National Breastfeeding Week 2010 National Breastfeeding Awareness Week, supported by Teme Valley Children's Centre, runs from 21-27 June 2010 and aims to promote the and benefits of importance breastfeeding. Run annually since 1993 by the Department of Health, this is a key event for promoting breastfeeding. The campaign aims to raise awareness of the health benefits of breastfeeding, increase social acceptance of breastfeeding and promote support for breastfeeding. The organisers hope that women will recognise their right to breastfeed at any time, in any place and also that their friends, family and healthcare professionals provide the support they require. Breast milk gives babies all the nutrients they need for the first six months of life. Breastfeeding allows the mother and baby to get closer, both physically and emotionally. Women who breastfeed return to their pre-pregnancy figure faster. Breastfeeding helps protect your baby against:

- Infections: ear, gastrointestinal, chest, urine infections
- Diseases: childhood diabetes, eczema, obesity, asthma.

Breastfeeding helps protect mothers against:

- ovarian cancer
- breast cancer
- weak bones later in life.

April's meeting began with our Chairman welcoming four new members – our fame must be spreading! Next came Jane Cropp's topical tips, the first being news of a large pile of conifer bark chippings up

for grabs at Broomfield's Farm Shop. Then Jane showed members a very useful tool called a 'podger' (available at Laylocks) - it is brilliant for removing dandelions etc by the roots. Lastly she advised harvesting Hellebore seeds now from their pods and sow them straight away (if dark, not green) but beware of the sap – it's toxic.

This month's Black Bag: Mike Dunnett produced three samples of evergreen flowering shrubs: Viburnum Burkwoodii, Phillyrea Decora, and Skimmia Kew Green, all scented and 'shade happy'.

Mike then welcomed the speaker -Andrew Gagg, his talk entitled 'How to photograph flowers'. A member of the Garden Writers' Guild and a very experienced photographer of plants in their own habitat, he has provided pictures for books, magazines, calendars and on seed catalogues and packets - he has visited several countries for this purpose. He prefers 'a thin veil of cloud' across the sun for light, but carefully described using all sorts of aids for good pictures - even a white hat and white golf umbrella! Cameras must be capable of close-ups; and he explained how to get the best out of the camera. His last bit of advice – keep the best and bin the rest! It was a most interesting evening.

The Spring Show made a handsome profit this year! June's meeting is a visit to Broadheath Allotments (with strawberries and cream!). 16-20 June is BBC Gardeners' World Live at the NEC, Birmingham. Everyone is

On 23 April, Martley Web Mesh held its AGM and several members attended. Chair Richard Jackman told members that the membership has increased considerably over the last year, but that the small band of volunteers had pretty much reached its capacity for supporting the service, making it harder to expand the service. Much of the original equipment had recently been replaced and updated, due mainly to funds from a grant obtained in the previous year, but also to the growing membership. The service offered is now excellent in quality and has the capacity to spread further to offer the web mesh Internet service to even more people—if MWM could only get some more help on board. Martley Parish Council

Unapproved edited draft record of the meeting held on **Monday 12 April 2010** at the Memorial Hall. There were 9 members of the public present.

The Democratic Period/Public Ouestion Time

Data Link (see Parish Council Notices below for details): the Clerk will obtain 50 packs and communicate with local doctors' surgeries, stores, Nora Parsons Day Centre and Heaton House to distribute Data Link where needed. Simon Jones. Malvern Hills District Planning Officer, answered general planning questions from parishioners. PC Hood confirmed that the police will be using the weighbridge more once the renovation work is complete. He reported further damage to the pavilion, a recent burglary at the sawmills, fuel thefts in Nash Close, machinery taken from Ross Farm, attempted theft at Cob House Fisheries and a number of cannabis plants that were found in a property in Nash Close. He will arrange to circulate registration numbers and cars they are looking for via the Central Garage, Martley. The meeting was opened at 20:50 pm.

Minutes:

It was resolved to accept the minutes as a true record.

Outstanding actions from previous minutes:

The Grant Adviser at Worcester County Council is looking at grants appropriate for the proposed metal plate for the milestone, the play area and signs designed sometime ago by The Chantry High School pupils. Copies of the letter and fault report have been sent to John Wallace at Worcester County Council. John has confirmed receipt of both documents and is now looking into matters raised. The Clerk has written to Millennium Green committee regarding the bin. The Clerk advertise the councillor vacancy.

Progress reports:

The Clerk. Martley is a designated poop scoop area' (See Parish Council Notices below). A 'No Through Road' sign has been ordered for Pudford Lane, to be fitted in 8 weeks. The Clerk will add Freedom of Martley nominations to the agenda for the next meeting. The lettering for the boards has been approved by The Chair. Any parishioners with concerns about the burning of waste are urged to refer the matter to Environmental Officers at Worcester County Council or in writing to Martley Parish Council.

Lengthsman. The rolling three-month contract is now in use; the salary will remain at £10 per hour. References for Mr Passey have been requested and will remain on file.

Weighbridge. A cheque for £750 has been received from the police and renovation work will in the next two weeks. The Parish Council will pay the outstanding invoice to British Gas for the electricity. The Clerk will approach other electricity suppliers for quotes on standing monthly electricity charges.

Potholes, drains and bins. The Clerk

will address some of the identified issues next month and will laminate a map for the notice board.

District and County Councillors' reports:

District Cllr. Williams confirmed that the new recycling scheme started on the 5 April. She stated that a recent report commissioned by the council had shown the full effect of rural deprivation in the district. Whilst the district is generally regarded as affluent, with relatively high levels of income and low levels unemployment and a whole range of other positive indicators, research covering areas with roughly 150 people and about the size of a single postcode, shows that the picture is quite different, especially in rural areas. 46% of these areas are in the worst 10% nationally for geographical barriers to service. By definition, that accounts for almost half the population. Looking at the worst 10 deprived areas in more detail, they are characterised as follows when compared to the rest of the district: fewer young people and more older people; more single-pensioner households and more lone-parent households; twice as many live in social or private rented housing; more live in caravans or mobile homes; there is more overcrowding and more homes without central heating; unemployment is higher and more people are economically inactive; more adults have no qualifications at all and fewer have degrees; more have limiting long-term illness; more have

no car or van; all are more than 10km from a job centre; all are more than 6km form a GP or secondary school. These rural areas contain significant numbers of people who are deprived in a variety of ways but are usually overlooked and hidden by the general affluence of the district. So the big question is: what should the council be doing to help address these inequalities? County Cllr. Davies sent his apologies.

Parish Council Notices Message in a Bottle

If you were to suffer an accident or sudden illness at home, is there any medical information that people caring for you would need to know? In an emergency, the level of care delivered to you by the emergency services could be compromised if they are unaware of essential medical or personal information. Data Link or Message in a Bottle is a scheme that works by storing information such as relevant illnesses, allergies, medication and contact details in a clearly-labelled container, which is stored in your fridge door. Labels are stuck to the outside of the fridge and to the inside of your front door to indicate that medical details can be found in the fridge. The Clerk to Martley Parish Council (Sally Williams) is getting some packs that contain the bottles and labels. Dogs Fouling of Land Act

Martley Parish Council would like to remind local dog owners that Martley is a designated poop-scoop area under the Dogs (Fouling of Land) Act 1996 and as such dog waste must be picked up and disposed of appropriately. This Act applies to any land which is open to the air and to which the public are entitled or permitted to have access (with or without payment). A local authority may by order designate any land in their area to which this Act applies.

Martley's Past

Parish Council Meeting, 13 August 1943: "Housing, Post-War Programme.

A letter from the RDC was read relating to a request by the Ministry of Health on a Post War Housing Plan.

The County War Agricultural Committee had suggested that 16 houses should be erected in the Parish, 12 near Crown Inn and 4 near Prickley Green.

The RDC asked for observations on the number of houses suggested, and also would be glad to learn of any sites considered suitable.

The matter was thoroughly discussed and it was thought that the number of houses was thought to be adequate, but that they should be more widely dispersed throughout the parish; as follows:

- 1. 2 Houses opposite to main entrance to The Noak.
- 2. 2 opposite to the back drive to The Noak.
- 3. 2 opposite to the Memorial Hall.
- 4. 2 on land at Berrow Green, about 150yds from Admiral Rodney Hotel.
- 5. 2 on land in Horn Lane near Hillside end of the lane.
- 6. 2 at Prickley Green near Prickley Green Farm.
- 7. 2 opposite the Chantry Hall on Glebe land.
- 8. 2 near Upper Hollins Farm on North side of road.

(In each case the landowner was named.) It was agreed that these suggestions be forwarded to the Martley Rural District Council."

Does anyone know how many, if any, of these suggestions were adopted? Or were they all built around Nash Close and Hollins Lane?


As the Memorial Hall is a registered charity, it is of paramount importance that there is continuation of responsible officers. The outgoing officers, myself, Peter Andrews and Margaret Fisher have ensured that there were elected officers to take our places before we retired. We would never have left the committee leaderless.

At the 2009 AGM I, the vice chairman and secretary stated that we would take office for one further year only, but in spite of nomination forms being sent to the Memorial Hall Management Members six weeks before the 2010 AGM on 10 March, no nominations were received. As chairman at that meeting, I stated that

I would chair a special meeting in one month's time with the purpose of electing chairman, vice chairman and secretary. The meeting was held on 12 April, although I had still received no nominations. At the meeting I asked for nominations from the floor, and after discussion, officers were elected as follows: Chairman – Paul Furber, Vice-Chairman – Keith Webb, Secretary – Georgina Britten-Long to be assisted by Paula Cox when necessary, Treasurer – Paula Cox.

Harvesting the Past

A big thank you to all of you who came and watched the play 'Back Across the Fields' at the Chantry High School and who supported our May Day Fair on Saturday 1 May. It has been a tremendously busy, exciting and emotional time for everyone involved in the play and the Harvesting the Past project.

I must also thank everyone who has freely given their time and expertise: to the teachers at The Chantry who have worked so hard over the past few weeks, the cast, the backstage crew, the musicians, the primary school children who danced so beautifully, the parents who've ferried their offspring to and from rehearsals for months, the people who've helped with publicity, promotion and transcription, those that helped with the Harvesting the Past stand at the fair including the irrepressible 'Sheila' who led our sing-along.

The play, created by John Townsend from the oral history recordings I made last summer in Martley and the Teme Valley, was something special. It was a complicated production mixing acting with live music, dance, audio, and film – and had a large mixed cast, ranging in age from 7 to 88. It was full of humour and emotion, very slick and very true to the original material.

Most of all though, it really meant something to those involved and those watching it. Here are a few words written to me by the youngsters in the cast: "It meant a great deal to us, that we were picked to be responsible for telling the tales of what really happened here 70 years back, and it's an experience that we will never forget. We were all so happy to see that it meant so much to the elderly people that were involved and the people that came to watch it. It's safe to say that these memories will stick with us for the rest of our lives."

We set out on this project to create an archive for the Worcestershire Record Office reflecting farming life in this area in the 1930s-50s, and to share this heritage with the younger generation. We've gone a long way to achieving those aims—but I still see this as the beginning, not the end. Please keep the stories coming.

The Harvesting the Past Archive will be available to the public in the Record Office in a few weeks' time. We also have a small display with audio that can come to venues such as day centres, community halls and schools. Please contact me if you want to book it There is also the Harvesting the Past CD, containing 70 minutes of extracts from the interviews mixed with folk music. It is an inspiring listen. There will also be a DVD of the play which is currently being edited but will be available by the time you read this. Both CD and DVD will be on sale at the school office or by contacting me.

A Popular Landlord One morning in August 1883, Mr John

Hill, Landlord of The Crown Inn,

Martley, and a friend, went on a visit

to Worcester (horse-drawn transport

of course). They called at The Bell,

Broadheath on the way for a quick

whisky and in the course of the day,

Mr Hill topped up with glasses of beer and more whisky. During their journey home they called again at The Bell and at The Dewdrop where the two had cider. At the Masons' Arms whisky and soda was consumed. When the friend dropped Mr Hill off outside The Crown that evening, it was said by some that he was drunk, others that he was not (!) but he certainly did attract a lot of attention from his conduct in the road there. PC Giles (very handy for this incident, being on duty by the Workhouse and probably residing in Rectory Cottage) rapidly became of the 'WAS' opinion. However, when the case came up the following month, Mr Hill's supporters got it dismissed, but Mr Hill got PC Giles and another officer (PC Hayes) on charges of perjury. Again case dismissed - insufficient evidence!! There were great festivities at The Crown when Mr and Mrs Hill retired shortly afterwards. A bellman had gone round the whole village – at least 170 children sat down for a very nice tea, also nuts, apples and buns. Songs were sung and hearty cheers given for the couple. A few days later 120 women (age range 16-85) were treated

to still more substantial fare. They all

took their own cups! Martley Brass Band was in attendance; there was dancing etc till 10pm when the company (swelled to nearly 400) quietly dispersed.

The inhabitants of Martley presented Mr Hill with a gold watch and a gold brooch for Mrs Hill – she is said to have been at The Crown for nearly 50 years. She sent money to the Workhouse inhabitants for tobacco etc. Later that year, Mr Hill was presented with a portrait of himself by members of Court Moncrieffe AOF. It was painted in oil by Mr Bennett of Worcester and mounted in a massive gold frame – 'a capital likeness'.

Mr Lawson succeeded Mr Hill as Landlord.

In the Garden

In the Garden in June

Warm weather means plants grow quickly, including weeds and grass, so you will probably need to spend extra time in the garden this month. Ideally you will have mulched in late April or May, but if you haven't, do it now; it will cut down the need for weeding and watering. June is often dry and watering will be one of the main jobs this month. Anything that is growing quickly such as beans, peas, lettuce and annual flowers, will need more water than well-established plants. For best results and least wastage, water in the evening or early morning. A thorough drenching is much better than regular light sprinkling, because drenching gets water right down to the roots. Ideally, sprinkle first so the surface is damp and the water doesn't simply run off, then soak, using 2-3 gallons for a shrub, 5 gallons for a tree, every ten days.

Prune Spring-flowering shrubs now and cut back Clematis montana. You can clear the last of the foliage from spring bulbs and if you have overcrowded clumps of daffodils you can lift and replant the bulbs. Primroses and primulas can still be divided but be sure to keep the new plants well watered. By the end of the month, bedding plants in containers

will need feeding if they are to keep flowering well.

June is also a busy time in the fruit garden. Thin out fruits on apples, pears and plums and prune plum and cherry trees. Pin down a few runners from strawberry plants to provide new plants next year.

This is also a peak month for garden visits: Treetops, 28 Hallow Lane, Lower Broadheath, is open 19,20 June. Moors Meadow, Collington (4 miles from Bromyard) 14 June 14, and The Bannut, Bringsty, 6 June.
