Penny for the guy?



The name November comes from the Roman word novem meaning nine, because it was the ninth month on the Roman calendar.

The Anglo-Saxons called November Wind monath because it was the time when the cold winds began to blow. They also called it Blod monath because it was the time when cattle were slaughtered for winter food.

The first week of November has always been a time of festivals and celebrations marking the end of the harvest and beginning of winter.

All Saint's Day – November 1 In 835AD, the Roman Catholic Church made November 1 a church holiday to honour all the saints. This feast day is called All Saint's Day.

All Soul's Day - November 2

This is a day when the Christian Church remembers all those who have died; the ordinary people from all walks of life. Families visit graves with flowers to remember their loved ones and in some parts of the country, the day ends with a play or some songs.

Originally, it was the custom for poorer Christians to offer prayers for the dead in return for money or food (soul cake) from their wealthier neighbours. People would go souling – rather than carol singing – requesting alms or soul cakes. The song went like this:

A soul, a soul, a soul cake.

Please good missus a soul cake.

An apple, a pear, a plum or a cherry,
Any good thing to make us merry.

One for Peter, two for Paul,
Three for Him who made us all.

A soul cake is rather like a hot cross bun without the currants or cross.

Mischief Night November 4

This is often called Mischief Night and is the time when all sorts of naughty things are done – the main idea is to put things in the wrong place around the house or garden.

Guy Fawkes Night - November 5

This is the most widespread of all British customs. The day was declared a holiday by Parliament was saved from being blown up by Guy Fawkes in the Gunpowder Plot of 1605.

Martinmas Day – November 11

The feast of St Martin, Martinmas was a time for celebrations with great feasts and hiring fairs, at which labourers would seek new posts.

Remembrance Day

This is also the day of remembrance, when people recall their loved ones killed in the wars dating from World War I [see Church notes].

Martley's Past



The one-room Infant classroom in Berrow Green Road was built in 1894 as a direct result of HM Inspector's pressure.

The infants had been accommodated since 1872 in a room created by knocking down a wall between the two living rooms of the school houses, leaving a room with A low ceiling and

facing the road – almost due North. Folding pine doors were installed so the master and mistress could have their rooms back once school had finished. (Incidentally, this work cost £12-10!)

The HM Inspector's report dated 16 June 1892 states: "The Mixed (Girls and Infants) School shows sound and intelligent teaching generally, but in too many instances the marks are of only fairly good quality. The children read and recite well and answer satisfactorily when questioned in all their subjects except mental arithmetic. In this, however, there is some improvement shown on last year.

Praise is especially due for the accurate and thorough knowledge of Grammar in the Upper Standards. The behaviour of the children is commendable. The infant class continues to be skilfully and kindly taught. In the girls' room, the desks are not firmly placed. This defect causes ink to be spilt and interferes with the writing exercises.

None of the recommendations of last year's report with respect to the infants' room have been carried out, and it remains low, dark and practically devoid of ventilation. The recognition of the infants' room is imperilled by such defects and the managers should therefore at once take steps to remedy them.

The special attention of the managers is requested to HM Inspector's repeated complaints as to the state of the accommodation for the younger children."

Note: There were 60 plus girls and infants registered!

Lunchboxes

The Food Standards Agency found that packed lunches still contain far too much fat, salt and sugar for one meal. From lunchbox foods alone, children are eating double the recommended lunchtime intake of saturated fat and sugar and up to half their daily recommended salt intake.

Three out of four lunchboxes fail to meet the government standards set for school meals in 2001.



The Food Standards A g e n c y i s attempting to support parents in putting together nutritious, practical and affordable

packed lunches. Through their website, www.food.gov.uk, parents can access two month's worth of simple lunchbox suggestions, recipes and other helpful information.

The Food in Schools programme, led by the DfEs, suggest that lunchboxes include the following:

- starchy food: wholegrain bap, thick sliced wholemeal bread, pitta pocket, p a s t a o r r i c e s a l a d - fruit and veg: an apple, satsuma, handful of cherry tomatoes or carrot sticks, mini-can of fruit chinks or small box of raisins

- a portion of dairy food: individual cheese portion or pot of yoghurt
- a portion of lean meat, fish or alternative: ham, tuna, egg or hummus
- a drink: fruit juice, semi-skimmed milk or water

Car seat Laws

Don't forget that there are new car seat laws. Any child aged up to 12 or shorter than 135cm (4'5") now has to use a child seat or booster.

Exceptions to the new laws are rear seats in taxis or short emergency journeys (which does not cover school runs).


