March - the hare facts

"March", according to the proverb, "comes in like a lion and goes out like a lamb", but what are its other proverbial associations?

March is traditionally wet and windy, so that dusty soil would be rarely seen: from the 16th century it was said that "a peck of March dust is worth a king's ransom" (a peck was a dry measure of two gallons).

It was also thought that the weather in

March could be an augury of what was to come: "So many mists in March, so many frosts in May." There is, however, one March proverb that is not to do with the weather: "On the first of March, crows begin to search" refers to the tradition that crows begin pairing on this day.

The proverbial phrase "mad as a March hare" has a similar origin: a "March hare" is a brown hare in the breeding season, noted for its leaping, boxing, and chasing in circles.

In literary terms, strong winds seem to be a constant factor. Thomas Hood in "The Bridge of Sighs" writes of his despairing heroine, "The bleak wind of March Made her tremble and shiver; But not the dark arch, Or the black flowing river."

Kipling refers to "the clanging arch of steel-grey March", and Shakespeare notes that the daffodils of early spring can "take The winds of March with beauty".

But perhaps the strongest literary and historical association of the month is not with the weather, but with the "ides", or middle day of the month, in the ancient Roman calendar. Julius Caesar, who in Shakespeare's play unwisely ignores the soothsayer's warning, "Beware the Ides of March!", was murdered on the Ides (15th) of March in a conspiracy led by Brutus and Cassius.

Simple solutions

(Tips and tools from the WI on reducing your exposure to chemicals in the home).

Conditioner for all hair types – Instead of using shop-bought conditioners (many of which contain preservatives, some of which are known carcinogens) try this alternative to make your hair shine naturally. Lightly beat two eggs mixed with some milk and run the mixture through your hair. Leave on for 5 minutes then rinse off immediately. Another alternative is to warm half a cup of olive oil, add two teaspoons of fresh ground lavender and the dry contents of two peppermint tea bags. Massage into damp hair, cover for 20 minutes and then wash out (submitted by Essex Federation WI). Many of you knew Desi and in recognition of what she meant to us all, we want to plant a small area of woodland as a lasting tribute.

Very generously, Mr and Mrs Kirby of Hope House Farm, Martley have identified a piece of land for such a purpose. This is in Martley, to the east of Hope House Land, next to their fishing pools; easily identified by the disused wind pump.

Along with John, Desi's husband, and Bede, a lot tree expert, we have visited the site and discussed the sorts of trees that might be suitable. We are awaiting a formal plan of suggested planting that will include silver birth and lime trees. Apparently, grey squirrels are the biggest pest locally to some young trees, so care, in choice of tree, is essential.

The resulting area will be known as Desi's wood and hopefully will be a long-lasting memorial to our dear friend and colleague.

The money is needed to buy the trees, their protective stakes and the planting. So, on April 1 we shall meet at 10am on the Great Witley village hall car park to follow a walk over Redmarley onto Abberley Hill, to complete a circuit back in 1-1/12 hours. Martley Web Mesh Update

Martley now has a mesh network of six nodes, one email server and more than 25 users listed. We also have a second "backhaul", or signal, coming into the system, which gives it greater reliability.

We are gradually expanding the system and are currently investigating providing Web Mesh facilities at The Chantry High School. Being a wireless system, the greater the distance between nodes and/or the customers, the slower the throughput overall. What this means is that we are now concentrating on Martley village, or at least those potential installations nearest to the existing nodes, then expanding the system outwards from the centre of Martley. So if your house is in that geographical area and are thinking of moving to a broadband service, give us a call! The standard installation cost of about £100 covers the cost of a box to receive the wireless signal and all cables or antennas needed. We can supply additional equipment, such as wireless cards, at a reasonable cost. Our customers have a good deal at £12 per month. Unlike many commercial firms, there is no restriction on download capacity or the number of computers per household and a martley.org email address is available free.

The highlight of January for me as Parish Paths Warden was an evening at Worcester Rugby Club with 120 from a total of 160 PPW's from Worcestershire and a goodly sprinkling of Countryside Services staff including Ian Bamforth the big chief. This was the long-awaited opportunity to receive copies of the latest definitive map (at a scale of 1:5000) and the PPW Manual. The CS area officers each spoke as did the chap in charge of the new definitive map project. Yours truly was asked to give a short presentation on the work that the Pathor-Nones do in Martley and this seemed to go down quite well. At least everyone in the room now knows a) that Martley exists, and b) where it is. They also know we have clear paths and some old tractors lying about. JSN 5th February 2006.

Addendum 2

Statement by Cllr. R. McHugh I would like to thank Councillor Williams for her support in trying to stop the implementation of the 18t Weight limit and traffic calming measures on Ankerdine Hill. As we all know they will have no effect on road safety, but may prevent a small amount of inconvenience for the residents.

We live in a rural area with all the problems of narrow roads and large agricultural machinery, but the restrictions put on Ankerdine will have untold costs on small local businesses at peak seasonal times, all of whom pay

their rates and road taxes.

Local farming businesses will be affected, Bulmers who have many acres of apples around Wichenford, will now have an extra 30-40 miles per journey to get to Hereford, also the potato growers have to use the alternative routes via Clifton-upon-Teme or St. Johns adding considerable time and distance to their journeys.

These people are only with us for 5-6 weeks each year but apparently they could not be tolerated. We all know that Tesco and the other big supermarkets will use any excuse to buy produce from abroad so these extra costs will have to be absorbed by the growers if they wish to continue trading in these markets.

Mccains, which is Britain's largest potato processors, already buys a large proportion of its potatoes from abroad and likewise Bulmers, which is now part of a national company will have no problem buying cheap apple juice from Eastern Europe.

A visit from a Missionary couple working in Africa

One cold Sunday evening at St Mary Magdalene Broadwas we found ourselves transported to the searing heat of the African Bush. This, however, was no holiday destination.

David and Heather Sharland are our Benefice Mission Link Partners and, through pictures and tales of their experiences, they brought alive for us the difficulties and challenges that face them in Southern Sudan. They live and work in Lui, a small village, but travel frequently to Uganda.

It was during a well earned rest in England that they kindly came to talk about their work and mission. David is an agriculturist and combines biblical teaching with practical skills in food production and in making the most of natural resources in a poor area. Heather is a nurse and midwife and it is through these skills that she has encouraged a biblical approach to health, nutrition and hygiene.

The practical problems in Lui are enormous ... there is no electricity supply and the nearest water is a river 10 miles away. Although the war in Sudan is ending, there is the ever present threat of violence. With so much fighting, guns are commonplace and travelling is particularly hazardous. Even a quiet walk away from the village is not possible ... the countryside is littered with anti-personnel mines.

Despite all these problems, David and Heather have achieved much. Food is

growing in once bare ground as David has introduced new crops and trees well suited to the harsh conditions.

Goats have been brought to the village and live in sheltered corrals. These very hardy animals are proving to be of enormous benefit to the villagers.

The greatest wish of the Lui children is to "go to school." Classes are starting up in the village, but there is such a shortage of the necessary resources that little can be done as yet for these children who, up till now, knew only war and violence.

This is an area where lives have been torn apart; putting them back together again is long and difficult process. So many of the skills passed from one generation to the next have been lost and need to be regenerated. But there are encouraging signs - through a marriage blessing service there is a new commitment to faithfulness which impacts on the problem of HIV/AIDS.

How heart-warming it was to hear what two such dedicated people can achieve but, even more impressive, is the great depth of Christian love they have for the people they serve.

As a Benefice, we are very pleased to be able to support them both financially and through prayer to further their ministry among the people of Lui.
