Martley Parish Council

Draft minutes of the Annual Meeting of the Martley Parish Council held on Monday 9t May 2005 at the Memorial Hall. Cllr Mr. D. Cropp Chairman.

The Democratic Period/Public Question Time

The Chairman invited all present to ask questions or make statements about Parish business: A question was asked about the progress of low-cost housing. The Chairman explained the circumstances of the failed planning application of the Taylor's Yard and that this Council's need will not now be realised in the near future. A question was asked about the road junction opposite the Post Office. Cllr. Mr. G. Coombey-Jones gave a resume of the report submitted by this Council. It was met with a good response by WCC Highways, but funding for this location is low priority because of the low accident rate. A traffic survey has taken place.

The Parish Council Meeting was opened by the Chairman at 8:15 pm who explained that at the Annual Meeting of the Parish Council it was necessary to elect the chairman and

other officers for the forthcoming year.

Election of Chairman: It was resolved to elect Cllr. Mr. D. Cropp as chairman and Cllr. Mr. G. Taylor as vice chairman.





being tipped. The Clerk has reported this to Environmental Services at MHDC who will investigate and arrange for the gully to be cleansed. The Chairman drew attention to the pollution dangers of such practices and the possibility of prosecution.

Councillor Training:

The clerk reported an excellent turnout at Little Witley Village Hall and announced a probable date for the next session as 27 June at Martley, however the venue has to be confirmed.

Councillors Reports and Items for Future Agendas:

It was noted that a parishioner is cleaning the village on a voluntary basis and it was felt that she should be acknowledged in some way. The Clerk to write to Young Farmers to see if they were interested in organising a village clean up. An agenda item is required to discuss animals on the playing field. The road surface is in poor condition on the bend just before the lay-bye, the Clerk to report to Highways. Visibility trimming is required on the junction of Ankerdine road cross roads. The caravans at Lower Hollins farm are still being used, the Clerk to follow up. The road near The Vicarage is regularly flooded due to blocked gullies; the Clerk to ask the Lengthman to investigate. Rubbish has been tipped in the entrance to the silage pit in Hollins Lane; the Clerk to report.

REPORTS

District and County Councillor Reports.

County Councillors Report. In her last report, County Councillor Hickling wrote that parish councils work in partnership with the county council's countryside service to look after local paths, for which they receive a grant. This year there will be improvements to the scheme in the areas of: insurance cover, training and information. Parish Councils must complete an application form and six monthly progress reports. These grants may not be used to pay contractors for work considered to be the responsibility of the landowner. She has spoken to Maurice Carless re B4204 and after speed measurements taken, he is considering advisory signs of 25mph on the bends and 40mph at other areas.

District Councillors Report

It has been a very quiet time at Malvern Hills District Council. Cllr Williams reported that the Local Plan is in its final stages and will be submitted on 24 May. She also gave an update on the Masons Arms after receiving numerous enquiries.

PROGRESS REPORTS

Barbers Lane

A letter was received from the Highways Department regarding erecting signs stating 'Unsuitable for Heavy Goods Vehicles' at either end of Barbers Lane. There is no possibility at the moment of a weight restriction or 30mph limit on these lanes. The clerk was asked to write to the Highways Department stating that they would like the blue advisory notices seen in other parts of the country stating 'Single Track Lane with No Passing Places' and do not require any other notices ordered by the Highways Department.

Refuse Collection Vehicle

The clerk was asked to write to Mr Bill requesting that the use of the smaller, caged vehicle be kept in abeyance and considered at the earliest convenience.


Masons Arms Public House

The Pub has been privately purchased and the applicant is following the approved plans No 03/00992/ful. The Parish Council were unhappy at the removal of the large pear trees at the front of the building, they had requested that they remain on the land. The applicant intends to re-landscape and will replant some more. The applicant explained that the gateway at the side is only temporary to allow access to the back of the property, and once building work commences the gateway will be removed and the hedge re-instated. The Tree Preservation Officer will visit the property to establish what other trees are on it. Cllr Wells asked if anyone had noticed that the telephone box had disappeared.

The end of year accounts were accepted. The council has an excess of income over expenditure of £3,475.73

Sudan Correspondent - Part 5

It is one o'clock in the afternoon. Everyone here becomes lethargic during the middle of the day when the heat outside is at its fiercest. Today I have decided to stay indoors and do nothing. Totally, utterly and completely nothing. The wireless (BBC World Service) keeps me up to date with what's been going on in Sudan. Oh yes, and the UK! It's my first day off in over a fortnight. So much for the thirty-seven and a half hour week! Being a Friday, there are relatively few people or vehicles in the streets. Only a few strategic personnel are at work in the aid agencies offices, such as the managers, the guards and the radio room staff, who are constantly monitoring essential traffic moving around the region servicing the refugee and displaced persons camps.

It happened two nights after I arrived in Nyala and it happened again last night someone moving around the streets at 4am in the morning, banging a very large tin drum. The rhythmic marching sound carries for a considerable distance, finally fading away as the player moves further away though the streets of the town. I have never heard a similar noise before, and am pretty sure it does not occur everywhere, but I believe it is to awake everyone, which it certainly does, so that they have time before dawn to take a meal. The custom here in this Moslem country is to fast in daylight hours during Ramadan. Not long after the drum beating is over, the faithful are called to prayer. I'm sure it would go down well in Martley on a Sunday morning before daylight!

Tomorrow I will be visiting Garsila in Western Darfur where facilities, I am told, hover between the basic and non-existent. So what's new? At least here we have a mobile phone network. Normally I work in areas where no such luxuries exist. We have Internet connections of sorts here as well. An attempt was made to download The Villager off the Martley website but I eventually gave up after twenty-five minutes when the connection timed out. Life here is full of surprises and challenges and not just a bed of roses.

The journey to Garsila can be accomplished by road, it's a good days journey by truck, normally undertaken in convoy and virtually impossible during the wet sseason. It is, however, considered wiser and more prudent to travel by WFP helicopter. Any delay with the equipment or hold-up with the work and it means an extra five days with nothing being done before returning back to base. The helicopter makes only a couple of passenger trips every week. The rest of the time it delivers food to the camps. After that I leave the southern region and head towards El Fasher in Northern Darfur followed later by a journey westwards to work in the El Geneina area, located fairly close to the western borders of Sudan. The electricity went off a few minutes ago so will have to 'save and close' before the battery gives out.

In the Garden

Garden Tips for June

June – the month of colour in the garden with roses, foxgloves, perennials, shrubs and bedding plants in flower. Tender and half-hardy bedding plants may still need some protection at night. Take cuttings of pelargoniums, fuchsias and hydrangeas. Prune spring flowering shrubs including forsythia, pieris and weigela. Divide hardy primulas and polyanthus. Dig up clumps and split into pieces with roots and replant as quickly as possible to prevent plants drying out.

Plant out marrows and courgettes towards the end of the month. Potatoes will need moulding up. This encourages roots to develop from the stem and will increase the yield. Plant out leeks. Take the tops out of broad beans to help prevent black fly.

If you grow sweetcorn, sow seed this month. Sow seed of cabbage, runner beans, beetroot, broccoli, carrots, lettuce, radish, swede and turnips. Sow wallflower seed.

It is a constant job, hoeing to help retain moisture and control weeds. Pests can become a problem with the warmer weather. Keep a look out for black fly, greenfly and gooseberry sawfly. Spray roses to prevent black spot and mildew with a suitable fungicide.
