The Flower Festival at St Peter's church, held over the Bank Holiday weekend of 29, 30 and 31 August attracted many visitors from far and wide. The festival was to celebrate the centenary of the big restoration in 1909, and Rev David Sherwin had carefully planned what each floral display should represent. Members of the Horticultural Society decorated the church porch – No 1 – 'Foundation', and because the New Testament quotation concerned St Peter ('The Rock') they portrayed a Holy Land desert landscape along the stone side seats with sandstone rocks, sand and cacti/drought tolerant plants, with earthenware type jugs and pots. Either side of the main door they placed large displays of brilliant flowers, also on ledges higher up. Outside the porch were pots of greenery appearing to grow in a stony surface and most suitable of all – two young olive trees! We all enjoyed the Festival so much it was as though we'd no homes to go to!

Great News! Many of you will now have seen the wonderful facelift our building has had. After a long (and fretful - on my part!) application process, we were awarded a £20,000 grant to replace the pre-school roof and install new double glazed windows. This will vastly improve the building's energy efficiency and the overall wellbeing of children, parents

and staff at the pre-school.

Over the last three years, the preschool has benefitted from many improvements, including a new kitchen and office, new cloakroom area, facilities for children with disabilities (including toilets and ramp), and also new heating systems. I see these new modernisations as a much-needed and welcomed improvement to the service we provide to your community, not to mention the long-term sustainability of Martley pre-school.

Recycle your old mobile phone and printer cartridges. Collection points are at Martley Post Office and Central stores. Every phone and cartridge benefits the environment and Martley pre-school and out-of-school clubs. Last year it raised over £200.

Don't forget! We are a registered ecosetting with 20 years of history, where children can attend pre-school from two years old. They will learn through play and fun activities and do not have to be out of nappies! They are entitled to 15 hours per week free care funded by the government, starting from the term after their third birthday We also provide very popular breakfast (8-9am) and after-school clubs (3.15-6pm) for children aged 2 to 13 years. There are many activities available indoors and outdoors, including sports, game console, art, craft, cookery, ICT and much more. Footpath Day 15 October 2009

I am very pleased to announce that on Thursday 15 October, Worcestershire County Council has arranged the official opening of the recently-upgraded Martley and Abberley loops of the Worcestershire Way. It will take place in front of invited guests and appropriate council dignitaries and commence at around 2pm at Millennium Green by the new Martley Loop signboard, and then move to

Martley Memorial Hall.

Worcestershire County Council will be launching leaflets for the two loop walks and these will be freely available in all local outlets. The Pathor-Nones intend to take the opportunity to publicise not only the work that we do on our rights of way, but also Earth Heritage Trust will be there to promote the Geopark Way through Martley. In addition, we will announce our Walkers are Welcome success and vou should see evidence of this through a borrowed banner and stickers in local pubs and shops. Walkers have been welcomed to Martley for many years so our application to this new organisation was readily accepted in January this year when we became the 15th member, nationally.

All of this is very exciting for those keen to take advantage of our wonderful footpaths and the benefits they bring to our community. The ceremony on 15 October is, I am afraid, an invited-only do, but we really want everyone to look at what's available and step out into the network. We are proposing introductory sessions to our local routes and walking in general, so if anyone at all feels they need a bit of confidence boosting or questions answered then please get in touch. MWM

MWM update

Firstly, the directors would like to apologise for disruptions to our service at the end of August and beginning of September. Problems with speed of connection to the Internet resulted from the amounts of data being downloaded exceeding the figure agreed with our supplier. We felt this was not satisfactory, with the increase in membership and the growing amounts of data that individual members wish to download (BBC i-player, films and so on), we decided to change to a different supplier. Please note - your monthly subscription will not change but those affected by the disruptions should by now have seen an improvement in the service.

We feel we have taken the appropriate measures to provide a more reliable and secure Martley broadband service for the future. Our speeds compare very favourably with other suppliers (in Martley) at most of our customers houses; we do a speed-check whenever we are there. Most will receive at least 1M and many can receive close to 2M at certain times. If you look closely at prices, the oftquoted figures from our competitors are for a three-month period, thereafter they revert to the "normal". In August we looked at prices for the "top ten" and found the "normal" prices are around £20 per month. Our biggest attraction is that we provide "personal" service (in the professional

sense of course) and the feedback is very, very favourable. Please see our advert elsewhere in The Villager for contact details, or find us on the contact list on page 28, if you want to find out more about receiving your broadband connection via Marley Web Mesh.

Secondly, you may be aware that our email system was seriously compromised by malicious outside agencies using it to constantly broadcast many thousands of emails. This is a fairly common problem for all email service providers. The directors have taken the unanimous decision that the best possible solution is to engage an outside agency to manage MWM emails whilst still retaining our current email addresses. Our service switched to the new provider on 5 September.

Unapproved edited draft record of the meeting held On Monday 3 August 2009 at the Memorial Hall. There were 7 members of the public present.

The Democratic Period/Public Ouestion Time

The Chairman of Martley Parish

Council tendered his resignation and left the meeting. The Chair was handed temporarily to Cllr. Mrs. D. Goodyear; Cllr. Mr. G. Coombey-Jones was nominated as temporary Vice-Chair. Bottle banks: Parishioner asked that it be noted that she lives opposite the bottle banks and is not being disturbed at all by people using them or by them being emptied. She is in full support of them remaining on the car park of The Crown Inn and feels that other alternative areas such as the car park of The Village Hall are more likely to mean the bottle banks being vandalised. The Clerk will contact MHDC for further advice. Allotments: Cllr. Mr. M. Nott confirmed that a local farmer has identified some land for use for allotments. The Clerk is to seek advice from Malvern Town Council regarding the legal aspects of allotments and will agenda this item for the next meeting. Thanks: a parishioner also took the opportunity to thank MHDC (Malvern Hills District Council) for showing their commitment to climate change.

Progress reports:

The Clerk - a) The Clerk is to clarify with MHDC if the three current Councillor vacancies can be advertised together. b) The Clerk is to confirm with the Clerk for Clifton Upon Teme PC that Martley PC is interested in the training. c) The Clerk stated that MHDC have advised her that they need to authorise a cycling event and the route it wishes to take eight weeks prior to the event. The

Clerk is to ask MHDC to inform Martley PC of cycling events so details can be passed to parishioners. Landowners support – ditch clearance - the Clerk is hoping to obtain from Malvern Hills District Council the letter of permission needed for the ditch clearance and will agenda it for the next meeting.

Lengthsman - The Clerk will ask the Lengthsman to 1) clear the drain opposite Pudford Lane as there appears to be grass growing through it. 2) Continue to clear the footpath running from The Crown Inn to the pumping station. 3) Once Martley Parish Council is a full council, work for the lengthsman in Martley will become the responsibility of all Councillors where each Councillor will be responsible for part of the area and will report any work needed to the Clerk, who will arrange for the Lengthsman to carry out the work and report when it is complete, so the Councillor can check it and remove it from the works list.

Affordable housing - Nigel Potter is to report to the Council at the next meeting. He has identified two possible sites.

District and County Councillors' reports:

Dist. Cllr Mrs. Williams reported that following a detailed consultation exercise MHDC have agreed that the council will provide a weekly collection of both recyclables and residual waste using sacks to help the council meet its recycling target of 38.5% by 2014. This exemplifies a

Council listening to feedback from their communities. MHDC have signed up to the Worcestershire Climate Change pledge. We are looking at how we can reward Quality Parish councils and build even more positive working relationships. Parish councillors pointed out to Dist. Cllr Mrs. Williams that, unlike the promises that were made initially. Councillors felt that Martley was a quality parish council until February this year but had seen no advantage to being a quality parish council. County Cllr. Mr. Davies confirmed that quality status was in line with a white paper which should have seen power devolved to the third tier and acknowledged that it had been unsuccessful. County Cllr. Mr. Davies recognised Cllr. Mr. D. Cropp for the good work and commitment he had shown to Martley. County Cllr. Mr. Davies asked that an application be made ASAP for YIMMS.

Planning:

New

No new applications were made. The Clerk read part of a letter from Malvern Architects that stated: "We are in the process of formulating an application on behalf of our Client Marsten Developments Ltd, for the development of the land adjoining the Crown Inn which would be for affordable housing, possibly Doctor's Surgery, Nursery, live/work units and open market housing. We thought it would be beneficial if we could have a meeting with members of the Parish Council prior to the application to

explain the proposals for the site. The application would be for outline approval and not detailed." The Clerk is to contact Malvern Architects suggesting an open public meeting for the first week in October 2009, during either an evening or weekend to enable all parishioners to attend.

Martley Recreation Association:

Copies of deeds and leases have now been obtained. The Clerk is to contact the National Association of Local Councils for explanation of legal terminology. Cllr. Mr. T. Gale was nominated as Martley Parish Council's representative for Martley Recreation Association. The Clerk will write to the Vice Chairman of Martley Recreation Association to introduce Cllr. Mr. T. Gale and to assure them of the support of Martley Parish Council in anyway possible.

Finance:

There were 7 cheques totalling £913.89 approved. The Freedom of Martley boards have been made. It was agreed and accepted that payment be processed for the boards. It was agreed and accepted that Martley Parish Council will purchase three

bins to be located in the centre of the village. The Clerk will persevere with The Bank of Ireland. Agreement was made that the funds held by Bank of Ireland will be transferred to a new account with Lloyds TSB until interest rates improve and then the Clerk will look again at alternative providers.

Correspondence:

Items for information included -Worcestershire NHS Malvern Hospital Newsletter; Festival Housing updated five year strategic plan; Cllr. Mrs. I. Powell Resignation.

Councillors reports and items for future agenda:

CPRE subscription was deferred to the next meeting. Both Cllr. Mr. G. Coombey-Jones and Cllr. Mr. N. Stammers gave their apologies for the September meeting.

Date of next meeting: The next meeting will be held on Monday 7 September 2009.

Outgoing Chairman's Statement

After considerable thought I have decided to resign both as Chairman of Martley Parish Council and as a Parish Councillor. The highspots in my memory came at the start of the new millennium, with Martley twice taking the Award of Worcestershire Village of the Year and also a South West Regional Winner for the Environment,

for Information Technology, and for support for the Elderly...I could have wished to retired from the Council at a calmer time ... Each member has the right to express a view and to debate decisions but sadly the last two months seem to have become a position for some involving ... challenging the truth of what is said ... Each of us became Councillors voluntarily, and hopefully everyone has at the core a desire to be of service for the whole diverse community of Martley ... Whatever the circumstance I do wish this Council success in the future - because without it, Martley will be the lesser and weaker for it.

Martley's Past

Some extracts from the minutes of the Parish Council during the church renovations 1908-09.

July 17th 1908. "The letters of correspondence between the Chairman (R S Nash) and W F Taylor Esq referring to the dangerous corner in Martley Village. The chairman proposed and Mr James Rowley seconded that copies of this correspondence be sent to the clerk of the County Council. (carried)."

"The Rev J F Hastings then brought before the council the necessity of a new burial ground as the present one could not hold many more. He then proposed and Mr J Rowley seconded that this council should form a small committee to inquire into this matter as to what steps should be taken."

Nov, 12th 1908. "Members of this council desire to place on record their deepest sympathy to the relatives of Mr E Lawson and Mr Wm Edwards, both respected members of this council." "It was proposed that Mr David Jenkins of Prickley Green Farm and Mr Wm B Rowley of Hill End Farm become members of this council. (Both were at the next meeting. ALB)"

March 12th 1909. "Proposed by Mr C J Holliday, seconded by Rev J F Hastings, that the whole of the Parish Council should attend the meeting that will be held in the Girls' Schoolroom on Monday 29 March 1909 at 2.30pm concerning the Trusts belonging to the Martley Old Grammar School."

April 15th 1909. "Overseers elected the only business.

July 19th 1909. Minutes of last meeting read and signed the only business.

Oct 14th 1909. Minutes of last meeting read and signed the only business.

Jan 20th 1910. Minutes read and signed."

Note: Meetings were held quarterly in the Board Room of the Union Workhouse.

(It is apparent that nothing was done about the corner in Martley Village until the late 1970s and nothing was ever done about enlarging the churchyard.)

In the Garden in October

Autumn is really here: it feels colder and the days are shorter. Make the most of any calm, dry days and be prepared for gales and frost!

Tender plants need to be protected or moved under cover now. Any remaining summer bedding plants are best cleared and replaced with spring bedding such as winter pansies, primulas, wallflowers and forget-menot. If bedding is too time-consuming for you, try investing in some perennials, Brunnera has a similar flower to the forget-me-not, and

primroses will also come up year after year. There is still time to plant some spring bulbs - try spring flowering cyclamen to give you an early splash of pink around the base of a tree or shrub.

In the vegetable garden, pick your last runner beans; any really late ones will be better used for compost than for eating. It is also time to dig up any outdoor tomato plants and any remaining potatoes and carrots. When clearing pea and bean plants, just cut off the tops, dig the roots into the soil where they will act as a natural, nitrogen-rich, fertliser. Removing plant debris reduces the spread of pests and diseases, but you should be careful not to put any diseased material into your compost heap, domestic composters do not get hot enough to kill pests.

Houseplant growth slows as the days shorten, so reduce the watering. Tropical plants which prefer a humid atmosphere can be stood in trays of wet gravel so they don't get too dry when your central heating is on.

The 'garden visit' season is over but there are a couple of local events which may be of interest. First is the plant sale at Avonbank Nurseries at Pershore College, an opportunity to buy plants, trees and shrubs, direct from the grower. From 10am on 10 October. Also at Pershore College on 17 October is the Royal Horticultural Society Apple Day, with trees for sale and apple juice tasting, 10:30am-12:30pm.

turned the stories into a 90 minute play for the Chantry High School. When the term restarts in September,

the Head of Drama there, Sue Rickman, will start to audition and cast parts in the play. So if you have any interest or ambitions in community drama, now is the moment to come forward.

The play will have parts for all age ages and we would like as many people from the community to be involved as possible, including the older generation. This is your play and it is about you. You will need to be available for rehearsals at the Chantry which will be on Wednesday afternoons/ early evening.

We are also desperate for some technical help, particularly with the lighting and sound side of the production. Are there any retired or available people out there who would relish the challenge of getting involved in the production?


