September's meeting began with 'topical tips' and chairman Mike Dunnett advised members to search garden centres for Spring-bought plants that these places don't want to keep over the winter. His second tip – clean up leaves from under plants when cutting them down - less accommodation for slugs! Another member had heard of conkers being placed on narrowboat windowsills to deter spiders!

Our speaker for the evening was Julie Ritchie, who has been twenty years at a nursery near Tewkesbury. She showed extensive knowledge of her subject 'Late Summer Colour' and had a lovely selection of slides, beginning with August at Pershore College – hot colours of course. Many more beautiful portraits of flowers followed,

Julie naming them all and advising on their cultivation. Everyone was given a list of the plants, some great favourites such as dahlia 'Bishop of Llandaff', penstemon 'Osprey'. There were wonderful Michaelmas Daisies, red superb asters. hardy chrysanthemums, rudbekias and many more. Julie said she gives her plants a 'Chelsea chop' - cut them off at the "knees" in May/June to encourage them to bush out and produce stronger new growth and more flowers. Most "late-summer colour" specimens are easily grown, some look well planted in drifts. Bees love most late-summer flowers. Caroline Dunn gave a vote of thanks and described the talk as most inspiring and encouraging.

Unapproved abbreviated draft minutes of the meeting held on Monday 7 September 2009 at the Memorial Hall

# The Democratic Period/Public Ouestion Time

Parishioners raised the following points: garden waste being left outside St. Peters Court and grass not being cut—the Clerk will write to the occupier(s). General poor condition of the weighbridge—councillors and Lengthsman to assess what improvements could be made to the weighbridge. It was queried why the police surgeries have moved from the weighbridge to The Chantry when it was felt that the weighbridge is far more accessible. The Clerk to investigate. A map in Martley, which

could show Councillors areas of responsibility within Martley—to discuss at next meeting. Concerns over the overgrown hawthorn hedge on the footpath opposite The Crown Inn. The Clerk is to arrange for this and other hedges to be cut back. Worcestershire CALC investigating legal aspects allotments for several parishes, including Martley. The Clerk has contacted other Worcestershire parishes that have recently set up allotments and will contact the land owner who expressed interest concerning rent and other requirements. For discussion at the next meeting. Concerns that the path The Chantry from Weighbridge, and its seat, are very overgrown—the Clerk will arrange improvements for this area. Crows in the trees at the entrance to Mortlake Drive—the Parish Council confirmed that Environmental Health are unable to take action against the crows. Some parishioners are disturbed by the bottle banks and the Clerk is awaiting advice from MHDC on solutions to reduce the noise used by parishes - for discussion at next meeting. The exchange of packages taking place outside Heaton House - the Clerk is to notify the police. There is need for a sign at the top and bottom of Hillend Bridge Lane to stop confused drivers delivering to the wrong address. A success - flood alleviation work is finally being undertaken in Jury Lane: thanks to the perseverance of residents.

Nigel Potter from Community First then spoke to The Parish Council and parishioners, confirming that the Housing Needs Survey undertaken last year found a need for 8 homes: 6 affordable and 2 shared ownership. These houses would be for people with a local connection to Martley. These houses tend to be agricultural land on the edge of villages that would usually not be eligible for planning. Nigel Potter has contacted land owners in Martley to seek interest in selling land for affordable housing and has had two positive responses. Currently he is legally unable to confirm names or locations, although there would be plenty of public consultation in the future but. The Parish Council will set up a working party to plan the next step. There are 14 affordable houses being built at Clifton Upon Teme at present that Martley could apply for. Those interested in applying for affordable housing should check Choice Lettings on a Tuesday. Bids can be put in by people previously registered with a housing association. Chair opened the meeting at 20:45pm.

#### **Progress reports:**

The Clerk: The Clerk clarified the cooption process to fill the current vacancies on The Parish Council. The Clerk confirmed that Worcestershire CALC is offering free training to Councillors. Martley will arrange its own training when the vacancies are filled. Notification of a cycling association event - the Clerk is awaiting response from MHDC. Councillors expressed a preference to continue receiving their minutes and agendas in the post as apposed to email.

Lnndowners support – ditch clearance: After receiving advice from MHDC the Clerk is to write to Highways asking for permission to be given for the ditches to be cleared at Hollins Lane, Pudford Lane and Berrow Green (from the bungalows to Maylite).

Lengthsman: The Clerk will ask the Lengthsman to iInstall the new bins at agreed locations.

Highways: The Clerk is splitting the Highways report into areas so Councillors can inspect the area and confirm if the work has been completed. An amended report will then be submitted to Highways. To be discussed at the next meeting.

# District and County Councillors' reports:

District Cllr. Mrs. Williams reported that she was now Youth Champion for Hallow. She confirmed that Emma Rothwell would very much like to continue with her YIMMS work, for which Mrs Rothwell has received full support from Martley Parish Council.

#### **Planning:**

Malvern Architects will attend a public meeting to discuss the application they are formulating on behalf of Marsten Developments Ltd to develop the land adjoining The Crown Inn. The Clerk will organise a public meeting for Thursday 15 October at 7.30pm and arrange for a notice on the village notice board.

Cllr. Mr. G. Coombey-Jones reported that it gave a basic assessment of known flood areas, none of which are in Martley. There was no action proposed for Martley Parish.

## **Martley Show and Fete:**

A Councillor requested clarification of what the Parish Council's previous donation of £300 was spent on. The Council confirmed that this one-off donation was given without stipulations or conditions and therefore clarification would not be sought from Martley Show and Fete.

### **Speed signs:**

The Clerk is to contact 3M regarding prices. For discussion at the next meeting.

#### Children's play area:

The Clerk will seek advice on grants to assist in improving the play area. The Recreation Association and Martley Parish Council will meet to discuss responsibilities and an effective way of working together.

#### Finance:

There were 6 cheques totalling £2619.24.. The Clerk is to investigate the invoice for the Library electricity. The Clerk has heard nothing further

from The Bank of Ireland so will arrange for a solicitor's letter requesting immediate payment of funds from the account.

# Councillors reports and items for future agenda:

The Clerk will put together a list of requests such as allotments and play area, that the parish may wish to be considered if the Marstens plan were to go ahead. The Clerk is to contact Karen Metcalfe who has kindly volunteered to be Martley Village Coordinator. The Clerk will speak with residents who have hedges that are causing public access issues to see if they require the Parish Council's assistance with cuting.

#### Date of next meeting:

The next meeting will be held on Monday 5 October 2009.

# Martley's Past

On 6 February 1922, Martley's Memorial Hall was formally opened. The opening ceremony was reported

in Berrows Journal as follows:

"Memorial Hall army An erected near the centre of Martley. on a good brick foundation. the outside dressed with a preservative and the interior papered and decorated, forms the excellent Memorial Hall at

Martley. A tablet, containing the names of men from the parish who died or served in the war is placed on the inside wall and will serve as a permanent reminder of their services for King and country. The opening ceremony took place on Monday evening when a large company assembled in the Hall, presided over by Col Carr, with Mr J Davis in the vice-chair. There were also present: Brig Gen Benson, Ref J F & Mrs Hastings, Mrs & Miss Nash, the Misses Martley, Mr & Mrs Holmes, Mr & Mrs W H Holliday, Mr J Dovey, Mr C Howlett, Mr & Mrs Wm Nott, Mr & Miss Humpherson, Mrs Ballard, Mrs G Jones, Mr & Mrs Sherwood, Mr & Mrs Fidoe, the Members of the Committee, with Mr D Wood, Hon Sec, relatives of those who died, and many others. Col Carr said the building had been erected to serve as a war memorial and as a Workmen's Club. Brig Gen Benson had come at considerable inconvenience to unveil the tablet and perform the opening ceremony. He appealed for energetic support for the Club, for unless that was given, it would not serve as the memorial it was intended to be. The honorary members and lady members would find this a convenient way of showing their gratitude to the men who fought. Brig Gen Benson, who had a most cordial reception, said that he loved to meet again the men whom he had served with and their friends. The objects of the memorials being erected all over the country were, first, to thank God for the men who had

come through the conflict, and secondly to do honour to those who had "gone west". Thirdly we had got to see that their dependants did not suffer for their great loss, and that those who returned did not suffer for their absence and the assistance they had given in the War. Brig Gen Benson then unveiled the memorial. Col Carr read the names of those who died and who served, and the hymn, "O God, our help in ages past" was sung, followed by suitable prayers by the Rector. Songs were given by Mrs Badger, Miss Nash, Miss Lacy, Mr Evans, Mr Sherwood, Mr J C Holliday and recitations by Mrs Rimell. Light refreshments were handed round. kindly given by Mrs Aston, Mrs Copping, Mrs J Davis, Mrs Fidoe, Mr J Holliday, Mrs Humpherson, Mrs G Jones, Miss Martley, Mrs Nash, Mrs Roberts, Mrs Rowley, Mrs Walters and Mrs Wilcox. Dancing followed, and was kept up till midnight. A silver collection yielded the sum of £7 14s for the funds."

(Note: Brig Gen Rion Philip Benson was GOC RA 5th Army Corps 197-18. CB 1917, CMG 1916)

# Colin Hughes

What can you say about a man who was larger than life? Born in Worcester on 12 December 1952, Colin's early years included singing in the choir of Worcester cathedral and, around the age of 12 years, discovering the art of ballroom dancing, for which he won many medals and trophies - partnering one Arbella Arbottle! And leading him to be one of Strictly Come Dancing's most ardent critics. He could rival Arlene Philips any day!

Colin's first job, on leaving school, was for Worcester Council, where the world was just opening up to the wonders of the Computer Age. Colin embraced this new technology with

open arms and it was this that led him into a very successful career and his own consultancy business, which took him around the world. His interests included crown green bowls, ballroom dancing and, after meeting Alan, pantomime. He also loved cooking, which he brought into many of his activities and charity work.

Colin's first role in pantomime was that of a long-haired (Yes! he did once have a plentiful head of hair), strip of wind (and Yes! he was once very thin) spear-carrier in Dick Whittington. From this he progressed through the roles of village idiot to the dame we all knew and loved - with the best pair of legs this county has ever seen! Colin also had his own version of Alan's script - one which was to keep the rest of the cast on their toes waiting for their cue line. Altogether he appeared in over 30 pantomimes in Stourport and Kidderminster. Here in Wichenford, Colin was known and loved for his generosity of time and effort to support village events, including Open Gardens catering, where he was well-loved for his recruiting of team helpers. Neighbours in the village loved the menu rehearsal. Colin would ring and say "I'm trying out a new recipe for Open Gardens. Can you come to supper?" You could hear the sound of sausages being thrown back into the freezers and car engines revving up on their way to Whitegates. Quotes from the kitchen included: "Why make one when you can make ten?": "We don't do wet"; "You can't send it out like that!" and "Nothing to do with me!" to which the set reply was always: "Yes, chef!" Colin and Alan shared many fabulous holidays together, but it was their love of the Greek islands that led them to buy a home on the Island of Naxos, where they have spent many happy times, and where, on the day of his funeral in Wichenford, friends held their own celebration of Colin's life at his holiday home. Alan and Colin spent 34 happy years together, firstly at Astley Burf, then King's Green and then, for the last 25 years, here in Wichenford. Those of you who knew Colin well, will know of his habit of hoarding everything, from papers, clothes, shoes to food and frozen food (several freezers full). Alan will now spend the next 25 years ploughing through these collections and any Tesco shareholders are duly warned that sales will now tumble, as Alan lives on the accumulated stock pile of food in Colin's pantry.

Throughout his life Colin was always involved in charity work, including abseiling for the Red Cross, village events, pantomime and conducting heritage walks around Stourport, which apparently grew in length as Colin's knowledge increased.

Colin was a big man with a very big heart, who will leave a large gap in the lives of everyone who knew him. He will always be remembered with affection and a big smile ...... and every time some body calls out "He's behind you!" Colin, we love you and will miss you.

The chairman invited all present to ask questions or make statements about parish business.

# **District and County Councillors Report**

Cllr Williams is to sign a prohibition for Rosses and Guises Lanes as recommended by the County Council. If no objections are received then the order will be implemented, but several objections have been received. Cllr Davies had earlier attended a meeting at the Chantry High School who recently had an OFSTED inspection, which resulted in the school getting an "outstanding". Cllr Davies explained the new grants that are available now for parishes. The recent grant application for the NPDC has still not been received. The chairman explained that this was in the hand of the Day Centre and she would have a word with them. It was also agreed by Cllr Davies that the parish council could do some ditch digging and it would be refunded by the CC. The parish council are very disappointed that this application has been approved and the chairman has written to Malvern Hills regarding the decision; the reply has been copied to all councillors. It seems the parish

councils views have been completely ignored by the District Council although the correct procedures were followed and we would like to know why it was approved under delegated decision and don't like the way it has been handled. As far as the parish council are concerned, the reasons for refusal last time are still valid. There are lots of pubs in the area doing the same thing and we feel this does not meet the needs of the local community, and people have been deceived by the business plan. The parish council are to arrange a meeting with Malvern Hills District Council to discuss this issue. Parishioners can write to the parish council who will take any letters with them to the meeting. Councillors were reminded about personal and prejudicial interest and when to declare them.

#### **Finance**

The balance for the 28 August stood at £15,670.75. There were two cheques totalling £168.00 for agreement and signature. The finances of the parish council are very healthy and it was unanimously agreed to pay for one year towards the upkeep of the churchyard (Clerk to find out how to do this) and give an equal amount towards the roof-repair on the memorial hall. This should total around £3.400.

#### Rosses/Guises Lane

Discussed earlier in the meeting, although it was brought to the parish council's attention that scrambler bikes and a quad bike have twice been through Rosses Lane. The last time a parishioner managed to get the number plate which has been reported to the local police.

# RoSPA Firework Top Ten Safety Code for Adults

Young people should watch and enjoy fireworks at a safe distance and follow the safety rules for using sparklers. Only adults should deal with firework displays and the lighting of fireworks. They should also take care of the safe disposal of fireworks once they have been used.

- 1. Plan your firework display to make it safe and enjoyable.
- 2. Keep fireworks in a closed box and use them one at a time.
- 3. Read and follow the instructions on each firework using a torch if necessary.
- 4. Light the firework at arm's length with a taper and stand well back.
- 5. Keep naked flames, including cigarettes, away from fireworks.
- 6. Never return to a firework once it has been lit.
- 7. Don't put fireworks in pockets and never throw them.
- 8. Direct any rocket fireworks well away from spectators.
- 9. Never use paraffin or petrol on a bonfire.
- 10. Make sure that the fire is out and surroundings are made safe before leaving.

Keep pets safely indoors
Be considerate of farm animals
Check your bonfire first for hedgehogs



#### In the garden in November

Winter is just around the corner and we can expect some wet and windy weather. November nights can be very cold and you should be prepared for frost in the second half of the month. The shorter day-length also means less time to spend in the garden, so here are a few key jobs to fit in if you can.

First, tidying up. Removing dead leaves and debris will cut down the number of pests and diseases surviving over winter. Bin or burn anything which is obviously diseased, such as rose leaves with blackspot. Leave some old stems and leaves on frostsusceptible plants to give them winter protection. Pentstemons should not be cut down until spring. Check that climbing plants are well tied up so they don't pull away in the winter gales. Last winter our large climbing rose came down over the front door. the old ties simply couldn't take the strain.

Second, protection. Trees, shrubs and herbs growing in containers may need insulating so the roots don't freeze. A layer of bubble wrap works well, and raising the container of he ground means the plant won't be left standing in a pool of cold water after the rain.


Next, pruning. You can cut back deciduous hedges now, but don't touch

evergreen ones. Towards the end of the month you can start the winterpruning of apples and pears. Keep an eye on holly trees and cut your Christmas berries before the birds get them. Last year my tree was stripped over a couple of days at the start of December!

Finally, planting. Perennials, trees and shrubs can still be planted in November but try to avoid doing it in wet, cold spells. Now is the time to plant tulips and lilies and Garden Centres may well have some bargains on offer as we near the end of the month.
