Martley's website was good, and they noted that a photo taken on the judging day had been posted on it.

The judges also commented on other areas of Martley activities: the display by the bell ringers was exciting, and they appreciated a warm welcome from the bell ringers when they went to the church; the Path-or-Nones information was interesting; they liked the library and resource centre and felt both seem to be well used; but they were not convinced that the pub makes a great contribution to the village community!

Finally, the judges had expected us to be easy winners, and we could have been if we had been able to demonstrate a wider community 'buyin' to community life.

# Martley Past

Sir Charles Hastings, (founder of BMA) and Thomas W Sanders (edited 'Amateur Gardening' for 40 years) are both fairly widely known as being born or raised in Martley. Here are three more lesser-known "Worthies of Worcestershire" (and Martley!).

"John Doughty (1598-1672) born at Martley. Educated at Worcester under Mr Bright (qv) and at Oxford. Fellow of Merton, 1619; MA 1622; Rector of Lapworth 1633. Joined King Charles I at Oxford. Lecturer at St Edmund's, Salisbury. Retired to London during the Commonwealth. Prebendary of Worcester and Rector of Cheam 1662. Author of theological books. Buried in Westminster Abbey."

"Sir Thomas Hastings (1790-1870) son of Rev James Hastings, Rector of Martley. He entered the Navy in 1803, commanded a gunboat in the disastrous Watcheren expedition and

was First Lieutenant on the Undaunted when she took Napoleon to Elba. In 1832 he was made captain of the Excellent, the school of gunnery at Portsmouth and superintendent of the Royal Naval College, but retired from these posts in 1843 when he was appointed store-keeper of Ordnance. He had been knighted in 1839 and was given the civil CB in 1850 and the civil KCB nine years later. Placed on the retired list as rear-admiral in 1855. he received in due course the rank of vice-admiral with his KCB and of Admiral of the Fleet in 1866. He married in 1827 Louisa Elizabeth, daughter of Humphrey Lowe of Bromsgrove."

"Francis Jukes, who has a biography in the National Dictionary as an 'aqua tinta' engraver, was born at Martley in 1745 and specialised in topographical illustrations. Notable ones were those in the published "Voyages" of the celebrated Captain Cook.

In earlier life Jukes devoted himself to engraving and etching but later took up 'aqua tinta', an art which he brought to high perfection. He was especially successful in views of shipping and his principal works were hand-coloured. He died in 1812 and has an obituary notice in the Gentleman's Magazine of that year as well as a biography in Dodd's manuscript "History of English Engravers."

# Kenswick and Wichenford Parish Council

Unapproved abbreviated draft minutes Minutes of the Ordinary Meeting of the Parish Council held on Monday 28th July 2008 in the Memorial Hall Wichenford.

# Democratic half hour/public question time:

The chairman invited all present to ask questions or make statements about parish business. 1. The parish council were asked what they were doing about the Motor Cross at Allsetts Farm and questions were raised with regard to the noise level. (Parish council have spoken to parties concerned and will confirm date of the next one so noise level can be properly monitored.). Letters regarding this have been received by the clerk

The parish council meeting was opened by the chairman at 7.45pm.

# **District and County Councillors Reports**

District Cllr Williams reported that this time of year at MHDC (because mainly it being the holiday period) is generally quiet.

# The Revenues and Benefits Team is moving out

Following on from the Council Tax Teams' move to Pershore earlier this year, the Benefits Team are now packing up their belongings ready for their move. This will be the final part of the new 'Revenues and Benefits Shared Service' as by Wednesday next week, the whole team (staff from Worcester City, Wychavon and MHDC) will come together under one roof for the first time.

# The Malvern Hills plus Worcester initiative:

At a meeting of the Executive Committee on 17 July it was agreed that: i) the Council reaffirms its commitment to the principle of collaborative working with Worcestershire County Council and other District Councils; ii) the Council fully supports the accord with the County Council and Worcester City Council to collaborate, initially in the service areas of: the Worcestershire

Hub; Youth and Community Services; Economic Development; Human Resources and Payroll Administration. County Cllr A Davies thanked the council for dealing with Allsetts Farm as he has also had numerous phone calls on the subject. It appears that they are acting within the law as they are allowed 14 days for the Motor Cross and 14 days to practice.

The County Council have been approached about Hartlebury Castle. The CC already rent half and is looking at buying the other half. £11.5 million is being spent on Droitwich Canal. The County Council is not joining forces with Worcestershire City Council. If all six councils could get together and save money why not do it? There is plenty of work to do to try and save admin costs. The RSS is still going on. Baroness Andrews report is now out. The Highways have been allocated £5750 for small local highway works, either as one complete work or split between various parishes. I will be writing to all parish councils for any ideas on how this sum may be spent to improve a problem that you may have.

#### **Minutes**

The clerk was asked to make an amendment to page 167 08/81 Postcodes. The minutes of the meeting held on 16 June 2008 were accepted and signed as a true record.

### **Progress Reports**

Allsetts Farm Motorcross: This has already been discussed under parishioner's time.

Planning at Wants Green: This has

caused a lot of distress to the surrounding properties. Councillor Williams has asked for it to go to committee. When the parish council received the application they were not aware that the access serves 2 other plots. We have written to MHDC and the reply was read out. This is an area which is land logged.

#### **Planning**

Applications considered since the last meeting: None. Applications Approved/Refused/Withdrawn: 08/00711/FUL 4 Queensway, Wichenford. (extn) Approved. 08/00921/HED. Woodhall Farm. (hedgerow removal) Refused.

Applications received: None

#### Finance

The current balance from 31May to 30 June stands at £16,931.32. Of this £324 belongs to the Pathfinders Scheme; £1,247 is held on account for the NPDC and £2,336.was received for notice boards from the lottery funding. There were four cheques totalling £1,260.71 for agreement and signature. The acceptance of the finances was resolved.

#### Rosses/Guises Lanes

Two Letters of support have been received. All documents will be photocopied and passed on to anyone who wants to read them. The date or inspector cannot be changed. It was agreed that there is no point in having another meeting before the public inquiry as all documents need to be in by 30 July.

#### **The Nora Parsons Day Centre**

If all goes well a lot of the reserves

will be spent on repairs. The diocesan board of finance will charge a peppercorn rent, once the dilapidations are attended too. The Nora Parsons Day Centre will be responsible for the maintenance. The roof is being done shortly and will cost £7,000. The money the parish council has on account for the Day Centre will be handed over once the parish council are cleared of their responsibilities to the WDBF.

# What did you do in the Summer?

ne day I decided to try using my bus pass to visit Monkey World in Dorset. I phoned Traveline to check times of buses to Bristol, where I planned to spend the first night. Careful thought went into my choice of clothing, dark colours and non-crease materials being selected, also I chose garments that would dry overnight. A cagoule and reading book went into my backpack, with water, phone and small purse to hand. I then informed my family of my intentions and was declared mad – nothing new there!



The next day I caught the bus to Worcester, I was off! Next stop surprisingly was Rushwick to pick up the connection to Ledbury. I was dropped in the middle of nowhere by the next bus, actually at Cowslip Lane (sic), very rural. Twenty minutes later a bus to

Gloucester arrived, then on to Bristol. I did not manage to find an information centre, and booking a room for the night proved difficult because of the amount of construction work being undertaken in the city. A very helpful hotel receptionist on her sixth attempt found a B & B on the bus route outside Bristol. The house was called Toad Lodge. The steps to the front door held several ornamental frogs or toads, and the brass doorknocker was frog shaped. A lady showed me to my room. The bed linen was decorated with – guess – frogs! Even the toilet brush holder was a foot-high frog. In the dining-room I found the placemat and cruet decorated with, what else but, frogs! I asked a fellow guest if she knew the owners' name, she had been told "Lady Toad". A

very smart waiter arrived to take my order for breakfast – no, I didn't ask for frogs legs! Then a rumbling noise was heard which I realised came from an old-fashioned food lift. By then I felt I had walked into a horror film.



I spent the day at Bristol Zoo, then moved on to Yeovil and a very nice B & B in the middle of a well-kept park. Next day, there being no bus to Wool, I took the train; I then found out there was no transport to Monkey World. It was said to be 1 ¾ miles away, so I set off, but took a wrong turn and ended up at Bovington Tank Museum. It was a long way back to where I had turned off, then another three-quarters of a mile to my destination.

After wandering around Monkey World and walking back to the station, I found it closed; it opened only when a train was expected. There being nobody about, I sat down outside to wait, when what did I see but a bus – no driver, no destination board either. After about ten minutes the driver appeared. I asked where he was going. "Where to you want to go", he replied. I told him "Anywhere away from Wool". He took me to Dorchester, and I booked two

nights at a public house in Charminster, only too pleased to rest a couple of days, as my toes were swollen by then; one big toenail has since turned black.

The Three Compasses, where I stayed, is run by a lovely couple in their seventies, and have been there twenty years. On Saturday they asked if I knew there were no buses on Sundays. I didn't, but luckily was able to book another night.

Charminster is a pretty little village. I looked into the church then walked along the river bank to a shallow part where the water was about three inches deep and very clear, so I paddled for a while, which was very refreshing. Then I sat and watched as some children played 'Pooh sticks' on the bridge.

Next day I travelled back to Bristol, again finding accommodation difficult to obtain. I managed to get in a backpackers' hostel; very basic but clean and cheap, except that I decided to pay for a three-bedded room to myself rather than share with strangers. I was handed clean linen with which to make my bed, and had to strip it in the morning. Then on to Worcester, Martley and my own bed – bliss!

I enjoyed my trip, but found it very tiring and was pleased to rest at home, sweet home.

#### In the Garden in October

If you are thinking of introducing something new into your garden, October is the month to plant container-grown trees, shrubs and climbers. The soil is moist but not too cold and this will give the plants time to establish their roots before winter.

If you are a novice gardener, or have limited space, think about growing some fruit next year. Autumn raspberries are very easy: you will have fruit in August and September, then simply cut the canes to the ground in February. New canes then grow from the root, the fresh fruit is delicious and it freezes well.

In the flower garden, perennials can be cut back as they die back. Don't be too tidy - try and leave some seed heads for the birds, and those late flowers are a valuable food source for insects. If you haven't planted your spring bulbs, do it soon, and also plant out spring bedding such as polyanthus wallflowers and pansies. Sweet pea enthusiasts can sow seeds now, under glass. Lift and store dahlias and cannas and bring tender plants inside, reduce feed and watering for house plants as the days get shorter.

October is the start of the autumn clear-up in the vegetable garden. Take care to bin or burn perennial weeds and any diseased material, don't add it to your compost and risk spreading weeds and infection next year. Dig up outdoor tomato plants, tidy up strawberries by removing old leaves and runners; lift and divide rhubarb crowns. If you often use fresh mint or parsley, pot some up and bring it indoors onto a well-lit windowsill, for use over winter.

The majority of apples and pears should be picked by the end of the month.

utumn looms and we may be asking ourselves where did the year go? Looking on the bright side, it's an exciting new term for those starting school and we can look forward to Christmas ... Joking apart, all this may give us some concerns and worries, particularly as the cost of living has risen so significantly this year; mortgages have increased, as has the cost of fuel and food. We may all have had to tighten our belts in some way. This is particularly relevant as we approach harvest. When we are in a season of plenty, sometimes it is hard for us to imagine what it's like not to have sufficient for our daily needs. It reminds me of the story of Joseph, as in 'Technicolor Dreamcoat', and how God used him to save his people from an impending famine, even though they were in what would be seven years of plentiful harvests. These years soon passed, leading to the famine, and his wise oversight in Egypt at the time must have saved thousands of lives. Our own personal circumstances may not be quite on the scale of Joseph's, yet we all contribute to the bigger picture. This year we have all been asked to save fuel and energy where we can. We have been asked not to waste

food; and we have all been made aware of the increasing strain upon the resources of a developing world. That developing world will be brought to us when we are visited by our Mission Partners, David and Heather Sharland, who work in the Sudan – a farmer and a nurse who work under very difficult circumstances to help people grow food and face difficult health issues. We will be hearing from them in our services on Sunday 5 October. It may help us to put our own difficulties into perspective to look at how others cope. Whilst we may not face the famines on the scale faced by African countries, we all need to appreciate that which we have and that which is provided for us year by year. For a Christian, a Harvest Festival gives us that opportunity to thank God for another harvest and his provision for our needs.
