# **Martley Parish Council**

An ordinary meeting of the Martley Parish Council was Held on Monday 3 march 2003 at the Memorial Hall (Mr B Draper MBE - Chairman)

#### Matters Arising

- a) Lengthman. The Parish Lengthman is working well. Councillors should list necessary jobs and pass instructions to the Parish Clerk.
- b) Repainting of the Bus Shelter Postponed until summer. Raising the Public Noticeboard will cost £20.00, to be discussed later.
- <u>c) Willow Road</u>. It is planned to review the need for verge cones.
- d) Library & Cyber Café. Talks were held with the architect and capital funding bodies.
- e) Monthly Free Bus. Mrs Seabright spoke to passengers. It was proposed by Mr D Cropp that seats be available for any Martley parishioner for a trial period. Mr G Taylor seconded this and the motion passed without dissent. The agreement of Wichenford Parish Council must be sought before this trial is implemented.
- f) Refuse Vehicle. The six-wheeled refuse vehicle is still causing problems in Barbers Lane. Efforts continue to obtain a smaller vehicle.

#### Parish Matters

Mr King complained about potholes in Pudford Lane. Road works are scheduled but the date is unknown.

#### Reports

Mr A Davies (CC) reported a 12.9%

rate increase. The County Council did not support a Regional Assembly or Referendum. Mrs B Williams (DC) reported a 4% District Rate increase that would have been lower but for the increase in National Insurance. Zigzags have been painted on the road by the Martley Schools to assist with highway safety. It was agreed to renew the Parish Paths Partnership Agreement for 2003/04.

# Martley Recreation Association Insurance

Mr Taylor explained that the Insurance premiums for the pavilion and playing field had increased. The Association asked if the Parish Council, as owners of the playing field, could obtain a cheaper premium or provide some subsidy. Mr Taylor will provide the Clerk with details and will contact the Parish Council Insurers.

#### Risk Assessment & Best Value Procedure for 2002/2003

The Parish Council checklist for Risk Assessment was discussed. As regards Best Value procedure, the changes made to the agenda last year are working well. Mid-month planning applications will in future be discussed and finalised at 10.00 a.m. in the Weighbridge building on the second Saturday of each month. Details will be displayed in advance on the Parish Noticeboard.

#### Planning

a) Applications for comment:

Endways. Hockhams Lane replacement dwelling & extension. Concern has been expressed as to its visibility and the possibility of reflection from the expanse of glass. The Parish Council appreciates it is an imaginative design, which if approved requires proper screening. Ankers, Hipplecote - amended access to B4197. No objections. Land at Berrow Green - irrigation pool and Poly Tunnels. No objections. Bearwood. Hillside - bedroom & lounge extension. No objections. Field. Hope House Lane, 15 metre mast & dish for Orange. The monomast is sited well back from the road and there were no convincing objections to this permitted development.

- b) Applications approved by MHDC: Ankers, Hipplecote change of use from agricultural to domestic land and erection of double garage. Poolfield Cottage, Wants Green Certificate of Lawfulness for existing use of stables and garage. Ankers, Hipplecote garden decking & structure (retrospective). Hillcrest, 1 Collins Green single storey rear extension. The Old Smithy, Hillside balcony. Ivy Glen, Hillside single storey extension to form Orchid House. Orchard Cottage, Newtown single storey side extension.
- c) Applications rejected by MHDC: *Brook Court, Horn Lane* barn & 3 holiday cottages. *Quarry Farm, Hillside* (Listed Building) part demolition & extension.

Finance 9 cheques for £1,964.64 were

presented and agreed.

- a) Register of Electors: A restricted Register of Electors for Martley has 935 names and addresses but the edited Register, which can be seen by the public, has only 647 names and costs £12.50. The Councillors decided that it was not worth buying one.
- b) Neighbourhood Watch: There was a meeting of co-ordinators at Abberley Village Hall on the 20 March 2003. It was agreed that drivers taking co-ordinators should be paid 50p a mile by the Parish Council.

### Correspondence

Notification was received from Worcestershire County Council Highways of roads in the parish to be closed for repairs. The Chairman had received a letter of resignation from Cecil Vyvyan-Robinson who has been Parish Clerk for the last 6 years. His replacement, yet be recruited, will take over as from the Parish Council Meeting on Monday 2 June 2003.

## <u>Councillors' Reports & Items For</u> <u>Future Agendas</u>

Mr Cropp reported progress on the Transport Consortium of 5 local parishes now bidding for grants of £10,000.00 for each of 3 years. This will provide flexi-buses for evening and late return buses to Worcester and possibly Malvern on Wednesdays, Fridays and Saturdays.

The next meeting, the AGM, is on Monday 12 May 2003 at 8.00 p.m..

# Warning!

The Villager has been informed of a scam which is targeting females in particular. They receive a phone call from someone saying they are from The Post Office asking them to confirm their post code. When this is given, they are told that they are eligible for gift vouchers for their co-operation and they are asked to give their home address in order to receive the vouchers. So far, 90% of women who have provided this information have been burgled, and it is assumed that their homes are empty during office working hours. The police are aware of this scam and the Post Office have confirmed that they are NOT conducting any postcode surveys. Also, if you receive a call from someone who identifies them self as a BT Technician testing the line then asking you to press 90 (nine zero) to complete the test **DON'T PRESS 90** as this give the caller full access to your line, allowing them to place long-distance calls that are then billed to you. **Don't press 90 for anyone.**

I was fascinated by the TV programme, 'A Country Parish' - about the ministry of a rural clergyman in Wiltshire. Jamie is a man who lives out a similar ministry to myself and, having settled down quickly to rural life was soon making a significant impact. He even did magic tricks!

The last episode dealt with church finance. I felt for him having to ask people to consider giving to the church but the Church, buildings and ministry do cost money, which has to be raised locally. As Jamie challenged, village churches would be sadly missed if they disappeared from rural communities after hundreds of years, but this very real danger exists due to lack of funding. This is one reason why there are fewer full time clergy today.

I doubt the church will disappear for the church is the people, a worshipping community, not the building. "Wherever 2 or 3 meet", Jesus said; "There am I in the midst". I believe the church can and will grow - with God's help! God calls us to follow Him and be his disciples. An active outworking of our Faith is worshipping and giving of ourselves. If we give of ourselves then of course we give what we have in response to God's call upon us. I pray that Jamie, like us, will see growth and the funds needed to continue God's ministry in the countryside.

Let us all play our part in making that so in our own villages and churches.

a11 Nearly Mav Dav celebrations are remnants of ancient agricultural and fertility rituals. Among the Celtic peoples a festival called Beltane was held on May Day on which bonfires were lit. In the Middle Ages everyone, both of high and low birth, went out very early as Chaucer said. "to fetch the flowers fresh". These were taken indoors at sunrise accompanied by musicians, and then used to decorate their doors and windows. This was known as "bringing home the may", which is probably why hawthorn is also known as may.

Before the Puritans stopped it, the fairest girl in the village was crowned

with flowers as "Queen of the May" and the local people danced and sang around her as she sat on her bower. This is probably a relic of the old Roman celebration when Flora the goddess of flowers and vegetation was worshipped. However the most conspicuous feature of May Day celebrations was the erection of the May Pole. This was decorated with garlands of flowers and danced around for most of the day. Some of these are still to be seen on village greens even to this day.



In much of our modern world May Day celebrations take on a much less romantic air since it is International Labour Day, when the military and workers march and wave red banners through cities all over the world.

# Nature Ramblings

This month our nature ramble takes a look at one viewpoint concerning the Martley Millennium Green, which I have heard voiced from several directions—Editor.

Dear Editor.

From The Ringing World (23 November 1973): "... in the lovely rich countryside between the Severn and the Teme, it should be seen when the fruit blossom is clothing all the hills and filling all the valleys with its beauty: there is nothing in England to compare with West Worcestershire in the spring. If we were really civilised, all folk would leave their work and come and see it and thank God for so much beauty, and Martley Church would be a good spot in which to do so".

Few who know the Teme Valley would disagree with those words used by Sir John Betjeman to describe the setting of St Peter's, Martley. To quote from another, more recent source "... an outstanding specimen of historic church architecture listed as of Grade 1 importance; it is a typical and beautiful country church, tranquil and quiet, at home in its surroundings. It is all of these and more; it is "our" church", the responsibility of the

Martlev community."

It is so very sad that these profound words are apparently now being disregarded.

Unfortunately it would seem that the Parish Council, having stressed in their planning application - (No. 99/00928 St Peter's Meadow change of use to become a wild flower meadow) – "that the views of Martley Church be preserved" are now in favour of our best (and only, really) view of the whole church from a public road, being hidden behind a wall of trees on the southern side of the meadow. These extra trees were not illustrated on the coloured plan that was publicly displayed, enabling the parishioners to see the proposed scheme and to be satisfied that this superb view would not be impaired. It was also pointed out by letter at the time that the proposals should be sympathetic to the views across the site to Church (and vice versa), and the Planning Officer's comments emphasised the importance of retaining the character and appearance of Martley Conservation Area.

The reason for writing this letter is that these views are NOT being preserved, and I am not alone in my concern over the matter. All these extra trees will, in future years, completely alter the character of the area, not to mention considerably reducing the beautiful

sight of the Church from Hope House Lane. Who on earth could think that trees would be more important than this! And where are the eye-level sketches for these 2003 additions?

To quote from previous Villager copies, February 1999 – "it is to be a type of nature reserve and not a park." March 1999 - "primarily a conservation area." (Don't views count?) November 2000 – "trees planted were carefully positioned to enhance the area, taking care not to restrict good views." February 2001 – "38 trees planted to date, only a few left to go now." Surely that was enough! It is also lovely to sit on the churchyard seat by the small south door and look to the east to Laugherne House and its cedars, but that is to be impaired too. Perhaps the Parochial Church Council could have been approached for an opinion on all the extra planting? And why the unnecessary timber evesores over the previously not-noticeable drain safety fencing covers? The surrounding the ponds would have been better left intact, then two sheep would not have drowned.

There is a lovely church in Martley. Why hide it?

#### **Baked Bananas**


Serves 4

50g (2 oz)

- 2 tablespoons soft brown sugar
- 2 tablespoons lemon juice
- 4 bananas
- 2 tablespoons brandy (or orange juice)
- 1. Put butter, sugar and lemon juice in a shallow casserole and place in a pre-heated moderate oven (180° C, Gas 4) for a few minutes until melted.
- Cut bananas into large pieces or halves and arrange in the casserole, turning to coat in the sauce.
- 3. Add the brandy (or orange juice), and return to the oven for about 30 mins.
- 4. Serve hot with cream or ice-cream.

This dish is easy to make and is popular with all ages. It can easily be adapted to cooking in a microwave oven (cook for 5-6 minutes only, depending on your oven settings).

# In the Garden



May can still be a busy month for the gardener, planting out vegetable plants that have been container and hardened off. These grown include sprout plants, lettuce, Autumn cabbage and cauliflower plants. It is not too late to plant container-grown broad beans. Seed of many vegetable varieties can be sown including peas, parsnip, carrot, radish, red beet and spinach, Purple and white sprouting and broccoli should be sown towards the end of the month.

Heathers can be trimmed with a pair of sheers to keep them compact and tidy. Remove the heads of Spring flower plants. The leaves should be left to die down naturally before removing, as they will replenish the bulbs for next year. Sow seed of wallflowers, Canterbury bells and forget-me-nots towards the end of the month. This should produce plants for planting out in the Autumn. Pests will appear month, and multiply very fast in warm weather. Heed the warning and take action early.
