


Martley Pre-School Snippets

Teme Valley Children's Centre has previously hosted successful Road Safety events at different Toddler Groups and Family Funs across the Teme Valley area in the past. The events have given local children and their parents/carers the opportunity to learn more about Road Safety and how to avoid dangerous situations when walking to and from school or when out playing with their friends.

Road Safety week is an event which Teme Valley Children's Centre promotes and supports as on average 55 children aged 0-11 years are killed on the roads in Great Britain alone, and another 1,546 on average are seriously injured. Martley and District Horticultural Society

September's meeting proved particularly enjoyable. It began as usual with Chairman Mike Dunnett welcoming everyone including five potential new members. The Black Bag appeared again – this time out came the beautiful tall perennial Salvia Sabria Hadspen flowering August through to October. It should survive the winter if cut right down and has good drainage. Mike also produced a pile of 'Country Gardener' magazines (free), they are full of useful tips and information. Jane Cropp showed members an attractive small-leaved vine with unusual fruit, Ampelopsis brevipedunculata. Dave Cropp's advice - study Plantfinder' and look for AGM by plants' names – this means Award of Garden Merit.

Our main speaker was Kim Hurst from The Cottage Herbery near Tenbury Wells, her talk being 'Cottage Gardens': a subject dear to most country people's hearts. We all soaked up the beautiful slide views of sections of her large garden with its numerous colourful old-fashioned flowering plants, also structures. It is organic and peat free, and Kim said a true cottage garden should have

chickens and pigs to provide food and manure as well as vegetables, herbs, flowers and fruit! Aromas are desirable too, and butterflies and bees are very important. She feels this type of garden should be rampant-mix wild and cultivated plants, let things like opium poppies and nasturtiums seed anywhere, grow plants in old galvanised containers, have a picket fence with honeysuckle tumbling over it! Grow salad in an wheelbarrow - have an old pump (working if possible!) and a rose arch. Kim and husband Rob do some plant breeding, an impressive red nasturtium being one they've produced. They have had stands at the major shows including Chelsea, there are gold medals to prove it! In 2007 the garden was partly flooded but the silt was a soil tonic and everything thrives. Companion planting was shown on a slide of the Nursery (where the Hursts are now living). Kim answered members' questions at the end. A fantastic talk!

Unapproved abbreviated draft minutes of the Ordinary Meeting of the Parish Council held on Monday 6 September 2010 at the Memorial Hall

The Democratic Period/Public Question Time

Parishioners queried progress on the milestone plate and detail around any work being undertaken by Martley Parish Council concerning local development. The Clerk will speak with the milestone association and to Nigel Potter, Community Housing Enabler for Community First regarding work undertaken on behalf of the Parish Council last year.

Minutes

The minutes for the previous meeting were approved as a true record of the meeting with a correction to 51-10 (b). Should read the Clerk will ask the lengthsman to clear the mud from

opposite the weighbridge not by the weighbridge.

Outstanding actions from previous minutes:

Graffiti on Hillside sign has still not been removed - The Clerk to chase Highways again. Highways matters -The Clerk is to submit a report to Highways to clarify exact positioning on the works list for the dropped curbs, potholes, drains, etc that have been reported. The Clerk will write to committees with Parish Council representation for updates dates of future meetings. The Clerk will continue to investigate authorisation of cycle races. The Clerk will again contact Worcester County Council regarding the herbicide sprayed around the village.

Progress Reports:

(a) The Clerk: The weighbridge electricity has finally been resolved with a three-year contract with E-On now being arranged. A link Martley.org.uk will be put on Worcester County Councils my parish part of their website, which will be an alternative route of access to Martley and Martley Parish Council. The Clerk has had notification of a community project grant which can be applied for under certain criteria. The Clerk thinks YIMMS may be eligible and will speak to representatives of YIMMS. The Clerk referred to. The Clerk will e-mail documentation on an urgent consultation on the government's proposal to cap the precept and will then collate and submit the view of the Parish Council. (b) Lengthsman. The

Clerk will ask the lengthsman to pick up the rubbish from the Hillside lay-by each week; look at grips opposite the saw mills and on Hollins Lane (the village end); clear mud from opposite the weighbridge; ensure the signs throughout Martley are readable and cut away any overgrowth and/or clean the signs; look at Hope House Lane, between New House Farm and Touchwood Cottage as the dip keeps filling with water. (c) Training. The Clerk will place one item each month on the agenda to address items raised during the training.

District and County Councillor's reports:

County Cllr Davies reported that: the work on the footpath next to The Crown has been completed. Two new VAS signs will be purchased by County Cllr Davies solely for the use of the ten parishes within his area. These will be in addition to the two that are already shared across all parishes within the county. The responsibility of charging batteries and general maintenance will be with the Parish Council. The Chantry exam results were pleasing with 71.8% of pupils achieving 5 A to C GCSE's. There is a grant available for help with the elderly, which is £100,000 in total in £5,000 allocations. County Cllr Davies will send an information booklet to the Clerk.

Councillors reports and items for future agenda:

The Clerk is to speak again to Worcester County Council regarding officers on quad bikes riding on footpaths through the village spraying herbicide. Councillors asked for their thanks to be noted to County Cllr Davies for the work recently undertaken on the footpath in the village. The Clerk is to ask for an update on YIMMS activities and when the next YIMMS event is. The Clerk is to contact the Housing Association regarding the land affected by the fallen tree near Heaton House to discuss much-needed improvement work. A Councillor referred to tractors travelling at night with white lights on the back of the cabs, which blinded drivers of cars behind them. There are

patches of highways lifting throughout Martley. Improvement works carried out through the summer were not sufficient. It was recognised that the only solution in some areas would be to lay new pipes. The Clerk is to ascertain whether the Parish Council should be consulted when a liquor license is requested within their area. The Clerk will speak to the Freedom of Martley recipient to see if they would be available on Wednesday 15 September 2010 to receive the award.

Martley's Past

Two contrasting reports on Mr Michael Coleman, who retired as Headmaster of the school in 1893, after teaching the boys' section.

Inspectors Report, July 1866

"Boys. The discipline, instruction and general efficiency of the school are fairly good. Religious Knowledge and Geography good, Reading and Writing fairly good. Spelling moderate, arithmetic fair. Girls. This school has slightly improved during the past year. The Writing and Spelling are pretty Reading fair. Arithmetic good. Religious Knowledge moderate. pretty fair. The needlework good. The desks should be altered and converted into parallel rows and some more slates should be provided. The mistress is deficient in energy and appears to have hardly sufficient physical strength for her work."

Ten years later, in 1876, the inspectors report.

"Boys. Mr Coleman continues to do thoroughly good and successful work, especially in Div III. If the lower Div I were proportionately as proficient as Div II and III nothing would be left to be desired in this well-ordered and high-toned school which bears the mark of a conscientious and efficient master. Passes 83 percent."

A Second Cuckoo in the Nest

When Peter Clarke of Cleveland came across Michael Wetton's book about his experiences in Wichenford as an evacuée "Reared in a Stranger's Nest", he recognised immediately his own fellow evacuée, with whom he had shared a billet at Ockeridge Cross. Both boys had come from the East End of London and both were billetted on the Jones family. But town boys

are not country boys and an incident involving matches and a hayrick which burnt down, resulted in them being soundly thrashed, ticked off by the local Bobbie and sent to new separate 'homes'. Peter was lodged with the Grosvenors at Wedlands Bank and has many fond memories of the subsequent five years he spent with the family. He recalls vividly the tales told by Granny Grosvenor, including an intriguing reference to four dead heathen knights refused burial in the churchyard and who were buried 'under the moat' of Wichenford Court!

Peter is anxious to find out if any of his old school fellows from Wichenford Primary School or in particular any members of the Grovesnor family still remember him. He names Denville, Billy, Bunty and Mary Grosvenor, the Rice family and also the Bullock family from Monkwood Green. I have already put him in touch with Elizabeth Rice's son, Will Pearce and am hoping that this article might jog more memories and lead to more contacts. His address is 8 Croxton Close, Fairfield, Stockton-on-Tees TS19 Cleveland and he would be delighted to hear from anyone who can recall schooldays during the War at Wichenford Primary and in particular a little five-year-old London boy who spent the next five most formative years of his life here in Wichenford.

David was born in Boraston, Tenbury Wells, one of 8 children. He moved with his parents, Jim and May, to Rosses Lane, Wichenford in the late 50s. He was working on a farm at Stoke Bliss at the time and was travelling home for Sunday lunch on his motorbike, when he had an accident in which he tragically lost his leg; he was just 19 years old. He did not let it get him down and, with help from family and friends and a steady determination, he got on with life. Soon after, he met and married Val and they lived at Rosses Lane for many years, where they had their two lovely daughters, Dawn and Sheryl, and sadly lost a son, Dean James, who was born prematurely.

David tried several jobs on local farms, especially for a time at Aldens, until he went to train as a general builder for a company in Worcester, which he really enjoyed. Later the company folded, so David became self-employed and he never looked back. He worked on many homes in this area. David also did maintenance work on churches in the Tenbury Wells area. Val remembers being worried about him clambering over church roofs, but nothing fazed him. David was very much a family man and an extremely good gardener, as many will know through the 'Open

In the Garden

In the garden in November

November can be a damp, cold month and there can be some frosts. Many of us lost plants last winter, so get tender plants under cover ASAP, insulate pots that are too large to take inside, and pile up a thick mulch of dry compost or bark to protect the roots of any precious plants. Check that climbers and wall shrubs are tied up to prevent them being blown about. It is worth looking around to see which plants give some interest at this time of year; look out for evergreens, grasses, plants with berries or trees with decorative bark. Don't forget to cut berried holly for Christmas before the end of the month. Last year the fieldfares stripped our tree at the start of the last week in November. Tulips can be planted now. They flower better in a sunny position and you should put a layer of coarse grit under the bulbs to prevent them rotting. Ideally keep off your lawn during wet weather, but find a dry day to rake off the leaves. If you feel super-efficient you can send the lawn mower for servicing!

In the kitchen garden, make sure that you net brassicas. As the weather gets colder the pigeons get hungrier. Start winter pruning of fruit trees, currant bushes and indoor grape vines.(Try planting some of your prunings-they

are hardwood cuttings). If you have been browsing the seed catalogues, don't delay ordering new or special varieties, I found that some were sold out by the end of September. You

don't have to send off for catalogues—you can get them all online, plus specialist growers you wouldn't normally look at. Free Internet access, and help, is available in Martley Library.

Make Your Own Leafmould Part 2

Collecting the Leaves Up

Gather leaves using a lawn rake or besom. For larger quantities, leaf hoovers are available, some of which will also shred the leaves, speeding up decay. Mowing the leaves together with the grass makes excellent compost.

Compost or Leafmould?

Small amounts of autumn leaves can be added to your compost bin. They make a good balance for wet and soggy materials like grass mowings and kitchen waste. Simply save autumn leaves in a bag for use next season. Autumn leaves are rotted down by the slow, cool action of fungi rather than the quicker-acting bacteria that are responsible for composting. This is why autumn leaves in quantity are best composted separately.

Containers

All you need is a secluded corner of

the garden, or a simple container, such as a black plastic bag to stop the leaves blowing away. When it is full of leaves, make a few holes in the bag with a fork and tie the top loosely. Buy, or make, a simple container made from plastic or wire netting with a few supporting stakes. Adjust the size to suit your requirements. Non-returnable builders bulk bags make excellent leafmould containers.

Five Easy Steps to Making Leafmould

- 1. Collect autumn leaves. All types can be mixed together
- 2. Pack leaves into a suitable container
- 3. Water them to help them rot
- 4. Ignore them for a year or two
- 5. Use the leafmould as a mulch, soil improver, or basis for potting compost.

Leaves and Wildlife

Don't disturb drifts of autumn leaves under hedges and other out-of-the-way areas. They may be used as hibernating sites by hedgehogs and other creatures.

RoSPA Firework Top Ten Safety Code for Adults

Young people should watch and enjoy fireworks at a safe distance and follow the safety rules for using sparklers. Only adults should deal with firework displays and the lighting of fireworks. They should also take care of the safe disposal of fireworks once they have been used.

- 1. Plan your firework display to make it safe and enjoyable.
- 2. Keep fireworks in a closed box and use them one at a time.
- 3. Read and follow the instructions on each firework using a torch if necessary.
- 4. Light the firework at arm's length with a taper and stand well back.
- 5. Keep naked flames, including cigarettes, away from fireworks.
- 6. Never return to a firework once it has been lit.
- 7. Don't put fireworks in pockets and never throw them.
- 8. Direct any rocket fireworks well away from spectators.
- 9. Never use paraffin or petrol on a bonfire.
- 10. Make sure that the fire is out and surroundings are made safe before leaving
