. Every morning I remember it was frozen. For the stock we just pumped it into a bucket and carried it. Oh, there was a pond outside, not far from the building, which was fed by a spring which fortunately didn't freeze... it was only a very small one, but it lasted over the winter. I always said that year

couldn't move anything and it went on and on. That didn't start until the end of January but it never knew when to finish. We lost a lot of lambs that year."

Bob Webb: "I didn't get to school for eight weeks. We had the big blizzards in January and February the snow didn't go till May... we were blocked in. There were no buses for six or seven weeks I think. It was so severe it broke the telegraph poles off - all the poles in the valley were snapped off with the weight of the ice on the lines. We managed. We'd got plenty of food ... hay and oats and that. That was no big problem. The biggest problem was the sheep lambing outside. In those days they all lambed outside and ours started lambing in January. We used to go out at night to save what we could. But we picked up lambs in March that had been born in January... that had been frozen to the ground. We didn't actually lose a single woolled sheep... a ewe... all through that. They were healthy enough and we took plenty of food to them. Dad couldn't get through with the cart but he made a sledge and the Shire horses would go... with a tin sledge... to put the hay out. But the lambs, they didn't stand a chance so we had a cartful load of dead lambs to collect up ... and some of them had been there six to eight weeks under the snow when they were found.

Then we had the big floods after and that was pretty disastrous. The whole valley was full of water and the biggest floods we've seen here." David Spilsbury: With all our modern amenities, I think it is hard for us to imagine what it can have been like that winter. Just reading those extracts makes me feel guilty for moaning about my boiler cutting out this morning!

Of course memories about the winter of '47 have been woven into community play our 'Back Across the Fields' which will be performed at the Chantry High on Wednesday-Friday 28-30 April and Saturday 1 May. Normandy: 1944 and 2009

(or One Man's Lucky War)

Part 1—1944

Alan Boon, Martley's own "History Man" writes for us about his own experiences.

fter finishing basic training in 1942, I apparently failed the Morse test – so instead of being sent as a wireless operator in a tank, I went to the RAMC Medical College in London (where I met my wife to-be) and after three months was turfed out to start x-raying with the 102 Field Squadron Hospital in Ormskirk. In March 1944, I was sent for a week to fill-in a vacancy at a Manchester Military Hospital. I couldn't understand why I had several foreign civilians with damaged legs to x-ray. "Oh, they're practising parachute jumping at the local airport before being dropped in France," I was told. On the Saturday there was free entry to a football match at the

city stadium - England v Scotland (England won 8-3!). Lucky breaks continued - in April 1944 all leave was stopped, but my wife-to-be, working night-shift on a teleprinter, intercepted a signal saying that if you could prove you had arranged to be married, you could have five days compassionate leave. She contacted me, and my boss, Major Flood, the Radiologist, saw that I got it. July 1944 saw the 500-strong unit camped in woods on the South Coast prior to the crossing to France. The night before we sailed, my new wife arranged a weekend compassionate leave to visit (she said) her grandfather in Brighton. We sneaked into one of the deserted bungalows on the beach front, and the next day she stood on the deserted platform waving off the whole unit.

We landed at a Mulberry Harbour in

Northern France walked along the long pier, then across the sandy beach and continued for six miles or so following PLUTO (Pipe Line Under The Ocean) and slept under the hedge for several nights until our tents and other equipment turned up. Within two or three weeks we had a 1,000 patients.

Convoys of ambulances would come in the middle of the night (there was still fighting around Caen). If you were the duty radiographer (there were three of us) you were woken to deal with the urgent cases.

By October 1944, Lady Mountbatten had been out East, and had come home saying there weren't enough hospitals out there – so we were pulled out of Normandy and sent up to Scotland to wait for a boat to India, which wasn't until January 1945. So that was the end of my Normandy experience No 1. You'll have to wait until the editor orders me to write again to say how I got to Rangoon, Saigon and Singapore.

In the Garden in February

This month brings the first signs of spring, with displays of snowdrops, aconites and cyclamen. However, there is still a risk of frost in February, so keep tender plants protected.

Cut old leaves off hellebores to expose the flowers and control leaf-spot, and keep deadheading winter pansies to keep them flowering. Cut back any grasses which have been left uncut over winter and prune winterflowering shrubs that have finished flowering. If you didn't do it in January, prune wisteria and summerflowering clematis, but don't prune spring-flowering plants or you will lose this year's display. There is still time to take hardwood cuttings from woody shrubs such as willow and dogwood. Cut some of your coloured dogwood stems back to the base so you get new coloured stems for next winter.

Towards the end of the month you can apply a balanced fertiliser, such as Growmore, to flower beds to feed the plants as they start into growth. For plants in containers, remove the top layer of compost and replace it with fresh, plus a measure of slow-release fertiliser.

For the vegetable grower, aubergines, peppers and onions can be started from seed indoors and beetroot can be sown outside in sheltered spots or under cloches. Chit early potatoes about six weeks before you aim to plant them out. Autumn-fruiting raspberries should be pruned, cutting all the stems back to ground level.

Garden Visits.

For spectacular snowdrop displays try Colesbourne Gardens near Cheltenham; open Saturdays and Sundays throughout February. Nearer home, we have three Spring Gardens open for charity: The Greyfriars, Worcester, Sat 6 Feb Dial Park, Chaddesley Corbett, 17-18 February, and Ivy Croft, Ivington, Leominster Garden 4-25 February.
