# Martley & District Horticultural Society January Meeting

Chairman, Mike Dunnett, welcomed two new members at the January meeting. Then followed our new 'Topical Tipster', Jane Cropp, with advice (for early February) on cutting down Winter Jasmine, summerflowering clematis; grasses (really short), and Dogwood (this achieves a brighter red). Vice-Chairman, Dave Cropp, reported that it is now easier to get into Highgrove (garden!) owing to a change of system. We heard that Nellie Bradley is making good

progress in hospital and wish her 'all the best'.

'Woody' Nelson of Bubble House Wormery was the main speaker and her talk 'Life of Worms' proved absorbing. She told us some amazing facts - Cleopatra understood and appreciated earthworms, and in the Nile Delta anyone caught removing them was given the death penalty! Charles Darwin spent thirty years studying worms. No creature has contributed more to the soil, and therefore to life, for every living thing. The big earthworms pull organic matter into the soil down their metredeep burrows; this helps with drainage too. Gardens of new housing estates are often worm-depleted owing to removal of soil. The smaller red compost-loving ones soon double their population in the right conditions (well-run wormeries) but self-regulate if not. Wormeries produce 'worm tea', which is a very rich plant food (tomatoes love it!); worm casts ('black gold') play an essential part in soil fertilisation as they are teeming with nutrients. Woody brought a wormery kit to show us, also a container of Bokashi bran – this substance can be used to 'pickle' waste meat and dairy products. Woody explained the process which is needed for the worms to make good compost. All microorganisms working together are what is needed. A fascinating talk!

On 24 March, Martley hopes to send a team to the quiz at Clows Top; 25 March Hilary Twigg speaks on 'Seasonal Interest' and members'

#### In Memoriam: Peter Corti

Since leaving Martley for Ireland some years ago, I meant to write to The Villager but never got around to it. Now I have the sad task of telling everyone of the passing of my father, Peter Corti, who lived in St Peter's Drive for the past 12 years. My father was a sprightly 84 year old who was out and about until the day before a minor stroke and a serious chest infection put him in hospital where he died on 22 January 2010. My father was a lecturer at what was then Kidderminster College of Further Education then a move to Spalding in Lincolnshire, saw my parents open a bed and breakfast business. They finally retired when they were then both in their 70s and moved to Martley.

My father was a quiet, unassuming man and would likely be embarrassed to have me write about him. He was a man with many interests, joining clubs and societies, and had a wide circle of

friends and acquaintances. Long before he came to live in the area, he was Start Judge at the Shelsley Walsh Hill Climb. Recently, he was involved in the local British Legion, the Probus Club in St Johns and the Midland Kite Flyers. He was a regular attendee at kite flying sessions at the Countryside Park in Spetchley. He often entered the results of his wine-making efforts in Martley Village Show, and was always pleased to get a prize. He was a regular visitor to the Kings' in Pudford Lane where he had a special relationship with Jacob the donkey, who will surely miss my father's pocket full of ginger biscuits! My father has asked to be buried in the churchyard in Martley.

I know his close family, Elsie (his wife), Louise and Helen (his daughters), David and Keith (his sonsin-law), and Laurence, Rhiannon and William (his grandchildren), will not be the only people to mourn his passing.

Unapproved abbreviated draft minutes of the ordinary meeting of the parish council held on Monday 4 January 2010 at the Memorial Hall

### The Democratic Period/Public Question Time

An amendment was made to the minutes regarding the incorrect name of the charity Martley Relief in Need. A parishioner raised the issue of ice in Pudford Lane. County Cllr Davies is to discuss this issue with Highways. Several parishioners raised queries relating to the planning application for the 83 dwellings by The Crown. District Cllr Williams confirmed that an extension to the consultation date will be requested and also she will ask for the planning meeting to be held in Martley. Martley Recreation Association advised that the play area has been re-barked but two days later the lights were smashed and the back of the train was broken. Another claim could result in the rise of the cost of insurance. Thanks were given to Mr Gosling for the work he has carried out on the notice board in the centre of the village and to Councillors for the work they had undertaken on the milestone, the weighbridge and the notice board.

#### **Minutes:**

It was resolved to accept the minutes as a true record following the required amendment.

#### **Progress reports:**

The Clerk confirmed that an application for brown signs would cost £100, after which applicants purchase

the brown signs and pay for their maintenance. The council has therefore decided not to pursue signage at the current time.

Landowners support—ditch clearance - local contractors have recently cleared all ditches in Martley, which took three days and their work was complimented.

Lengthsman—Mr Wilks will continue as the lengthsman for Martley on a rolling three month contract. The Clerk will write the new contract and will contact Mr Wilks each month with a work schedule.

Other Business - Water Scheme

Mr Badger (Martley's representative on the Rural District Council) was invited to speak to the meeting on the question of the proposed Water Scheme for the Rural District, and expressed the view that he did not consider that the scheme was desirable or necessary.

Mr Heaton thought that the scheme was of too great a magnitude for what was anticipated. Mr Peet (Top Shop) was rather inclined to support the scheme, but generally it was felt that the rate-paying public had not been made sufficiently cognisant of what scheme entailed. After considerable discussion, it was decided that Mr Badger, supported by Mr Heaton, should bring the Council's views before the Public Enquiry which was pending, and on the proposition of Mr Peet, seconded by Mrs Morgan, the following resolution was carried:

"It was resolved that this Council do submit to the Engineering Inspector of the Ministry of Housing and Local Government its sincere expression of doubt as to the wisdom of the Martley Rural District Council's Comprehensive Water Supply Scheme at the present time, in view of the size and cost of the project and the present financial and material state of the Nation.

The Council further doubts the accuracy of the estimates, since a high percentage of farmers and

householders alike already have their water supplies (electric pumps down wells! ALB), or, where they have not, might well be unable to meet the heavy cost of piping, added to the installation of the necessary equipment for the use and disposal of the water.

For these reasons further information at this stage seems essential, and it is respectfully suggested that the whole question of the scheme be considered in the light of these suppositions, so that the ratepayers who would have to bear the ultimate burden, will know more exactly what will be the cost, and what is likely to be the real benefit to the community. Mr Badger was thanked for bringing the matter before the Council.

#### Elsie Whitehead

Elsie was a very well-known and popular member of our community; she was a great cook and expert needlewoman. Over the years she must have made hundreds of cakes to raise money for the Day Centre, the fete and many other charities and

organisations. Elsie was always willing to help with any event in Wichenford. She will be very sadly missed.

# A Fisheries First in Wichenford

Cob House Fisheries is believed to be the first fishery to have a fully disabled-accessible match pool where every one of the 30 pegs is suitable for a wheelchair user. Cob House Fisheries worked with the Environment Agency to provide over 40 pegs suitable for wheelchair users, two large training platforms and over 1000m of pathways, all as specified by a report undertaken by the BDAA in 2008.

In 2009 we obtained planning permission for a huge teaching centre, shop and café which we are now building. The whole building is fully disabled-accessible with a changing plinth in the toilets for the disabled. We would also like to be able to provide a hoist in the disabled-users toilet and a loop (hearing aid) system throughout the building and are looking for sponsorship for these two items. Since installing the platforms and pathways we are getting calls from fisheries all over the UK who now understand the importance of providing these sorts of facilities and we are always on hand if needed. Cob House will be opening its new Teaching Centre, tackle shop and cafe in spring 2010.

#### From Alpacas to Wildlife

We obtained planning permission last

year for fantastic developments to make our enterprise the "fishery of the future" and having recently been awarded a substantial grant from Advantage West Midlands through the Rural Development Programme, the centre is now under construction. There is Teaching Centre, tackle shop and large café, and there will also be an Olympic-standard archery range later this summer. The purpose of this site is firstly, of course, to show people what a great sport fishing can be for everyone but also secondly to educate and provide facilities where the outdoors can be studied and appreciated by all.

In the Autumn of 2009 we planted a four-acre wildflower meadow with seed donated from the Environment Agency's traditional wild flower meadows and purchased another nine acres of land taking the total site to 45 acres. This gives us plenty of room for outdoor education for visitors and schools. There will be wildlife ponds for pond dipping, chickens, pigs, alpacas, children's play area and plenty of habitats for the wildlife, not to mention the Fish Farm with its indoor hatchery, where schools already come to from all over the country

#### Kenswick and Wichenford Parish Council

Unapproved abbreviated draft minutes of the Ordinary Meeting of the Parish Council held on Monday 1 February 2010 in the Memorial Hall Wichenford.

#### District and County Councillors Report

Cllr. Williams reported that all councils in Worcestershire had been working to enhance customer service and provide additional resilience within a number of services, in particular Regulatory Services, Internal Audit and Property Services. The Malvern Hills Partnership requested a report on rural deprivation in the district and two main issues have come out of the work so far: superficially it would appear MHD has no rural areas of deprivation. However looking deeper at access to services and issues of inequality, amongst others, it becomes clear that whilst there are no deprived rural areas there are deprived people in the rural areas and early findings show that many rural people have real problems when it comes to accessing services. Malvern Hills Partnership will now carry out a customer insight

study, to give a better understanding of how residents in rural areas really feel about living there. This will help us effectively tackle the areas of deprivation and improve living conditions and accessibility.

#### **Progress Reports**

Ditching: the ditching has now been completed at several locations in the parish at a cost of £924. Most of this will be coming from the CC once the invoice has been received. The clerk is chasing up the progress of the broken headwalls at Venn Lane as the road still floods due to the drainage under the road. The clerk was told it will be months before any work is undertaken due the scale of the work involved.

Cllrs. Panton and Rendall took the Transport Strategy to complete. Nothing has been heard regarding the adoption of the BT box.

The clerk is to ask the lengthsman to clear the grips at Kings Green Cottage and Guises Lane to stop the water sitting in the road and freezing over. A silent auction is to be held on 19 March in the Memorial Hall and councillors were asked to donate unwanted items.

# Normandy: End of September 2009

Alan Boon tells the second part of his experiences in Normandy.

went on the last of the four Poppy Tours – just four days and - 13 of us including a retired Major as leader. We went by coach, starting from the Union Jack Club (24 stories high!), next to Waterloo Station. Then by ferry to Calais, coach to Caen - our HQ. The whole tour was organised like a military expedition, and, because of the small number, we became very close. The weather was like high Summer, except for Sunday morning, which was very foggy until midday. We visited all the beaches, and all the military museums (where I was given free entry). At the Mulberry Harbour Museum, when they found I had landed there in 1944, I was

wheeled into an office to sign what they called their 'golden book' and was given a medal in a case from the Mayor of Arromanche!

We toured small towns and villages where various small, but important, engagements took place, and there are little memorials. We looked at, and entered, various German defences, including one where they were dressed German soldiers with a large naval gun and an AkAk gun. The door was closed, then there followed a series of very realistic (and loud) sound effects and voices, both German and English. The Bayeux British cemetery, with 4,500 memorials was most beautifully cared for. For some reason the Major suggested that I lay the wreath and as I was wearing a baseball cap with RAMC badge. I saluted - the first time in civilian life. At the American Forces Cemetery, with 9,500 graves, the crosses were all of Italian marble – but no plants or flowers. As we were

> there at 4.30pm, the ceremony of 'Taps' place, which is the broadcast trumpet call that caused all the many visitors to stand still silently, and two smartly dressed Americans, young man and girl, slowly, and very reverently, lowered the very large flag, folded it neatly and drove off (at seemingly attention-still) with the folded flag held flat. An American lady I was with stood to attention with her hand across her chest.

Various strange things happened to me to make the four days special. Walking above Omaha Beach, we passed a small party of Americans. A young lady touched me on the shoulder and asked if I'd been in Normandy. "Yes", I said, "Noncombatant", pointing to the badge on my cap. She said, "I want to thank you for what you did and shake your hand'. We also came across a retired Major-General on Arromanche Beach. He was leading a small party from Brittany and insisted on shaking my hand. Oh, and there was the French lady from Pegasus Bridge café who wouldn't let me pay for the four coffees I'd asked for.

However, there is one visit I cannot forget. On the foggy Sunday morning, we visited a French church cemetery where there were one or two hundred paratrooper graves. Then I saw, shrouded in mist, two RAMC graves (attached to a para-regiment), both men 20 when they died in June '44, and their army numbers both 142----, and I was 20 then, and my number was 14274102, and I felt it could have been me, and I had a little cry.

Oh, I almost forgot, I got a grant of £500 from the Lottery to go back! So you see, what a lucky war I had! 14274102, Cpl, RAMC,

102 Field Hospital, 69th Indian General Hospital, and hospital ship mv. Maetsyker.

There was no signposts, you see.... Our first job was tying hops. Never even seen hops before. At the end of that day we had muscles we didn't know we'd got!" March was the start of a busy year for

March was the start of a busy year for the hop growers, as Dinty Moore recalls.

"The stringing was done on stilts... and when the hops came up to about a couple or three feet, they were tied and that's when we used to get the people from the Black Country. They came year after year and they were great characters. They were so good and honest. I have a great admiration for that time they were born."

### A Short Trek in Nepal

Helen Sandison concludes her recount of a fascinating, if energetic, holiday in Nepal last year.

Day 6, another 5.30am start. A flight to Jomsom where our trek began. We walked up beside a wide river valley to Kagbeni, where a stream running through the village turned a wheel grinding the buckwheat to make flour for the Kagbeni bread for breakfast. From Kagbeni we walked uphill to Djarkot. The "motorway" was dusty, rutted and potholed, but usable by jeeps and motorcycles, surrounding us in clouds of dust. Two ponies helped us up this part of the trek (steep uphill and less oxygen made walking hard work) and we took turns to ride. The lead pony was good, the second one a little frisky, (age allowed me to ride the lead pony - dismounting was a challenge!).

The scenery was wonderful. Clear blue skies, wispy white clouds above snow-capped peaks and bright sunshine on golden autumn colours from the stubble of the crops in small terraced fields in the valley. In places farmers ploughed with a pair of yaks. Bitterly cold nights followed warm sunny days: on with the thermals! Most lodges had warm showers, solar heated, very welcome at the end of the day.

Our highest point was 3800 metres at Muktinath, a Hindu centre of pilgrimage. From Muktinath and Djarkot we headed back down the

Kali Gandakhi valley, longer walks, 15.5 and 13.5 miles the two longest, (but oxygen levels were higher). The lower, steep slopes bordering the valley floor were forested and the gentler slopes terraced and cultivated with orchards and crops of upland rice. In due course, we reached Tatopani, hot springs but no hot water in the showers! Next day by bus to Pokhara. (and luxury) then Kathmandhu, Delhi and home, An unforgettable two weeks amid happy. friendly people. An excellent team of guides and sherpas led by Purna, a splendid trekking guide.

#### In the Garden in March

Spring is on the way and the weather should be getting warmer, but your garden can still be hit by frost, so keep an eye on the weather forecasts.

This is the time for some basic soil care, which will pay dividends later on. First you need a dry day for weed clearing. Skim weeds off the surface using a hoe. Next, apply a mulch, 2 inches/5cm depth of compost or chipped bark. A mulch will trap moisture in the soil and prevent beds drying out in summer. It also forms a barrier against weeds and it can

insulate the roots of vulnerable plants against late frosts. Alpine plants and spring bulbs in pots need a mulch of grit or gravel around their stems so that water drains away and does not collect around

them and cause stem rot. Finally, apply a balanced fertiliser, such as Growmore, to your plants as they come into growth.

Flower-lovers can now plant summerflowering bulbs such as camassia, alliums, lilies and dahlias. Try putting a layer of grit in the bottom of the planting hole to improve drainage as these bulbs do not like soggy soil. Divide and re-pot perennials such as asters, day lilies and red-hot pokers while the plants are still dormant. The same applies to herbs like mint and chives. You can sow sweet peas and hardy annuals outdoors and summer bedding in a propagator. If you haven't already done so, you need to prune willow, dogwood, buddleia, hardy fuchsias and, of course, roses.

In the vegetable garden it's time to put in the first early potatoes, shallots and onion sets. You can sow broad beans, lettuce, spring onions, radishes and spinach, and indoors, tomatoes and courgettes. Towards the end of the month it should be warm enough to start off beetroot and brassicas.

#### Spring gardens to visit

The season of garden-visiting is just beginning and according to one

national newspaper, not one of the top 50 Spring gardens in Britain was in Worcestershire! Try Batsford Arboretum and Westonbirt in Gloucestershire, Hergest Croft Gardens in Hereordshire, Dudmaston Gardens and Hodnet Hall in Shropshire.
